His statement that we tried to make a tramp out of him is on a par with his statement made in a former letter to the effect that the editor of The Sentinel was writing for the Oregon City Enterprise and other papers and had made up a deal to provide for a succession to the governorship.

Mr. Blowers' charge that the Oregon Voter has attacked him because he stopped his subscription, and that the Oregonian probably will attack him for the same reason, is about as ridiculous a statement as we have seen made by anyone claiming to be qualified for the governorship. Incidentally it might be well to suggest to Mr. Blowers that he shouldn't attempt to punish newspapers in that way for opposing his ideas on income tax—the reason he gave for stopping those papers. If a big advertiser should tell one of those papers that it would have to oppose income tax or its advertising patronage would be withdrawn, Mr. Blowers would characterize that action as damnable. Mr. Blowers has done the same thing on a small scale. Or maybe he really didn't stop his subscriptions to those papers, for they haven't missed an issue so far as we recollect.

Surplus Of Teachers Declared Big Problem

Oregon Schoolmasters' Club Submits Plans to Remedy Situation.

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, August 15 (Special).—Recognizing as a serious problem the surplus of teachers in Oregon and throughout the country, the Oregon Schoolmasters' club of which F. L. Grandis of Cottage Grove is a member, recently passed four resolutions which they believe should be put into effect at least in this state. Serving an apprenticeship at a low salary, hiring only teachers who have the right personality for their work, permitting teachers to offer only subjects in which they have specialized preparation and complete elimination of irregular entries into the profession by examination and special permits are moves which they strongly recommend.

The Schoolmasters' club is formed of leading educators of the state and several meetings were held during the session of summer school at the University of Oregon here. More than 40 school administrators are members of the club. The state board of education is designated as the body to prescribe the academic and professional preparation required for each kind of certificate under the proposed plans.

Elimination of those unfit for teaching would result from the apprenticeship system, it is declared. The schoolmen propose a two year term of service, during which the apprentice teacher would be under close scrutiny. The fact that pay for beginners is now practically as high as that of experienced educators is held responsible for the entering of the work who are unfit, it is pointed out. The low salary for the apprentices would exclude many of these.

Apprenticeship certificates would be granted at the beginning of the first and second years of experience and if after this the candidate passes the required examinations he would be granted a five-year certificate and be eligible to the regular salary.

Abolition of "general" certificates and adoption of specific certificates would accompany this system.

The club is also working on a plan for certification of teachers based on actual training, experience and ability. This plan, as yet tentatively drawn, would classify teachers according to rank with salary scales accordingly.

The organization is regarded as a leader in education in the west and most of its members are also carrying on independent research projects in the field of education.

Farm Organizations Pool Lime Orders

Farm organizations and individuals in all parts of the state are pooling large orders for lime this summer, according to O. S. Fletcher, county agricultural agent.

The ordering is done through the office of the county agent. Organizations in western Lane county and in the central and southern part are working through their leaders, and individuals who do not belong to organizations may secure the benefits of quantity buying through the county agent, who will arrange for pools.

Mr. Fletcher said. Many individuals have joined in their orders. The state lime plant this year is putting the lime up in paper bags which do not have to be returned as the old containers did, according to Mr. Fletcher. This raises the price 25 cents per ton, but a saving is realized because no deposit is required.

The price of the lime as it leaves Salem is \$5.75 per ton on a basis of a 20 ton car, plus a distributing charge of 25 cents and freight.

Adding the freight charge, the price per ton as it reaches Eugene, Cottage Grove and other valley points is \$6.50. At Junction City and Irving the charge is \$6.45. At all points west of it the cost of rail in Lane county the lime costs \$6.75. The difference in cost in each case is the difference in freight rates, Mr. Fletcher said.

Letters are coming to the office of the county agent daily asking for information regarding the pools, and many communities have expressed a desire to place large orders for lime, according to Mr. Fletcher.

Lightning And Smokers Start Fires In Forest

Federal Foresters Urged Public to Use Care When Camping in Timber.

With 500 to 600 fires started in national forests of Oregon and Washington in the first week in August the fire season is now on. Federal foresters in the Portland office report.

While the large percentage of the August fires thus far were caused by severe lightning storms of August 1 and 2, up to August 1, man-caused fires were two and one-half times as numerous as lightning fires. Smokers had all main causes for their work, permitting, showing an increase over 1928 for the same period, forest service reports show. Up to August 1, a total of 368 forest fires had been reported in the 22 national forests of the North Pacific district, or 288 less than a year ago. This difference is said to be due largely to the delay in opening of the 1929 fire season which is about two weeks later this year than normally.

