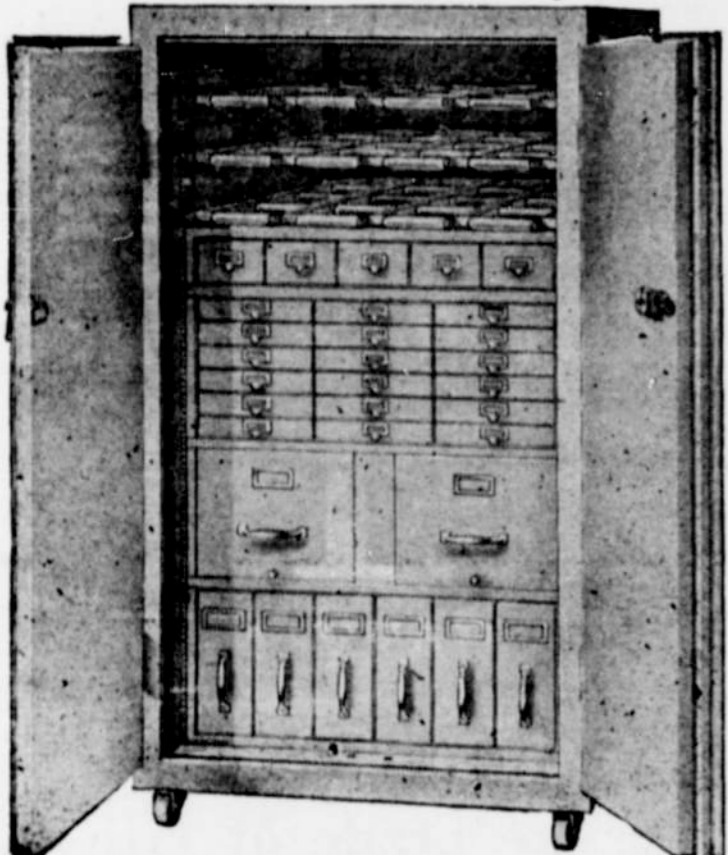

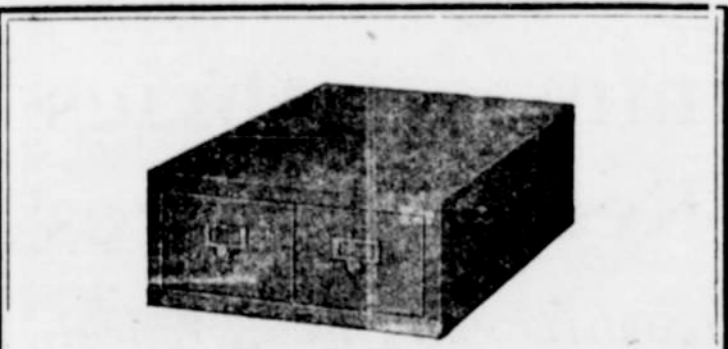

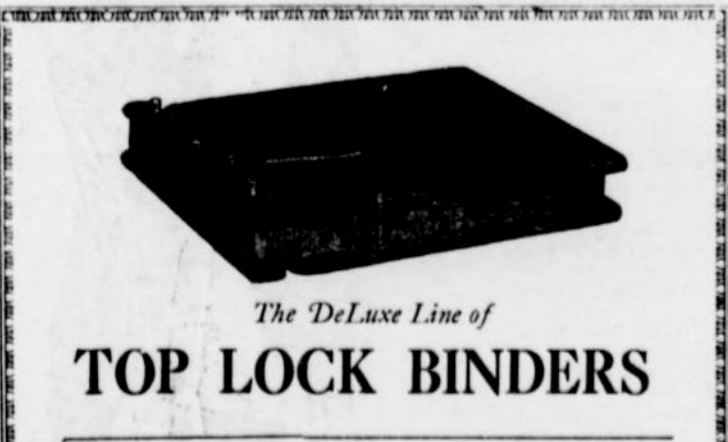

First Concrete Poured

by New Orleans Priest?

Toward the end of the Nineteenth century a French gardener made basins by pouring concrete around a network of iron rods, and until very recently that gardener had been credited with having originated the idea of reinforced concrete. Not until the summer of 1928 was the claim disputed. Then it was discovered that in 1853 a Jesuit priest of New Orleans had anticipated him. A church on Baronne street, built in that year, was demolished. It had been erected on land reclaimed from a cypress swamp; and when it was torn down the construction of its foundation walls stood bare.

The priest, acting as his own architect, had poured a concrete of crushed oyster shells and bricks around strong iron bars, running from top to bottom of the walls, and held in place with wrought iron hoops.

No written record of it was left, yet that idea is fundamental to the modern skyscraper.—Silas Bent in World's Work.

Moon's Light Believed to Affect Mentality

There seems to be a very generally accepted belief that the moon exerts a very potent influence upon the mentality of some persons. Writing in the British Medical Journal, Dr. E. Gerald Stanley says that the colossal upheaval of the waters of the earth—the tides—suggests terrifying possibilities of the moon's effect on the actions of humans.

