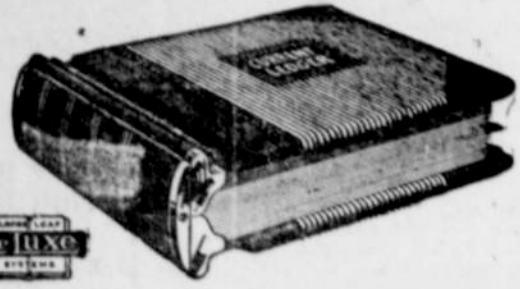


Pope's Bodyguard
