Encouragement Given to Those Who Expect This Railway to Extend South. The Oregon Electric has received executive acceptance on the part of the Interstate Commerce Commission to set an early date for hearing of its request for permission to build up the Santiam valley and into the higher reaches of that watershed, Turner said.

Estimated cost of the extension is \$5,000,000. Surveys have been completed and arrangements made with incorporated towns along the route for rights-of-way. The project includes 41 miles of main line and 25 miles of branch lines. Successful negotiations with the Southern Pacific, which are to be ratified, will save the Oregon Electric the construction of 13 miles of main line between Albany and Lebanon, leaving 28 miles to be actually constructed and also will save about \$435,000 in investment, it was said.

This expansion program on the part of the Oregon Electric gives encouragement to those who believe that in the not distant future this railway will extend its line south from Eugene into the Cottage Grove territory.
