Mr. Blaney will preach next Sunday, in Dempsey's Grove, at 10 o'clock a. m., and at 4 o'clock p. m., Providence permitting. Between the sermons the preacher will run his sorel mare, Julia, against any tug that can be trotted out in this region for a purse of \$100."

Soya Bean's Many Uses. The soya bean is undoubtedly the world's most wonderful plant. It grows with remarkable rapidity, taking only 100 days to mature from seed to plant and seed again. Besides their use for milk-making, the beans can be made into flour, salad-dressing, lubricating and illuminating oil, glycerine, paint, varnish, celluloid, printing ink, soap, waterproof explosives, linoleum, rubber, coffee and margarine. Bread made from the soya bean is said to contain all the best elements of both meat and milk.
