Draw on All Sources for National Music
National music has to be discovered and clad in beautiful forms. Just as popular myths and legends are brought to light and crystallized into immortal verses by great poets. All that is required is a good ear, a good memory, and a faculty for molding fragments of past generations into a harmonious whole. A few days ago I read that Brahms, according to his own words, took folk-tunes as motives for his new collection of songs and arranged them for piano. Liszt in his rhapsodies did the same, and Schumann in his "Two Grenadiers" used the Marsellaise. The Irishman Raffle used a Hussite choir in his "Bohemian Girl," although nobody knows where he got it from. Thus sooner or later popular music attracts the attention of and finds its way into the works of great composers. I know I know that the question whether inspiration drawn from some stray melody or folk-song is sufficient to lend higher musical works a national character has not yet been solved. Neither is it certain whether national music as such deserves priority. I for myself believe firmly that that music which is the most characteristic of the nation deserves the greatest recognition.—Dvorak in a Letter Written From America.

Never picture any new idea, any new plan, and new course of action as terribly important," he declares. "And never feed out more of an idea at one time than the people you are dealing with can absorb. You must avoid frightening them. You must take carefully into account the mentality of each man affected by whatever you propose to do. Make things look easy to them. Get them to feel that they can readily adapt themselves to the different way of doing things. Nurture their confidence. By using these methods it is astonishing how smoothly the functioning of an organization can be adjusted even radically."

That sounds sensible, to avoid asking employees, or anybody else to digest far-reaching, brand new ideas all at once. In driving an automobile we do not expect it to jump from low speed to high speed; we first put it into second.—Forbes Magazine.

Age and Exercise
Amounts of physical activity required by healthy persons at different ages, as computed by various authorities, are summarized in an article on exercise by Dr. James O. Nall.

The program quoted calls for: Four hours daily at the age of five, five hours daily from seven to nine years, six hours daily from nine to eleven years, five hours daily from eleven to thirteen years, four hours daily from thirteen to sixteen years, three hours daily from sixteen to eighteen years, two hours daily from eighteen to twenty years, and one hour daily for persons over twenty years of age.

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TRUCKS MUST REDUCE SPEED SEVERAL ROADS
Truckers of logs are traveling too fast on a number of country roads, and to protect the routes the county court has issued an order reducing the limit to 20 miles an hour for trucks with trailers.

This order applies to the Lorane-Cottage Grove road, Bangor mountain section of the Noti road and the Wolf creek grade. High speed on these roads is not only damaging the surface but is dangerous to traffic on account of many narrow places, members of the court say.

Who Has Missing Half of Cullinan Diamond?
When the Cullinan diamond, the largest in the world, estimated to be worth up to \$2,000,000, and which is among the British crown jewels, was dug from the earth at the Premier mine at Cullinan, South Africa, in 1905, it was found that one side was so flat and smooth that it was considered to be only part of a much bigger diamond. The enormous half brother, however, has never been found, although scientists, diamond miners, financiers, geologists and thieves have been searching for it for 23 years. Its whereabouts and even its existence are one of the world's mysteries.

South Africa abounds with strange stories of the missing half of the Cullinan diamond. One version is that it was found by a native worker in the diamond mines who feared to dispose of it because of the strict law governing the illicit selling of stones. A notorious criminal once almost had his hands on it, the story goes, but he attempted to trick the native who was prepared to sell it to him, and the native fled with the diamond.

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SPRAYING FOR APPLE PEAR SCAB TO START
It is about time to spray for apple and pear scab, says C. E. Stewart, county fruit inspector. For spraying fall pears such as Anjou, Comice, etc., it is probably safer to use some of the standard brands of wettable sulphur after the first spraying as it is not so apt to cause russeting of the fruit, says the inspector. Thoroughness of application has more to do in control of scab than strength of material, he says. The regular spray formula for scab is given as follows:

No. 1—Four to four and a half gallons of lime-sulphur solution to 250 gallons of water. Apply when young leaves around blossom buds are half to three-quarters of an inch in length.

No. 2—Same as No. 1, apply just before blossoms open.

No. 3—Four gallons of lime-sulphur, four pounds of dry lead arsenate to 200 gallons of water. Apply when three-fourths of blossoms have fallen.

No. 4—Same as No. 3, apply 15 days after No. 3.

RELOCATION OF BLACK BUTTE ROAD CONSIDERED
Change of location of the Black Butte road as it near the mines at Black Butte is contemplated by the county court. A better grade on lower ground below the hill road now in use seems feasible, according to G. E. Crowe, county commissioner.

Mr. Crowe has inspected that road and reports that a new survey of about a mile and a quarter would not only provide a better grade, but the road would be closer to the mine.

The county rock crusher at work at London has been moved to a new quarry on House creek, according to G. E. Crowe, county commissioner. Considerable road maintenance work will be done in that district.
