

High School Notes

Arriving at school Tuesday morning students of our high school and especially the senior class, were very disgusted on finding that some person had painted the numerals of the class of 1930 on the public walk in front of the building.

A senior class meeting was called immediately and the indignant seniors denied any knowledge of the disgraceful affair. They resolved that something must be done and it was with much enthusiasm that they cast a unanimous vote of disapproval of the affair. The following statement was written and presented to the different classes:

"We, the members of the class of 1930, wish to go on record before all the other classes of C. G. high as heartily disapproving of any such lack of cooperation as was shown this morning by the person or persons, unknown, who disgraced the numerals of this class by placing them on the public walk in front of our building."

"In order that we may keep the banner of our class clean and unsullied, we are removing our numerals, at once, from the disgraceful position in which they have been placed."

"We hope that this will be treated by our fellow students in the same spirit in which it has been offered. Signed, Class of '30."

While this paper was being read to the other classes, the senior boys removed the numerals from the public walk.

We may never discover who did this thing which would cast such a slur on the class of '30 in particular and the high school in general, but the seniors wish to show not only the rest of the school, but the whole community that they heartily disapprove of any such disgraceful act and they hope that with the cooperation of the other classes the name of the class of '30 and of the high school may be kept clean and honorable. We sincerely hope that nothing of this character will ever again appear in the Cottage Grove high school.

Awards won by Aaron M. Frank's wonderful string of show ring horses have brought great prestige to Portland. Stuart, owner of Carnation Farm Stables, originally developed his now famous string of show horses for the sole purpose of advancing the interests of Pacific International. As President Emeritus of the Exposition, Mr. Stuart con-

tinues to be one of its most enthusiastic supporters. Needless to say he is very proud of the accomplishments of his two grandsons in the show ring.

prevention Friday morning before the high school student body in an assembly held in observance of fire prevention week. N. E. Glass, chairman of the school board, spoke on the subject of the school budget, and Howard Taylor, Eagle scout, spoke briefly on the relation of the scout movement to the citizenship contest now going on in the high school.

Mr. Arnest brought out the fact that while we, as citizens of the United States, are very well equipped to fight fire, our annual fire losses are very great because we do not take enough pains to prevent fire. Mr. Arnest said that one of the reasons for our carelessness about fire is overinsurance. He stated that during two months \$2,000,000 worth of timber was destroyed by fire in Oregon and Washington. Eighty-one per cent of this was due to the cigarette. He also showed that in the cities which try to teach their citizens to be more careful with fire, the annual fire losses have shown a decided decrease within the last few years. Mr. Glass said that \$50,305 had been put in the school budget for this year, an increase of \$3,000 over last year's budget. This means an average monthly expenditure of about \$4,500. "One-half of the taxes our parents pay go to finance the school," stated Mr. Glass. He complimented the students on the initiative they have shown in going ahead with the project of equipping the gymnasium stage and urged the students to do all they possibly can to keep up the morale and appearance of the high school, and to help the board keep down expenses.

Howard Taylor, Eagle scout and a member of the junior class, in a brief talk showed that the ideals of the scout movement are fundamentally the same as the principles the citizenship contest is instilling in the high school students. Miss Kem, instructor in journalism, announced that Carolyn Grannis won first prize of \$2.50 and Wilbert Wilson won second prize of \$1 in a news writing contest held recently by the Twin Oaks Lumber company in conjunction with its open house October 5. Cecil Arnes made a report on the sale of student body tickets. He said that 32 out of 43 seniors have bought their tickets, 26 out of 52 juniors, 26 out of 77 sophomores, and 20 out of 83 freshmen. Dale Gates described the team's recent trip to North Bend and gave a report of the game played there. Kenneth Ward, captain of the football team, told the prospects for the Albany game, and Bert Kerns, coach, added a few remarks about the football outlook for the year. Both Kenneth and Mr. Kerns emphasized the fact that the local team has "fight" and it is "fight" rather than weight that wins a game. Mr. Kerns stated that the Eugene team this year is considered one of the heaviest in the state. The game with Eugene will be played on Cottage Grove's field.

Carl Scheufele, senior, sustained a sprained shoulder in the football game between Cottage Grove and Albany Friday at Albany. He will be unable to go out for practice for a few nights.

Class projects for the year have been assigned as follows: Seniors, managing senior class play, planning assemblies, fixing paths to the gymnasium, uncovering and covering the typewriters every morning and evening, putting away gymnasium equipment every evening.

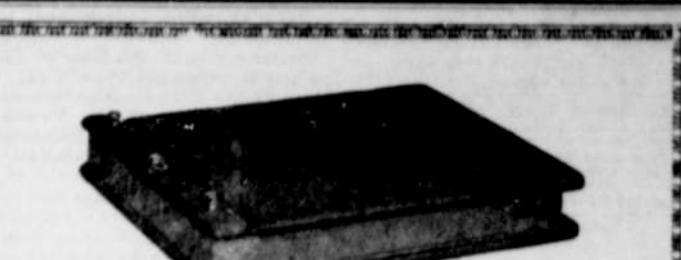
