World's Great Debt to Peruvian Guano Bird

One of the most valuable birds in the world is probably the Peruvian guano bird. It exists in quantities millions in the islands of the coast of Peru and it is stated that some hundred million pounds worth of a fertilizer, 30 times as strong as barnyard manure, have been obtained from one island alone. The deposits there are some two feet thick, and extend over great areas.

Why the birds should be more numerous there than in other parts of the world is not easy to say. It has been explained that a current breeze from the west coast of South America keeping that section cool and hence suited to the habitat of myriads of small fish. By a fortunate coincidence the birds congregate here, and the bare islands in the vicinity form centers where the invaluable fertilizer is deposited in vast level tracts, from whence it may be dug out and transported.

3 South Lane Districts Oppose Special Levies

Mosby Creek Taxpayers Favor Proposal for \$5,810 for New Construction Work.

Three road districts in south Lane voted down special taxes proposed at special meetings held Saturday, while one voted approval.

In No. 15, the Hebron district there were 10 favorable votes and 12 in opposition. Another meeting for reconsideration was being considered but so far has not materialized. A tax of \$2,600 for oiling the main road and \$500 for construction work on the Cedar creek road was proposed.

In No. 69, the Cedars district, the vote was decisive, there being 22 opposed and 10 in favor of a tax of \$1,500 to be divided equally on the Tapp-Overholser and Academy roads.

In No. 14, the Dorena district, 42 voters were opposed to providing \$1628.76 for general maintenance and \$500 for oiling. The decisive adverse vote was attributed to misunderstanding or failure of the county court to specifically state how much of general county funds would be used to match district funds.

The only favorable vote was in No. 76, the Mosby creek district where 22 favorable votes were cast for a tax of \$5,810 for constructing a road from the Row river road to district tool house on the main road, a distance of several miles. Twenty votes were opposed.

Speeder Fights Officer Pays \$50 for His Fun

City Traffic Officer Morgan has been carrying a severely scratched face this week as the result of an altercation with John Walker, whom he arrested Saturday night on a charge of violation of traffic laws and intoxication. The officer reported that Walker was speeding on east main street at a rate of 45 miles and became abusive when the officer handed him a ticket. A fist encounter followed and Walker was placed in jail over Sunday.

On Monday he pleaded guilty to intoxication and paid a fine of \$50. The officer did not know that Walker was intoxicated until the latter became abusive.

The city council, at its meeting Monday night, decided that action should be taken to prefer an additional charge against Walker of operating a car while intoxicated and that the secretary of state be requested to revoke his driver's license.
