Four Are Frightfully Crushed in Auto Crash

Southern Pacific Stage Demolishes Small Car; Slippery Paving Is Cause of Accident.

Mr. and Mrs. Robert Fairbairn and Mr. and Mrs. George Brown, all of Lethbridge, Alberta, Canada, were seriously and possibly fatally injured in an automobile crash today at Anlauf, 11 miles south of here, which was due to the slippery condition of the highway. Mrs. Brown is a daughter of the Fairbairns.

One of the men suffered a severed nose, the other broken legs and both women were frightfully bruised and cut and probably injured internally.

The car in which the four were passengers, on their way north, was struck head-on by a Southern Pacific southbound stage and a moment later the scene looked like there had been a carnage. The stage, which was here for first aid, but the condition of the roads was such that they did not reach here for an hour or two after the accident and it was another hour before ambulances arrived to take them to Eugene, another hour's drive.

The Fairbairn car was completely demolished, but the stage was only slightly injured.

The condition of the highway south of here has been serious and after the slush freezes at night travel is almost impossible. A dozen or more pleasure cars, trucks and stages were piled up last night and this morning at both ends of the Divide overhead and it was not until 10 or 11 o'clock this morning that all were released. No one was injured. North of the city probably 50 cars have gone into the ditch at the point where the highway turns into the city. No one has been injured and damage to vehicles has been slight.

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To Keep Human "Motor" in Its Best Condition

Here's a new way of putting some well-known rules of advice, which we believe will appeal to every motorist who thinks as much of himself as he does of his car. They are taken from "The City Health" and ought to be memorized by all people, young and old, who wish to keep fit:

1. Pull your machine up alongside a filling station regularly three times a day and put into it high-test fuel, such as leafy green vegetables, fresh fruit, milk, dark bread and real butter. Do not use substitutes—you wouldn't do it with a limousine. This high-test fuel is remarkable in that it builds up your automobile as well as puts pep in your motor.

2. Run your human automobile into the garage each night for eight hours of rest. Remember to turn on the fan by opening windows and getting plenty of fresh air. This will prevent flat tires.

3. Run your automobile body out the wash rack daily.

4. Keep the chewing apparatus clean. Brush it night and morning.

5. Give your human car plenty of water to prevent a dry radiator.

6. Visit expert mechanics regularly (the doctor once a year and the dentist at least twice a year). They can help you overhaul your machine and replace a little knock in the motor before you even hear it. —Hampshire (Mass.) Gazette.

Three Years Is Given 5 on Burglary Charge

Several of One Family and Son-in-law Implicated in Robbery at McKenzie Home.

Robbing summer homes on the McKenzie may cease to become a favorite outdoor sport if all those found guilty are dealt with as severely as were five who confessed in district court this week to a part in the robbery of the Dearborn home on December 23 and were each sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. The five are Anna Randall, Willard M. Randall, son of Mrs. Randall, Rupert E. Stewart and Albert F. Johnson, who were charged with larceny, and Willard M. Randall, husband of Anna Randall and father of Willard M. Randall, who confessed to concealing the stolen property.

Another son of the Randells, aged 16, pleaded guilty to burglary in the same case and was paroled to the district attorney.

In presenting the case to the court Wednesday, Eugene V. Slatery, deputy prosecutor, said that Mrs. Randall had induced her two sons to take part in the robbery.

Mrs. Randall has five other small children, the youngest two and one-half years of age. Judge Skipworth, before sentencing the Randall woman, asked what plans had been made for care of the little children while she was in the penitentiary. The deputy district attorney said that the Red Cross chapter would supervise their care at the home of another daughter of the Randells.

This daughter is Mrs. Johnson, wife of Albert Johnson, who was sentenced with the others. The Johnsons also have several small children. There was rather a touching scene in the court house lobby when the prisoners were brought out of court and the little Randall children said good-bye to their parents and the Johnson children took leave of their father.