Beginning August 1, lightning fires have been numerous and destructive especially in Washington, the Chelan, Rainier and Colville forests being the worst hit. Probably 1200 men are now fighting fires in the national forests of Washington alone, the Portland office reports. Oregon's national forests have fared well thus far, it was said, no large fires having occurred, though there have been a large number of lightning set fires.

With the forest areas daily becoming drier and the possibility of other lightning storms, federal foresters urge the public to use the greatest possible care with cigarettes, matches and campfires while in the woods. Conditions are daily becoming critical and every user of the out-of-doors should realize his or her personal responsibility.

UNLICENSED CANINES NO LONGER PREVALENT

Unlicensed dogs in Lane county are not so prevalent now and the new dog control district law is working well. R. J. Morris, employed by the dog control board, reported Friday that approximately 500 dogs have been killed in the county since the board took over control June 4 last.

These dogs are only killed if requested by the owners who do not desire to purchase a license. Up to date 1705 county dog licenses have been issued. The next meeting of the dog control board is scheduled for August 17.

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MAN NARROWLY ESCAPES ELECTROCUTION SUNDAY

Only the fact that the boom of a crane on which he was standing was wood instead of steel saved the life of Horace Onorata, superintendent for Gustina Brothers, when he was electrocuted Sunday about 10 o'clock when he grasped two wires of the Mountain States Power company line to lift them over the crane. He suffered a severe electric shock that knocked him unconscious and sustained painful burns on his hands and an arm.

Gustina Brothers recently purchased a 12x24 two speed donkey engine from Anderson & Midliffe and Onorata was here Sunday to load the machinery for transfer. He secured the services of a crane for loading purposes. In moving the crane the operator, Buster Stroud, believed he lacked clearance of the power company's lines so sent Onorata to investigate. Instead of reporting Onorata tried to lift the wires over and suffered a shock. The two wires coming in contact created a short circuit that tripped the company's circuit breaker, cutting off power for the entire city. The power was off about five minutes.

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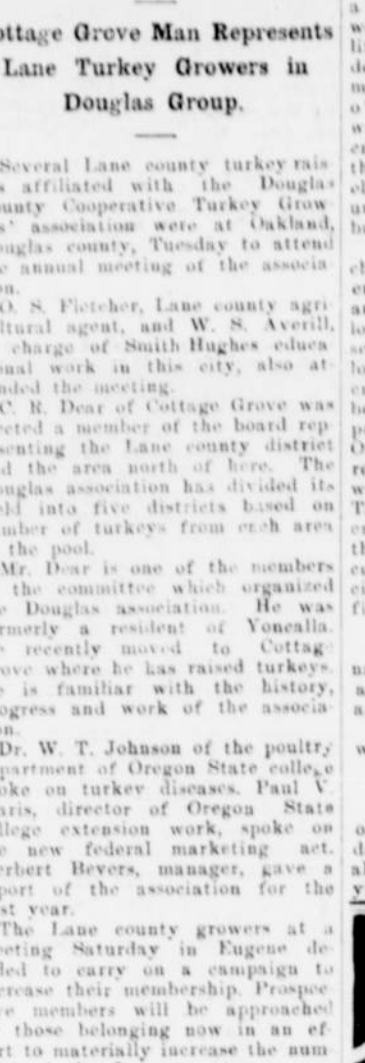

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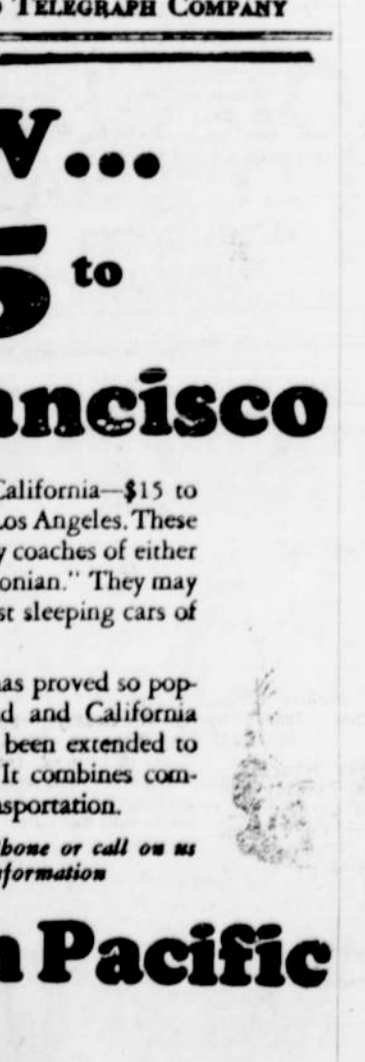
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
