Toxin Anti-Toxin Serum
Given School ChildrenTreatment to Give Immunity From
Diphtheria; Smallpox Vac-

cination Planned.

Three hundred and sixty-three
pupils were given toxin anti-toxin,
an immunizing serum for diph-

theria, at the health clinic Thursday of last week at the high school. This number included children from the Delight valley and Latham communities as well as children in the local schools. A second treatment is being administered today and the last of the three "shots" will be given next Thursday.

The clinic was in charge of Dr. S. M. Kermon of Eugene, county health officer. Other doctors giving their services were Dr. Harold Axley and Dr. A. W. Kime. The doctors were assisted by Miss Beas Williams, county health nurse, Miss Gavin of Portland, and Mrs. Harold Axley, all trained nurses. Members of the local health group were also in attendance. Dr. Axley cared for a number of children in his office after the clinic room was closed.

Those in charge of the clinic made the announcement that with the last "shot" of toxin anti-toxin vaccination for smallpox would be given at the clinic to the nine days authorities are urging vaccination at this time as a number of the neighboring districts are experiencing epidemics of smallpox.

Silk for Body Sinews

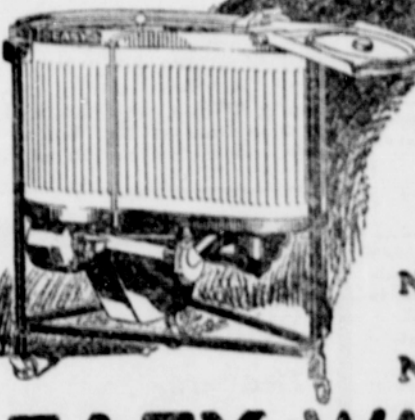
