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December Rainfall Is Double Average

Rainfall in December, totaling 13.27 inches, was double the average rainfall of the month, according to C. E. Stewart, cooperative weather observer. The larger percentage of the month's rainfall was concentrated into ten days, the middle of the month and for a time threatened serious flood conditions. There were 7 clear days, 8 partly cloudy and 16 cloudy.

The mean maximum temperature was 50.8 degrees, the mean minimum 37 and the mean 43.9. The maximum temperature was 59 and the minimum 29.
