TOURING CAR RAMS COUPE IN ACCIDENT

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Beware of Adjectives

If you plan to write anything from a newspaper article to a novel, you would do well to consider remarks made by the late Senator Albert J. Beveridge, whose recent "Abram Lincoln" is hailed as a masterpiece of biography.
