With the winning of the Grand Championship award at the 1928 Pacific International, Herbert Chandler upheld the best traditions of the Chandler name. George Chandler, father of Herbert, former owner and operator of the famous Hereford establishment at Baker, Oregon, was known as the "Grand Old Man" of the livestock industry in the West. Herefords from the Chandler farm will be exhibited at the 19th Annual Pacific International Livestock Exposition, Portland, Oregon, October 26-November 2.

Among the outstanding events announced for the 1929 Exposition are: Pure Bred Livestock Show; Dairy, Manufacturers' and Land Products Shows; Sheep Show; American National Fox Show; National Wool Show; Industrial Exhibition; Boys' and Girls' Club Work Exhibits; Oregon Poultry and Pet Stock Show; Northwest

Hay and Grain Show; Oregon Fish and Game Commission Wild Life Exhibit (including miniature fish hatchery in full operation); Junior Agricultural activities in the new J. C. Penney Hall; and world-renowned Horse Show offering seven evening and three afternoon programs, featuring spectacular Six-Horse Team driving contests each evening. Total premiums for the Exposition will aggregate \$100,000.

Tuesday, October 29th has been designated "Governors' Day". Governor Patterson of Oregon and Governor Hildridge of Idaho expect to attend, as also do other Governors of neighboring states. The Hon. S. F. Tolmie, Prime Minister of British Columbia is also expected to attend accompanied by a number of his official staff.

High School Notes

Honor Society.

The class of 1929 left the sum of \$75 in the student body fund, which they stipulated should be used to form the Honor Society of Cottage Grove high school.

The Honor society was organized last year. It is indeed an honor to belong to this organization. No student can be a member until he is a sophomore. During the freshman year, a total of 24 points must be made by the student to become a member, and this entitles the student to a one-bar pin. During the sophomore year, a total of 29 points must be made, making a total of 53 points, and this entitles the student to a two-bar pin. During the junior year, a total of 30 points must be made, making the total 83 points, and this entitles the student to a torch pin. Then to keep this torch pin, the student must make a total of 20 points during the senior year, making a grand total of 103 points.

The points are distributed as follows: A gives the student five points, B gives three points and C plus gives one point. The semester average is the grade used in awarding points.

Major activities which give the students two points each are: President of student body, secretary student body, president senior class, president junior class, letter in debate, letter in declamation, letter in football, letter in basketball, letter in baseball, letter in track, editor school paper, editor annual, business manager school paper, business manager annual, member of girls' team all star. Minor activities which give one point each are: President freshman class, president sophomore class, vice president senior or junior class, secretary junior or senior class, member of glee club, member of orchestra, member of quartet, vice president student body, manager student body and yell leader.

A male quartet has been chosen from the boys' glee club as follows: Chester Allen and Elmer Allen, tenors, and Elbert Smith and Reed Hemenway, basses.

ADVISORY COMMITTEE ON BUDGET NAMED BY COUNCIL

J. H. Chambers, D. H. Hemenway, A. A. Richmond, Roy Short, George O. Knowles, C. J. Ken and O. E. Woodson were appointed members of the advisory budget committee by the city council Monday night and a meeting of the committee is set for November 12. H. W. Lombard was chosen to do the work on the drafting of a new charter at a total cost of \$500 of which \$250 is to be used before the first of 1930.

The fire and building regulations committee reported an old barn back of the Langston place on north H street to be in an unsafe condition and the council ordered the owners to clean up the premises at once.

S. L. Godard was granted permission to make repairs on the Central hotel building on the provision that the repairs comply with the building code.

The city recorder was ordered to communicate with the Postal Telegraph company relative to a franchise with the city and to whether the company has any right to maintain and repair lines in the city while giving no service.

An ordinance was passed providing for the widening of Main street between Eighth and Ninth streets by cutting two feet from the sidewalk.

The city recorder was instructed to attend a meeting in Salem October 24 at city expense. Invitation to the meeting was issued by Hal Hoss, secretary of state.

LANE BUDGET COMMITTEE WILL BE NAMED BY COURT

Appointment of a county budget board to meet with the county auditor to fix the county budget for the coming year will be made by the county court in the near future, according to Judge C. P. Barnard of the county court.

A committee of three members and the three members of the court will pass on all financial estimates submitted by the various county departments for the coming year.

The board will also outline all other county expenditures for the year. The completed budget after due notice is given will be submitted at the annual taxpayers' meeting to be held in December when all items will be open for a public discussion if so desired by any taxpayers.

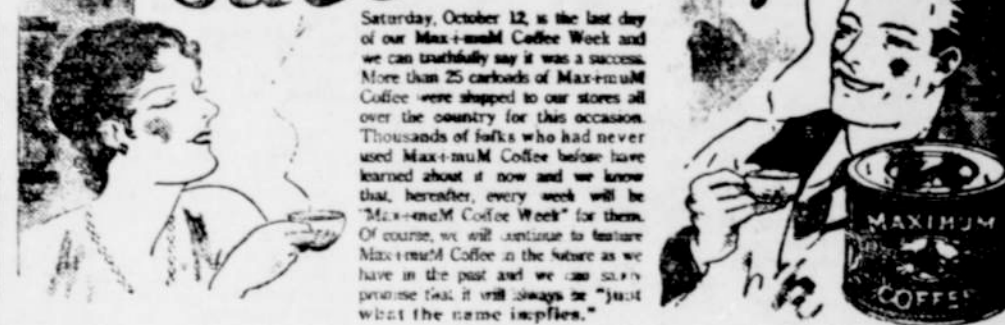
