Shoeing Road Work Started. A crew of shoeing men has started construction work on the London road which is a part of the route through Shoestring valley connecting Lane and Douglas counties. The present project covers about 600 feet and is a completion of work started last year. In clearing the right of way it was necessary to move a house and garage.

When the present piece of work is finished a stretch of about a mile and a half in Lane county near the Douglas line will be improved.

The Douglas county court has agreed to improve its section of the road but work has not yet been started in the Douglas territory.

Scouts Earn Life Saving Badges. Llewellyn Rex and Fay Stewart were successful in passing their Junior Red Cross life saving tests last Thursday night in Eugene. The examination was given at the University of Oregon swimming tank and badges were awarded to the two boys by the Red Cross instructor. Twenty boys went to Eugene accompanied by Scoutmaster K. D. Baker and Mr. and Mrs. G. A. Sanders.

Earliest Time Locks. The time lock was first suggested in 1831 by an Englishman, William Rutherford. In 1857 Holbrook & Fish of the United States devised another, but the first successful time lock put on the market was the Sergeant and Yale locks brought out in 1875.

Ancient Wood Sculpture. One of the earliest specimens of wood sculpture extant is in the Cairo museum. With the exception of the arms, it is carved out of a solid block of sycamore wood. It is a life-size portrait statue, a double of the Shal-el-Reled. The figure dates back to about 4000 B. C.

Finish for Walls. To produce a mottled finish to the walls of a room, it is suggested that a coat of white paint be applied over a ground color of another shade, and while it is still wet, the surface lightly with crinkled wrapping paper loosely held.
