Durability of Leather
Shown by Recent Find

The durability of leather was proved by the discovery, in the course of excavating for the foundations of the new Bank of England, of soles of Roman shoes, one of which bore clearly the impress of the Roman emperor.

The soles evidently were those of the sandals worn by women and children. Bronze rivets were used to hold together two or three thicknesses of leather and no doubt assisted in part for the life obtained from the footwear, which must have been much greater in weight than present-day shoes.

The old leather was in about the same state of preservation as might be expected of a modern shoe that had been on a rubbish heap for a couple of months.

Although nowadays leather is produced with more speed and less mechanical crudity, the processes of preserving, tanning, and softening it are not materially different from those practiced by the Romans in England about 2,000 years ago.

Horse Racing Popular With Ancient Peoples

The earliest recorded organized trials of speed with horses were the chariot races at the Greek national festivals, of which the most notable were the Olympic games held every fourth year. Greek sculpture frequently represents a horse as used for riding, apparently without a saddle in most cases; but not as so employed for sport, except as an incident to the chariot racing. On the other hand, the horses in the Roman contests were to a very great extent ridden. All the formalities of entering and differentiation of classes and of starting were minutely laid down and followed to the color of the riders' uniforms.

In the earlier times these Roman races were held on the open plain. There has always been a tradition in England that at Salisbury plain, just outside Stonehenge, the remains of a Roman race course exist; and the oldest race which still takes place in England is run over a flat meadow just outside the walls of the Roman city of Chester.—Washington Star.

East Indian Idol Held in Supreme Veneration

The name Jagannath itself is an Anglicized corruption of the Hindu Jagannath, the name of Vishnu or Krishna in one of his manifestations. The name is literally "lord of the world."

It is the name of an idol in the temple at Puri, India. The temple itself is a magnificent one, built in 1198, at a cost of \$2,500,000, while the idol consists of an irregular block of stone, pyramidal in shape, having two large diamonds for eyes.

On its festival days the idol is conveyed to another shrine on a magnificent car, 45 feet high and 35 feet square, having 15 wheels, each 7 feet in diameter. The number of pilgrims who visit the temple was formerly estimated at 1,200,000 a year. At the present day 100,000 or more may assemble there on the great festivals.

Hobenzollern Family
The Hobenzollerns trace their descent right back to Charlemagne, who lived about the beginning of the Ninth century, and built a castle on Zollern hill in the Swabian Alps near Hechingen. From this height his descendants derived their patronymic, a separation took place about 1165 when Frederick IV founded the elder or Swabian, and Conrad III, the younger or Franconian line. The first was subdivided into three branches, the Hohenstaufen, the Habsburgs, and the Sigmaringen. In 1570, from the Emperor Sigmund Frederick VI, of the younger line, received the investiture of the electorate of Brandenburg, in 1415, and founded the dynasty of kings of Prussia, the German emperors that reigned till November, 1918. The branches of the elder line continued unbroken till 1849. Then the resigned prince surrendered their respective rights and principalities to the king of Prussia for annual pensions.—Literary Digest.

Term's Meaning Changed
Originally the term "Salic law" only applied to a certification of the laws of certain Germanic tribes, including the Saxon or Merovingian Franks. These laws were codified in Latin in the early Middle ages. The term, chiefly to property and penalties for various injuries. The term is often applied exclusively to a section which relates to inheritances, and provides that only males inherit property. Since the Fifteenth century a further restriction in application has attached chiefly to those laws, in whatever country found, which forbid female inheritance of the throne.

Few Places Without Bibles

The locusts eaten by John the Baptist were probably not insects, but the fruit of the carob tree, the dried pods of which are the locust beans sold as food for cattle. The carob tree is sometimes called the honey tree, from the sweet pulp contained in its pods while they are fresh.

Nearly Million Persons Visits Forests in 1929

Nearly three million pleasure seekers visited the national forests of Oregon and Washington in 1929, according to a report just issued by the district forester, Portland. The 14 national forests of Oregon attracted 1,837,886 visitors, while the eight national forests of Washington had 1,036,795. The 1929 figures show a decrease of 738,484 from 1928, due it is believed to the prevalence of forest fire. This is shown the direct effect of forest fires on the tourist business.

MotORIZED America is reflected in the fact that 2,551,061 of these forest visitors came by automobile. Railroads and stage lines brought 281,599. There were 25,136 hikers. The remaining 17,434 came by horse or other means of transportation. The figure for visitors and guests at resorts is the only one showing an increase over 1928. Forest of Oregon and Washington are the camping public wants more forest comforts than heretofore.

Preparation of Turkey For Sale to Be Shown

Two demonstrations on killing and dressing turkeys for market will be given in Lane county on Friday by Herbert Beyer, manager of the Douglas County Cooperative Turkey Growers, according to County Agent O. S. Fletcher, who has arranged the demonstration and Grand place of holding the meetings are as follows:

9:30 a. m.—Farm of C. W. Godlove, three miles north of Eugene and about one mile north of the home of Carl Young.

2:00 p. m.—Farm of J. R. Cooley, operated by Chas. R. Dear, about four miles east of Cottage Grove.

In announcing these demonstrations Mr. Fletcher said: "The manner in which a turkey is killed and dressed for market is just as much importance as proper fattening and finishing. A prime bird may be so poorly handled in preparation for market as to throw it into grade No. 2, or even into the cull class. This may mean a difference of as much as ten cents or more a pound, or \$1 to \$2 a bird." These demonstrations are open to the public.

S. P. Test Train Moves.
The test train of the American Railway association which had been conducting braking tests on the Southern Pacific tracks between Eugene and Cottage Grove for four months, left Tuesday for Ashland, where tests will be made on a slightly increased grade between Ashland and Grants Pass.

The tests conducted here were on almost level tracks, the next tests will be made on tracks which for the most part of the distance have a grade of one per cent. Later on, when the present Ashland tests are completed, the test train will switch operations to the south of Ashland and test out the brakes on the mountainous and crooked stretch between there and Hornbrook, Cal., which has a three per cent grade.

The present test is being made at the request of the interstate commerce commission to try out a number of devices proposed to be adopted as standard train braking equipment.
