Plants That Produce

Both Food and Water

In some tropical or subtropical countries there is a regular alternation of wet and dry seasons. There are found plants that grow rapidly during the rainy season, producing leaves, flowers and fruit within a short period. Some of these then die outright with the coming of the dry season, and are started anew from seeds at the return of favorable conditions. Others make the usual growth of leaves, flowers and fruit, and in addition produce bulbs, tubers, rootstocks and fleshy roots underground. By means of food materials, as sugar and starch, and quantities of water stored in these underground structures, such plants keep alive through the dry season, and are enabled to make a very rapid growth when favorable conditions return.

The amount of food materials and water stored in these structures is remarkable. Fleshy roots weighing more than 50 pounds are not unusual with some members of the gourd family. Some members of the morning glory family, as yams or sweet potatoes, reach almost as great size. The cultivated onion furnishes a familiar example of water and food storage in bulbs. As compared with other materials in the plant, the amount of water stored in these structures is amazing. The common potato contains about 80 per cent of water. The roots of carrots, beets or turnips show about an equal percentage. Bulbs, as in the onion; special water storage leaves, as in the ice plant, and stems as in some cactus forms, may show fully 90 per cent water.

Editor Years Ago Took
Fling at Vast Wealth

The concentration of wealth in the United States was looked upon fearfully as far back as 1890. That year the Washington (N. J.) Star made this editorial comment, according to Capper's Weekly:

"Alexander T. Stewart, the merchant prince, clears \$1,000 a day. Sunday excepted, the year round, sometimes Vanderbilt pleads guilty to twice that sum. William B. Astor rises his income at \$4,330 per diem; sleeping or waking, he finds a \$3 bill dropping into his hat every minute of the 24 hours. At every turn cash starts at him like the most insidious manner. Books fling their dividends at his head; ruthless financiers beat him with coupons; unspitting and soulless corporations dump their lucre at his doorstep; and contemptuous bill-stickers plaster his door with greenbacks. One might wonder what he had done to merit such treatment. The only charge that can be brought is that he is a rich man's son and therefore must suffer."

Atlantic Coast Plain

Piedmont plain is a name used in the physiography of the United States to designate the part of the Atlantic coast plain which lies between the Appalachian highland and the low coastal plain proper. It is distinguished from the latter topographically by being more rugged and eroded with deeper river valleys and geologically by consisting of much older and harder rock strata. The change from the hard to the soft and recent formation is marked by a definite line of escarpment over which nearly all the Atlantic rivers fall in rapids or cataraacts, and the line is known as the "Fall Line." The Piedmont plain is less defined in New England than in the southern states. It is narrower and also approaches closest to the sea in New York and broadens southward, being about 300 miles wide in North Carolina.

Bee Keeping in Book Form

The Miller library of the University of Wisconsin has one of the most complete collections in the world relating to bee keeping, both in the shape of books and historic material. This institution has been recently made the recipient of a "skep," a type of beehive which is now only occasionally seen in old pictures. This particular skep or beehive was made on May 28, 1848, the day Wisconsin was declared a state, by D. Danheiser, a Madison beekeeper, who spent that day in making a straw skep in which to quarter a colony of bees, and he kept the bees in it for many years.

Bert Kerna, coach of the local team, reports his team somewhat handicapped by the possible loss of two players, but otherwise the condition of the boys is good. Phillip Hersey, halfback, has been unable to practice with the team this week and will not start the game in the regular lineup. Read Hemenway center, is ill and it is doubtful whether he will make the trip.

Paris Hreedlove, who has been playing an end position, is trying out for quarter and will probably start the game in his new position. According to Coach Kerna the starting lineup will be as follows: Hurd and Shaw, ends; Guggisberg and Chestnut, tackles; Crawford and Brown, guards; Durham, center; Gates and Newton, halfbacks; Ward, fullback; Hreedlove, quarter.

It is expected that some working for places on the team will make the trip.

Several cars of students will be there to support the team and Robert Guggisberg, football manager, and F. L. Granlan, principal, will accompany the team.

Three games remain on this year's schedule, including the Lebanon game. Friday, November 22, the boys play at Springfield and on Thanksgiving day they will meet Independence on the local field. Another Delay Comes

Siuslaw Highway Work

Another snag has been struck in the progress of the Siuslaw highway project which may cause some further delay in letting of a contract for this work, said Clinton Hurd, county commissioner, upon his return from Portland where he has with members of the county court discussed the road job with state and federal bureau officials.

The agreement on track moving as drawn by the Southern Pacific company and accepted by the county court and state highway commission has been returned from the San Francisco offices of the railroad company with some further stipulations concerning moving telegraph lines on the right of way.

These changes will not cause any disagreement but will undoubtedly lead to some further delay before the federal bureau can advertise for bids. Mr. Hurd says. The agreement with the new changes must now be sent to the New York headquarters of the railroad company for final ratification.

There seems very little hope of any actual construction work being started on the Siuslaw highway this year, Mr. Hurd said.

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Value of Turkey Crop

Told at C. of C. Meet

Oakland Mayor Tells of Returns

to Community When Birds

Are Marketed.

Turkey production in connection

with the raising of alfalfa was the principal topic for discussion at the regular monthly meeting of the chamber of commerce Tuesday night, O. S. Fletcher, county agent, J. T. Bridges, mayor and prominent business man of Oakland, and C. R. Dear, farmer east of this city, were the speakers.

Mr. Fletcher, who has been particularly interested in alfalfa raising in the county, was strong in his opinion that this crop is especially adapted to range for turkeys. In comparison with other crops the results are more favorable. Mr. Fletcher stated that last year the equivalent to six carloads of turkeys was shipped from Lane county and a 10 per cent increase is expected this year.

Mr. Bridges spoke of the value of turkey production to a small community. The turkey business of Oakland, he said, brings from \$50
