"Interference" Stars
Four Featured Players

Picture Is 100 Per Cent Talking; Was Famous English Stage Success.

Patrons of the Arcade theater have a surprise in store for them with the opening of "Interference," a Paramount picture, which will be shown here May 5, 6 and 7. There is no single featured player in the film; on the contrary, all four main characters of the story are filled by actors and actresses who themselves enjoy stellar rating.

The four players are William Powell, Evelyn Brent, Clive Brook and Doris Kenyon. The screen version of "Interference" gives each artist an admirable opportunity to display his or her histrionic ability without fear of being overshadowed by any fellow player in the cast. Each player fills a vital role in the story.

It is a 100 per cent talking picture. "Interference" was first pre-

sented on the stage in London. It met with instant approval from English theatergoers and held the boards in the English city for two years. It was then brought to New York, where it was accorded an enthusiastic reception as in England, running for nine months. Scouts for Paramount considered the play ideal for presentation on the screen and the play was purchased for production.

When work began it dawned upon studio officials for the first time that the nature of the story demanded four central characters and was unsuitable as a vehicle for a single star. Forthwith it was necessary to draw upon the featured players under contract to Paramount. It was found that the company had three players who were considered ideal for the play, and it placed under contract an entire feminine player to fill the remaining role.

As the play is English and is laid in England, it was necessary that the players have an English screen personality. Clive Brook headed this list. He was born in England and appeared on the English stage. The other three, Powell, Miss Brent and Miss Kenyon had all lived in England at one time or another, so they were considered qualified to fill that requisite.

William Powell is Philip Vance in the picture. He is a man who has lived a care-free life and is a veteran of many love affairs. There are two women in his life, one of whom refused to remember him, and the other refused to forget him. Doris Kenyon is the former, Clive Brook essays the role of Sir John Marlay, a famous surgeon, and Evelyn Brent is the latter.
