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COLLEGES NOT GUILTY.

The Salem Statesman refuses to be convinced by the Eugene Register that the university and state college were in no way parties to the movement to test the validity of the legislative act consolidating the educational institutions of the state. It also refuses to believe that the Greater Oregon association, of which L. B. Smith is secretary and guiding spirit, was the real mover in the test-of-validity suit.

Perhaps a little outside testimony may help to turn the feet (or editorial pen) of the Statesman in the right way.

This writer, without any idea that he might later be a witness, was present at the legislative session during the enactment of the consolidation bill, and in his capacity as a reporter of the proceedings there was in touch not only with representatives of the Greater Oregon association but with those in close touch with college and university affairs. Since the session it chances that he has talked with both President Hall and President Kerr about the consolidation of the institutions, as well as with numerous others connected with one or the other of the institutions or deeply interested in the welfare of one or both.

After having had this opportunity to know the inside facts and to get the personal views of those who would be a part to any move on the part of the educational institutions, this writer is firmly convinced that those connected with the two institutions followed a rigid policy of not taking part in the controversy and of refusing to even express themselves upon the benefits or detriments of consolidation and that they certainly did not move a finger or utter a word to encourage or discourage the suit to test the validity of the act.

Of course officials and friends of the institutions were anxious to know whether or not the act was to stand. They did not wish to arrange their affairs in conformity with the act, only to have to rearrange them should the act be found invalid. Undoubtedly they wished the test, if one were to be made, to be made at once, but those in charge of the affairs of the institutions refused to be parties to such a suit for fear their motives might be misunderstood.

President Hall and President Kerr will endeavor to conduct their institutions under regulations enacted by the legislature or by the people, so long as such regulations are such that their institutions can be successfully conducted and the dignity of their positions be maintained.

As for the Greater Oregon association, this writer does not believe its officials were opposed to consolidation. In the interest of a greater Oregon it was necessary to know whether the tax feature of the consolidation act was legal. It was also desirable to know at once whether or not the act was to stand, as there was a possibility of unwarranted expense in arranging affairs of the institutions to come under an act that might later be found invalid.

There is nothing to criticize either in the actions of officials of the institutions or in those of officers of the Greater Oregon association. Marshfield has long had an impossible newspaper situation. With a great country that should be a splendid newspaper field, two papers have been struggling for daily existence. Religious beliefs and prejudices entered into the contest and finally advertisers agreed to patronize but one newspaper, in the hope that consolidation would be thereby forced. But there has been no consolidation, and probably will not be, but the News has announced withdrawal from the daily field, and it will hereafter be a weekly. It announces that this is merely a slowing up in preparation for bigger things in the future. The time ought to come in the near future when the Coos bay district can support two good dailies and we have admiration enough for the valiant struggle the News has made to express the wish that it may be on the job when the parties become greener.

The Eugene Register gets our endorsement for its demand for widening Pacific highway between Eugene and Springfield Junction or the adoption of a minimum speed limit of 25 miles. Main highways make poor pleasure boulevards and the 10-mile-an-hour car on this piece of highway is a real menace. It frequently takes as long to get the short distance from Eugene to Springfield Junction as it does for the remainder of the trip to Cottage Grove. There is especially true at night when danger is the greatest.

THE EDITOR AND THE JUDGE.

In the current edition of the always interesting Cottage Grove Sentinel there is an editorial by Elbert B. Deane which must have forced the linotype to reach for additional matrices of the capital letter I. And in a recent edition of the Oregonian there is a communication by our own Judge L. B. Smith, in which he is himself quite handsy at the typewriter, in which the chief characteristic is again the lavishness with which the alphabetical symbol for the first person singular is sprinkled about. One reading first the one article and then the other and then holding them side by side for comparison becomes conscious of the fact that here in Lane county at least there is a degree of freedom from the Oregon inferiority complex that one hears so much about.

It appears there is an issue between our two prominent Lane county citizens, which seems to be as nearly as one can make out, on the question as to whether Judge Blowers is or is not a candidate for governor. There are indications, too, of a secondary issue as to whether or not Mr. Deane is a potential candidate for secretary of state. Mr. Deane says the judge is conducting an active campaign for governor. The judge says he may or may not become a candidate for governor. He also has said, though not in his latest letter to the Portland daily, that there is a political combination in the making which hopes to promote the candidacy of Judge Blowers for the gubernatorial chair after a while and put Elbert Deane in the office of secretary of state.

Now, laying aside completely any consideration of individuals, or individual fitness for the two offices that Editor Deane and Judge Blowers are accusing each other of aspiring to respectively, would it not be a nice thing to have two members of the state board of control from Lane county at once? We'll say it would. And the state of Oregon as a whole could not fail to benefit by letting its ship of state be captained and first-mated simultaneously by gentlemen from so progressive and altogether fine a county as ours. We will venture to suggest to Editor Deane and Judge Blowers that, having nominated each other, they hold a joint convention between themselves and make a suitable selection for the office of state treasurer, also from Lane county. Let's give Oregon a government with the right background for once in its life.

Falling in with the idea expressed by the Register, the Sentinel suggests for state treasurer one whom we know the Register will heartily endorse, Herbert Eakin, who has been treasurer of the city of Cottage Grove so long that the memory of residents there of runs not to the contrary. This would give a complete Cottage Grove background for the three officials. The only drawback to this plan is that the editor has no intention of being a candidate for secretary of state.

LOUIS E. BEAN.

He grew up with the love of the Oregon country in his heart. No man knew better than he its opportunities and its problems. Of his many fine services to the community that which in many ways best illustrates his vision was his work to bring about the building of a cross-state railroad connection. As a member of the state public service commission and as chairman of that body he labored indefatigably to get this project started. His death finds the matter at the last before the interstate commerce commission with a favorable report from the commission's own representatives whom Mr. Bean induced to come here last summer to look the field over.

In a lifetime of politics, Mr. Bean combined to an unusual degree the practical and the visionary. His courage to fight for a cause even when success seemed remote made him a leader. His name will go down as one of the men who helped to build Oregon.

Single Regent Board Controls All of State Higher Education

Backed by a large majority of the state legislature, a favorable decision of the supreme court, and evident support from the public, Oregon's new plan for the administration of state supported higher education went into effect July 1 under the leadership of the board of education consisting of nine men appointed by Governor I. L. Patterson. This board, with the assistance of a full-time executive secretary, now has full charge of the affairs of Oregon State college at Corvallis, the University of Oregon at Eugene, the Oregon Normal School at Monmouth, the Southern Oregon Normal at Ashland, and the Eastern Oregon Normal at LaGrande.

The board has been empowered to conduct an impartial survey of all the institutions to determine their needs and most effective organization, after which it may allocate the total funds appropriated for higher education as it sees fit. For the first year there is to be no change in the present ratio of distribution.
