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Old English Law Made

Churchgoing Compulsory

Golfers, picnickers, Sunday auto-lets would be out of luck if an old English law were in force today. The act of uniformity, 1532, required:

"All persons, except those dissenting from the worship or doctrine of the Church of England and usually attending some place of worship not belonging to the Church of England, are to have no lawful or reasonable excuse for absence, to endeavor to attend their parish church or accustomed chapel, or, if reasonably prevented, to attend some other place where the divine service of the Church of England is performed, on all Sundays and other days ordained and used to be kept as holy days, and to abide there orderly and soberly during the time of common prayer, preaching or other divine service there performed."

Failure to observe this law renders the offending parishioner or inhabitant of a parish who is not legally exempt from attendance at divine service on Sundays and holy days "liable in proceedings taken against him in the ecclesiastical courts to be censured for the offense, admonished as to its attendance in the future, and to be condemned in the costs of the proceedings."

Come Into the Kitchen

Christmas Cakes.

'Twas the night before Christmas When ever you'd look were stacked ed dirty dishes, Ah—there is the cook! As the same foolish virgins Did tarry of yore; this cook who moans always.

Brought all from the store, in a last minute fluster Was mixing her cake, 'cause hubb' by insisted His wife should bake a grand "Prince of Wales" affair.

Like his mother had done—way back in his boyhood— Oh—ain't we got fun? There—that isn't very elegant we know, but it just expresses our sentiments!

Merry Christmas with never a clean dish in the house, dripping egg beaters, flour from floor to nose of a crabby young cook, and though we don't advise omitting the battered rusty old oven! Is it any wonder the spicy flavors of our grandmother's cake remain only in memory?

One of these nice rainy mornings when the mist is on the hilltops and a gay little breeze made clean by a pattering rain rustles gladly around the house, when Friend Husband won't be home to lunch and garrulous Mrs. Next-Door Neighbor is visiting her step-cousin in Milwaukee—slip into a starched crisp apron, unearth the family cookbook, and go to it. A song in your cake is better than soda, and though we don't advise omitting the latter when it's invited to the cake mixing. Only for goodness' sake—and that of your cake—treat soda as if it were gold and use not a speck over. You will have a yellow mess which is fit only for those with murderous intentions.

Did you ever make a— Prince of Wales Cake? (A worthy tribute to the charming young man.) Cream one-half cup shortening and work into it one cup of brown sugar until the sugar is dissolved and the mixture is velvety smooth. Add gradually two tablespoons of dark molasses, working this in thoroughly, and then beat in the unbeaten yolks of three eggs. Sift into two cups of flour one teaspoon of baking powder, one teaspoon of salt, and one tablespoon of cinnamon. Add one-half cup sour milk by degrees, to the creamed butter, egg yolks, and sugar alternately, with the sifted flour and spices, adding a little of the flour first, and using the milk only when the batter becomes too stiff. Along with the last of the dry ingredients add one cup of chopped, dried raisins, or a mixture of raisins and currants. The fruits may be omitted at your pleasure. Pour into a deep pan, well greased and floured, with oiled paper at the bottom. Bake at 450 degrees (moderate oven) for 45 minutes.

While the first part is cooking, prepare the second part of this cake as follows: Cream one-half cup shortening, and add one cup of granulated sugar. Sift together two cups of pastry flour, 1-8 teaspoon salt and 2 teaspoons baking powder; add this to the first mixture alternately, with one-half a cup of sweet milk, and lastly add 1-8 teaspoon of vanilla and fold in the very stiffly beaten whites of three eggs. When the first part of the cake has baked for three-quarters of an hour, pour the second part over it, and continue baking until this is done. The cake may be covered with any desired frosting, although a plain butter frosting is the best.