FIELD SECRETARY TO SPEAK AT PRESBYTERIAN SERVICE

Architect, farmer, teacher, speaker are a few of the occupations followed by Miss Lucy Shaffer, field secretary for the Presbyterian board of national missions, who will speak at the Sunday evening services of the Presbyterian church. She is said to be a pleasing, delightful entertainer.

Miss Shaffer has served many years as a missionary. She spent 10 years among the Indians and 14 years in the southern mountains, 11 of these at Dorland-Bell school, Hot Springs, N. C. At this school plant, which includes a 300-acre farm, she learned to know what crops are suitable for certain kinds of soil, how much timber can be cut from a hillside without washing the soil, what kind of cattle are most profitable, what hogs are best, when potatoes should be planted and what sort of fertilizer to use. She also knows about building.

Since 1926 she has been serving as field secretary of the Presbyterian board of national missions, which conducts 727 enterprises with a personnel of 3768 workers.

Dolphin Supreme Among Persecutors of Whales

Those "thresher sharks" of fabulous dimensions are reported from the south coast as fast becoming a formidable rival of the sea serpent and the big gooseberry, writes Looker-on in the London Daily Chronicle. They are fairly common during summer around Cornwall, where they do vast damage to fish and mackerel nets, in which they completely wind themselves, like a caterpillar in his chrysalis. The thresher shark is also called the sea fox, from the remarkable tail which he uses to frighten shoals of fish, and so make them more easily caught. There are sailors' yarns that this whiplike tail is sometimes used for flogging whales to death. But the real persecutor of the whale is the gladiator dolphin or sword grampus (Dolpinum gladiator), a very carnivorous fellow, who kills and eats whales, seals, and even his brother porpoises.

Contrasting Inaugurations

Franklin Pierce, who took office in 1853, is said to have been the first President to deliver his inaugural address without notes. His voice was remarkably clear and he roused great enthusiasm by his handsome appearance, dignified bearing and unusual powers of oratory.

Jackson, whose induction into high office in 1829 was attended by some of the wildest scenes in inauguration-day history, delivered an inaugural that stands as one of the briefest on record. It took him only a few minutes to read it.

Chinese Quasi-Disappearing

Many Chinese still wear the pigtail, although since the establishment of the republic the number to retain this style of dressing the hair has diminished rapidly. In 1944 when the Tartar or Manchurians began to reign in China the people were compelled to shave the forehead and adopt the queue as a symbol of submission and loyalty to their new masters. At first the people resented the imposition, but opposition to it soon died out and the queue became the most characteristic and cherished feature of the national dress.

Over-Painted Bell

Much of the slang indulged in by seamen dates back to the Elizabethan period. In a little book entitled "Sea Slang," Frank Bowen traces the origin of many of these quaint terms. A seaman whose home port is Glasgow is a "bolled bell," a term of mild ridicule. The reference is to a traditional bell presented to Fort Glasgow, in which the sailors living there took such pride that they painted it so much it would not ring. They then had to bolt the paint off.—Detroit News.

Mathematics

The science of mathematics is very ancient and was first recorded by the Egyptians. It is found among ancient Chinese, Hindus and Babylonians. Of the mathematical papyri, the most elaborate is that transcribed by Ahmes, about 1700 B. C., from one written probably some six or eight centuries earlier. This real beginning of mathematics, however, is to be found in Greece, particularly in the works of Thales, Pythagoras, Hippocrates and Euclid.

Martyr to Science

Dr. Auguste Marie of the Pasteur Institute died in a search for a serum which would annihilate the bacillus botulinus which produces the fatal disease known as botulism. While experimenting, his left eye was touched by a drop of liquid containing bacilli botulinus. Knowing that he was doomed, he set about recording a complete story of the progress of the disease. Within a fortnight after the accident, in his laboratory he dictated the last word. He was posthumously awarded the Medaille d'Honneur des Epidemies, as a victim of devotion to the cause of humanity.
