Good Grades

Just two more weeks left in this six weeks! Then we will get our report cards. How will they look? Not all of us can be members of the Honor society, for we must make a certain number of good grades each year to be members of that organization, but all have an equal chance to be on the honor roll or to receive honorable mention.
