After stormy blasts in the Bay of Biscay the average length of the decoration when the creature reaches the zoo is six inches to a foot. Even if the tail is still there, it has been blighted and fades away in the zoo.

Many putty-nosed monkeys eat their cold-storage tails. They are quite given to the habit until, of course, they have a certain red ointment, which spoils the flavor.

The new putty-nose was brought to England in wonderful condition by the donor, A. M. Woodward, who is a laboratory expert at the Medical Research Institute at Sekondi, where the yellow fever scourge is tackled.—London Times.

Indian Decoration Day.

An annual Decoration day, in both name and deed, is observed by lower Yukon river Indians. Fifteen families of Indians from Nulato and other villages met at Koyuruk, Alaska, to fulfill a queer custom, that of erecting houses over the graves of those who died the past year.

The shelters of the old graves were given a fresh coat of highly colored paint. Many of the unique monuments are constructed with skill and care, have windows, doors and rugs, other articles such as were used by the departed ones. Food and drink are renewed each year during the polatch following Decoration day.

Every western Alaskan Indian tribe has some different method of protecting the spirits of departed ones.

Whales Are "Brainy"

The largest brain in the world, according to speakers at a congress of natural science, recently held in England, is possessed by the whale.

Prof. W. Weygandt argued against a prevalent belief that the largest brain claim is shared by whales, elephants and man. He stated that the whale alone justifies the claim, the largest whale having a brain weighing 7,000 grams.

The human brain, he added, seldom exceeds an average weight of 1,280 to 1,400 grams in the male and 1,140 to 1,340 in the female.

REPORT IS MADE ON HOSPITAL DEDICATION

Mrs. Max Bird, president, and Mrs. W. E. Lebow, secretary, official representatives of the local American Legion auxiliary to the auxiliary conference and dedication of the veterans' hospital in Portland March 18, reported on the meeting at the Monday night session of the unit. Other auxiliary members who went to Portland for the dedication gave various phases of the program and described the hospital.

The child welfare committee reported on several cases that had been cared for. The dance committee reported that \$47.75 was cleared from the recent dance.

The unit voted to sponsor in the grades an essay contest on the poppy, official flower of the auxiliary, provided permission is granted by the superintendent of schools. The contest is state-wide and the state auxiliary is offering a prize for each of three divisions in the grades. The auxiliary voted to give local prizes.

It was voted to have a covered dish supper on April 15 and Mrs. Herbert Whitlock was named general chairman and will name her committees later. The auxiliary also voted to ask a booth at the Legion industrial show the last of April.

Members were urged to attend a banquet and meeting in Roseburg April 24, when the national president of the auxiliary will be present.

At the close of the business session the auxiliary entertained the Legion at a social meeting with refreshments. The hostess committee was Mrs. O. M. Korte, Mrs. H. K. Metcalf, Miss Myrtle Kem, Mrs. A. W. Kime and Mrs. Carl Coffman.

CITIZENSHIP CONTEST RATING IS ANNOUNCED

At a meeting of the citizenship contest council Tuesday night the four classes of high school students were rated for the first six weeks in the citizenship contest.

The senior class received the following points: Largest turnout in basketball, 30; greatest number of letters in basketball, 60; winning girls' basketball championship, 60; highest per cent on honorable mention grade list, 30; highest per cent of student body dues, 150; total, 330; for social progress, 18 votes.

The junior class points follow: Highest percent on honor roll, 25; highest per cent on honorable mention list, 15; total, 40; social progress, 14 votes, giving the junior class the highest rating to date in this branch of the contest.

The sophomore class received the following points: Second largest number to receive letters in basketball, 30; second in girls' basketball, 30; highest per cent on honor roll, 50; highest percent in student body dues, 100; highest per cent in class dues, 100; total, 310; social progress, 18 votes.

The freshman points follow: Tenth for basketball, 15; second highest percent paid up class dues, 75; total, 90; social progress, 18 votes.

Included on the interesting figures developed in the contest are the percentages of scholarship, attendance and application of the four classes. The scholastic grade of each follows: Seniors, 89.3; juniors, 86.05; sophomores, 84.94; freshmen, 82.03. Attendance record, seniors, 98.1; juniors, 96.49; sophomores, 96.49; freshmen, 96.7. Department and application record, seniors, 91.25; juniors, 91.45; sophomores, 87.06; freshmen, 88.45.

Junior Baseball Committee Named.

Jack McCornick, J. M. S. Bukowski and Charles S. Hall have been named a committee to arrange for a junior baseball team to take part in the state-wide junior baseball league sponsored by the state Legion. The Pacific Coast baseball league has set aside \$25,000 for the encouragement of junior baseball and the finals of the Oregon contest will be played in Portland during a week the Beavers play at home. Cottage Grove is one of 12 posts in this district that will enter a team in the league.

Proper Care Chicks Declared to Be Vital

Professor A. G. Lunn, head of the poultry department of Oregon State Agricultural college, spoke on chick raising and care of pullets and Mr. Wieman, field representative for Swift & Company, talked on fertilizers at the final lecture in the American Legion lecture series last night. A large number attended.

Professor Lunn advised the selection of a sturdy, healthy strain of chickens, clean feed and sanitation as prerequisites to successful poultry raising. He attributed much of the paralysis among chickens to failure to keep the flock clean and to provide them with proper housing conditions. He described means of raising chicks on wire, cement or boards as a method of producing healthier and better stock. Professor Lunn also described care for pullets until they reach the laying period. He said that success in the poultry business depends more upon the poultryman's ability to produce healthy, vigorous pullets than upon any other one factor.

Mr. Wieman described various fertilizers and their uses. He urged gardeners to know the conditions of their soil before applying fertilizer to correct the faults of the particular soil. He said that unless a person knows the condition of his soil he should not use any fertilizer alone. He told of several mixtures that are suitable for general use.
