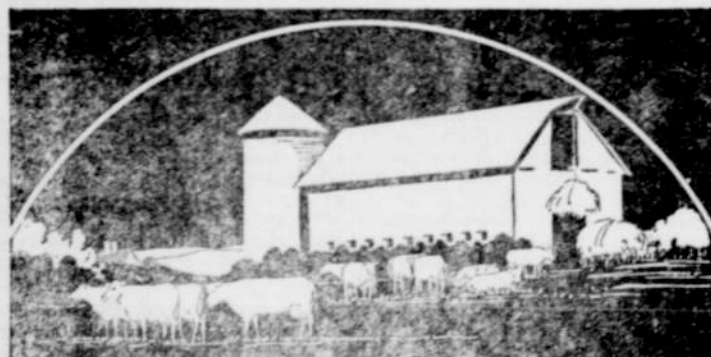

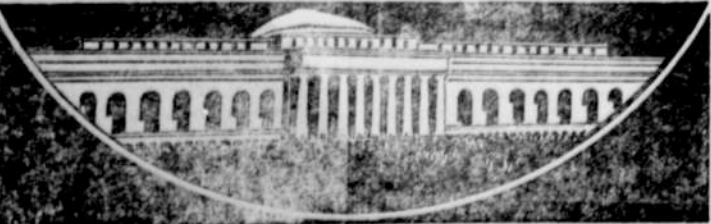

Walter J. Messenger Dies.
Word has been received here of the death of Walter J. Messenger, who died August 20 at his home west of Phoenix. He was a former resident, having lived near Cottage Grove for 11 years. He had been suffering from cancer and had been in poor health for a year. He underwent an operation in Portland in September, 1928, and again in June of this year.

Mr. Messenger was born March 13, 1862 in New York. He came to Ashland in 1883 and resided there until 1910, when he moved to Dorona. He was married in 1892 to Ora E. Praytor of Ashland, who died at the Dorona home in 1918. In 1921 he moved to Medford, where he lived for four years. He then traded city property for a ranch near Phoenix, where he lived until his death.

Surviving relatives include four daughters and a son, Ezra Messenger, Brownboro; Mrs. Edith Mosier, Elwin, Ind.; Esther Messenger, Appleton, Wis.; Mrs. Messenger, Medford; and Evelyn Messenger, who returned to Indiana with her oldest sister. The latter three had been living at the family home up to the death of their father. A brother, H. C. Messenger, Gold Hill, and other relatives also survive.
