1930 Beckman Prizes
For Students Announced

The Oregon Historical society has selected "The Admission of Oregon to Statehood" as the subject for the 1930 C. C. Beckman history prizes and medals. The prizes are four in number: First, \$50; second, \$30; third, \$40; fourth, \$30. They will be awarded for the best original essays by girls or boys over 13 years of age and under 18 years of age attending any public or private school, academy, seminary, college, university or other educational institution within the state of Oregon. Each of the four prize winners will receive a handsome bronze medal.

Conditions governing the competition are as follows:
(1) Essays must not exceed 2000 words.
(2) Essays may be handwritten or typewritten, preferably upon paper of commercial letter size, the several sheets to be numbered consecutively and written on one side only with blank space of at least one and one-quarter inches at top and left-hand margins.

(3) Essays must be accompanied by a separate sheet containing the name and postoffice address of the writer, the date of his or her birth, and the name of the school attended.
(4) There shall also be delivered with each essay a certificate signed by a teacher or instructor of the educational institution attended, stating that the writer of the essay is a pupil or student therein.

(5) Essays must be delivered by mail or in person, to the Oregon Historical society, room C, public auditorium, 253 Market street, Portland, Oregon, not later than March 15, 1930.
(6) Essays will be numbered and submitted, without the names of the writers or other identifying marks, to three judges.

(7) Essays will be judged according to their general merit and excellence in style, and the judges will also take into consideration neatness of manuscript, accurate orthography, correct grammar and composition, and purity and clarity of diction.

Publishing Company Incorporated. Articles of incorporation of the Cottage Grove Publishing company were filed with the corporation department and the county clerk's office last week.

The capital stock is \$25,000 and the incorporators are Elbert Bede, Elbert Smith and Olive L. Bede. The incorporation will publish The Sentinel and conduct a general printing and office supply business.
