EXPERIMENT TRAIN CARS CRASH ON S. F. TRACKS

Three oil tank cars in the middle of a long string of 150 cars used in brake testing experiments on the Southern Pacific track buckled shortly after 10 o'clock Friday forenoon about one mile south of Creswell and were thrown across the track. There was some delay in traffic but by 1 p. m. the road had been cleared and through service resumed, according to announcement of the company.

The tank car train north bound was going at only 20 miles an hour when the air brakes were set to avoid striking a section crew. The sudden drag of the brakes buckled the long string of tanks in the middle.

Although the three cars were thrown across the track the rails and ballast were not damaged to any great extent.

RODENT CONTROL REPORT SHOWS 6079 ACRES TREATED

Report on rodent control in Lane county this year on land which was not cared for by the owners but was handled by district supervisors was issued last week by O. S. Fletcher, Lane county agricultural agent.

The report which has been submitted to the county court shows that nine district committees cared for 73 separate tracts of land totaling 6079 acres. Labor hours at 30 cents an hour totaled 2404.

Poisoned barley to the amount of 225 pounds was used at a cost of 10 cents a pound. The total cost of the work was \$142.75, this being at the rate of .62345 cents an acre.

The cost to each owner for the poisoning will be assessed against the property.

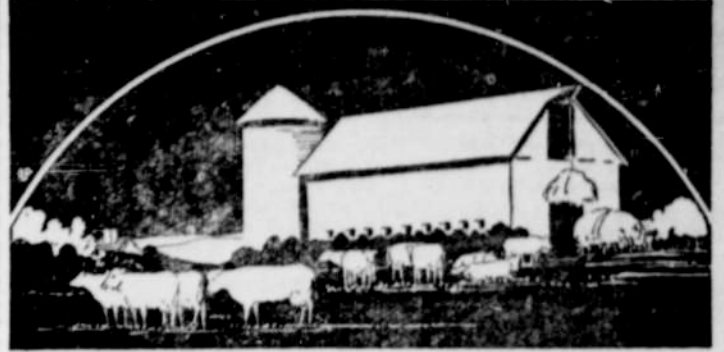