Men in Central Africa declare they have suffered from headaches as a result of moonshine, and some make a practice of wearing a pitch helmet when going out at night. In the Middle East exposure to the rays of the moon is said to cause nightmare as well as headaches, and in the Far East a morning "thick head" is added to these symptoms. In Burma there is a belief that when the insane suffer from mental storms these correspond to the various phases of the moon.

Omission or Usage of Comma Highly Important

A jury in New Jersey that heard the evidence against two men accused of murder returned a verdict finding one guilty of murder in the first degree and the other guilty of murder in the second degree with a recommendation of leniency. A comma separated the two findings, and this was held by another court to prevent the recommendation for mercy from applying to the first degree finding, though the attorney for the killer insisted that a semicolon should have been used if that were the jury's intention.

Commas are, therefore, seen to be important whether used or omitted. It is a curious situation when courts are called on to decide the meaning of a contract drawn, or at least revised, by an attorney, especially such a contract as an insurance policy which may control the distribution of thousands of dollars.

Pepper Popular

Black pepper is the most widely used of all spices. There was a queer medieval belief that black pepper came from a forest that had been burned over. When means of transportation were not well developed, and when the monotony of a small forest forest made spices even more desirable than they are now, there must have been a tremendous interest in the caravans from the East that made spices one of their chief commodities. According to a treaty of peace ending the Franco-Prussian war, France was to pay Germany a war indemnity of 5,000,000,000 francs (\$1,000,000,000). The last installment was paid September 5, 1873.

Phoenician Dental Art Preserved in the Louvre

The first false teeth, as far as known today, were worn by a woman of Sidon in Phoenicia about 300 B. C., according to Dr. Roy L. Muddle of Santa Monica, Calif. The Phoenician woman's jaw, with the false teeth, is now preserved in the Louvre, in Paris. The two right incisors are represented by artificial teeth, held in place and bound to each other by gold wire. The wire has been drawn through careful perforations in the artificial teeth. Although the Egyptians pioneered in treatment of many diseased conditions of the body, this sort of dental replacement apparently was never devised by Egyptian physicians. Thousands of mummies, representing 7,000 years of life in Egypt, have been examined, but no clear evidence of such repair work has ever been found. It appears that we not only owe our alphabet and numerous geographic discoveries to the restless, inquiring minds of the Phoenicians, Doctor Muddle points out, but also owe to them for their first entrance into prosthetics, which is a particularly valuable field of dentistry.

Californians Proud of Mission Fathers' Work

The first settlement of California is attributed to Father Junipero Serra, who founded the mission of San Diego de Alcala. For the next 15 years he traveled on foot north and south over a distance of 900 miles, establishing and fostering missions and preaching to the natives. During those 15 years he founded nine missions, which were afterward expanded to 22 by his successors. The history of California began with—and for more than half a century, nearly over—these missions, of their founding and operations. About a century ago, however, they began to decline in power and influence, but they are still regarded with reverence by the Californians, as a part of the history of their state and of its foundation. Some of these missions are now in ruins, but others are in good repair, and still open for service.

Umbrella Held Danger

The earliest English writer to mention umbrellas regarded them with suspicion. In the Seventeenth century a British traveler, having returned from Italy, wrote: "In hot regions, to avoid the beams of the sun in some places (as in Italy) they carry umbrellas, or simply a little canopy, over their heads; but a learned physician told me that the use of them was dangerous, because they gather the heat into a pyramidal point, and therefore cast it down perpendicularly upon the head, except they know how to carry them."—Detroit News.

Tides of Great Lakes

The waters of lakes and inland seas are influenced by the attraction of the sun and moon in the same manner as the waters of the ocean. There are tides in the Great Lakes but owing to the comparatively small extent of water they are scarcely noticeable, except by refined measurements. Observations made by the United States survey have shown that Lake Huron has a tide with an amplitude of one and one-half inches for the neap tide and three inches for the spring tide.

Money Made by Indians

Included in a collection of coins put on display by a bank in New York are specimens of the only two known issues of paper money made by American Indians. One of these, a note of a bank operated by the Arapaho Indians, is said to be the only known note of the only known Indian bank. The other, a dollar bill, issued by the Cherokee nation in 1862, is the only known specimen of the sole issue of money by American Indians.—Detroit News.

Bathing in Japan

An interesting commentary on the personal cleanliness which prevails in Japan is found in an apology written by a visitor because of what he feared would seem personal untidiness. The apology, translated, was as follows: "You see in the summer time we are too busy to bathe more than twice a day." The visitor asked: "How often do you bathe in winter?" The reply came with a typical Japanese smile, "Four or five times daily."

"You clumsy fool!" roared the injured man, clapping his foot and massaging it very gently. "You might have broken my instep." An object apology failed to appease him the slightest.
