Agreement Is Reached On Siuslaw Highway

Promise Is Made That Actual Work Will Be Started Sometime in October.

The final draft of the agreement on the Siuslaw highway between the state highway commission, county court and Southern Pacific was signed by Judge Barnard and Commissioner O. E. Crowe for the County Monday and mailed to Portland for signature by the railroad company. It has already been signed by the state highway commission.

The agreement will become a contract as soon as the third party has signed, and the bureau of public roads has assured Judge Barnard that work will be started this month.

Bids will be called for in six sections and also on the entire project. The first work to be done will be making the grades at those portions of the route where the railroad tracks will not be moved. The actual moving of the tracks and reconstruction of the railroad will probably be done by the railroad company, the costs to be borne by the county, state and federal bureau, according to the terms of the agreement.

At a meeting of the state highway department, governor and county officials interested in the Roosevelt highway Saturday, Judge Barnard was assured that funds will be provided for the completion of the Roosevelt Coast highway, 22 miles of which is in Lane county.

Gym Stage to Be Equipped. Work of equipping the stage in the high school gymnasium to permit the staging of plays and other forms of entertainment is scheduled to start immediately. A tentative contract has been entered into with a Portland firm to provide the new equipment and do the work. Financing of the project will be handled with funds raised by various high school organizations, by the grade schools and partly by the school district. A meeting of principals of the several schools and Superintendent D. A. Emerson was held Monday afternoon at which time plans for equipping the stage were discussed.

Fire Fighting Costs \$15,000. Pay checks aggregating about \$15,000 were signed by forest officials this year to fire fighters employed on the western Lane fire fronts, according to Carl V. Oglesby, supervising warden of the Western Lane County Fire Patrol association.

The Cascade office announced that \$3000 would pay for all the firemen used on its fires. The Siuslaw figure has not been announced.

The fire situation is far past the critical point now, but reports from Mr. Oglesby stated that the woods are drying out in the western portion of the county and that some of the fires are smoking again.
