

Wings, Wartime Film Starts Here Sunday

"Wings," Paramount's wartime epic of the air, a picture of aviators made by aviators, will be shown for three days at the Arcade, starting Sunday. It is a picture that has snatched first rank records wherever shown and ran for over a year in New York.

Actors of the World War have seen the picture praise it as a masterpiece of warfare in the clouds and declare the war scenes are realistic.

One hundred twenty airplanes were used by William Wellman, one of Hollywood's youngest directors, who served in the Lafayette escadrille in France in the World War, in filming the battle scene of the St. Mihiel drive. The cream of America's aviators were gathered together for the air battle which was taken on location near Santa Antonio, Tex. There a battle area of five square miles was reconstructed to duplicate the St. Mihiel region in France.

In the great air battles ships plunge head on at one another. Aviators do loop-the-loops, barrel rolls, falling leaves and Immelman turns by the score. A head-on crash is seen; planes go down in flames.

Charles (Buddy) Rogers, Richard Arlen and Clara Bow are the featured players in the production and others in the cast are Johnna Hansen, Gary Cooper, Arlette Marshall, El Brendel, "Diamond" Smith, Richard Tucker, Julia Swayne, Gordon, Hooty B. Walthall, George Irving, Hedda Hopper and Nigel De Brulier.

Richard Arlen, who served as a second lieutenant in the British Royal Flying Corps in the World War, still retains his commission in the corps. Because he is an American citizen, the commission is an honorary one.

Patton Loses in Suit For Killing of Sheep

The case of Richard Hanna and Boney Patton against P. J. Schroeder, tried before Justice of the Peace Young yesterday, in which the defendant was charged with being responsible for the death of 11 sheep owned by Patton, resulted in a verdict for the defendant.

The sheep were owned by Patton and had been let out on shares to Hanna. Testimony was that the sheep frequently appeared on the road near the Schroeder place and the plaintiffs alleged that Schroeder had told Patton that he (Schroeder) had driven 13 head of them across the river to an island, two of them having later returned. Patton testified that he later found one of the sheep dead in the river. The only testimony that Schroeder had been responsible for the death of the sheep was the statement that he had said that he drove them into the river. Schroeder denied ever having made such a statement and the jury returned a verdict in favor of the defendant. H. J. Shinn was attorney for the plaintiffs and H. W. Lombard for the defendant.

Oregon's Submerged Forest

Firs Believed to Have Been in Water Since 2000 B. C.

An unexplored forest of Douglas fir trees is believed to be standing upright on the bottom of Clear Lake in Lane county near the head of the McKenzie river, according to information gathered by John D. Guthrie, well-known writer and scientist, and information given out in the office of the Cascade national forest.

It is believed that this forest was green and flourishing in 2000 B. C., in a little valley high up in the Cascade range, and that there were eruptions from Belknap crater which belched forth lava, the molten streams of which spread out over thousands of acres. A tongue of this flow is believed to have run into the little valley of the McKenzie and almost filled it.

Then the heat is said to have killed the Douglas fir in the valley or they may have been drowned by the rising waters. In either case the river gradually filled the little valley above the lava dam, submerging the fir trees and forming a lake about a mile long. The waters have continued to flow over this dam, and about a mile below make what today are called Upper

falls and Middle falls. The Douglas firs are still standing on the bottom of the lake. The waters are said to be the coldest of any of the Cascade lakes, and crystal-blue, so that the bottom, shining with volcanic ash, seems but a few feet below the surface. Small objects are visible 13 to 50 feet below the surface. With the air excluded these old trees have been perfectly preserved through all the centuries and today the wood is readily identified.

Sections of the trees have been identified by the United States forest products laboratory as Douglas fir, and have been found to be in an excellent state of preservation.

After the molten flood had cooled, and as through the centuries the lava became broken up by the elements, gradually a soil began to form on the lava-flow dam. Through the centuries vegetation crept in gradually over it, and finally Douglas fir began to seed in from the nearby areas and to grow, according to information gathered, the same kind of trees that in 2000 B. C. were growing down at the bottom of the lake. Now a great forest of big fir trees is growing on top of this natural dam and all

around the lake. The age of the trees is not known, but it is said that two living fir trees growing on this lava dam were felled a few years ago, and the stump rings counted. One was 425 and the other 450 years old. Scientists say that it takes nature 10,000 years to build up one foot of soil.

Geologists say that this flow could not have been for less than 1000 years ago and probably more.

Visitors to the lake may row over the top of the submerged trees and look down their refracted holes to their bases. Probably the holes of these old trees are surrounded with cinder ash many feet in depth.

Standing submerged for perhaps many thousands of years the wood is thoroughly water-soaked. The specific gravity is so great that in order to secure specimens it is necessary for forest rangers to attach buoys to the trunk of the tree before a heavy blast of dynamite will release it. Without the buoys the uprooted wood will sink instantly to the bottom of the lake.

Government officials say that the water is as pure as any that could be had.
