CARE OF COUNTY'S POOR IS SAID TO BE HIGH

Care of the poor in Lane county is becoming a serious problem owing to the increasing demand for assistance, according to Judge C. P. Barnard of the county court. Bills for hospital care for patients who are county charges are increasing at an alarming rate, the judge says.
The county is charged \$18 a week for each patient, this being double what was paid several years ago. That the court should be called upon to consider establishment of a county hospital for needy cases where charges would be less, is the view held by Judge Barnard.
There have been recently a number of families that are termed professional beggars. One family which applied for relief last week is said to have recently stepped in two other counties and obtained supplies which they sold. One at which the judge spoke was the automobile of the family and sent them out of town. Lane county authorities were warned of this family.

Wyaln Birthplace of Father of Locomotive

At Wyaln, on the north bank of the River Tyne, under the auspices of the Institution of Shipbuilders and Mechanical Engineers, a tablet commemorates the birthplace of a man who achieved the seemingly impossible, George Stephenson, the father of the steam locomotive engine. Past the front of his cottage, with a few yards of the door, heavily laden and light trails of coal trucks pass today, as did the tiny chaldron wagons drawn by horses along plateways 150 years ago. The cottage itself is a two-story house, typical of many of those built years ago by the colliery owners for their employees. It was divided into four rooms, in each of which a different family dwelt. The lower room at the western side of the cottage was the home of the Stephenson family, and it was in this room, which served for sleeping, eating and shelter, that George, the second son of a family of four boys and two girls, was born on June 9, 1781. "Old Bob," George Stephenson's father, was a Scotsman who crossed the border as a gentleman's servant, and then married a local lassie, Mabel Carr, the daughter of a dyer. "Bob" found work as fireman of the pumping engine of the Wyaln colliery at 12 shillings (\$3) per week.—Edinburgh Scotsman.

Found He Had Financed Small "Deal" in Rabbit

Some Saturdays ago a small boy asked his father for a quarter to buy a rabbit. On being satisfied that a but was being fixed up in which to keep the rabbit, and being also a believer in the civilizing influence on boys of keeping pets, dad gave him a quarter.

Model California Bridge

A seven-mile bridge now spans the San Francisco bay from San Mateo to Hayward of sufficient width to accommodate three lanes of traffic. The bridge is the longest of its kind in the world and was constructed at a cost of \$7,500,000. It is a two-level type and is practically a complete highway. It is designed for use at night as much as by day, for mounted on top of the concrete bridge railing, about 200 feet apart in staggered formation are 177 incandescent street lighting units. Several miles of concrete highway at either end of the bridge have also been lighted by the same highway-lighting units.

Spruce Spikes as Rivals

"Nais, non," the other shrugged. "But he they pay five francs for the recovery of a body."—Sporting and Dramatic News.

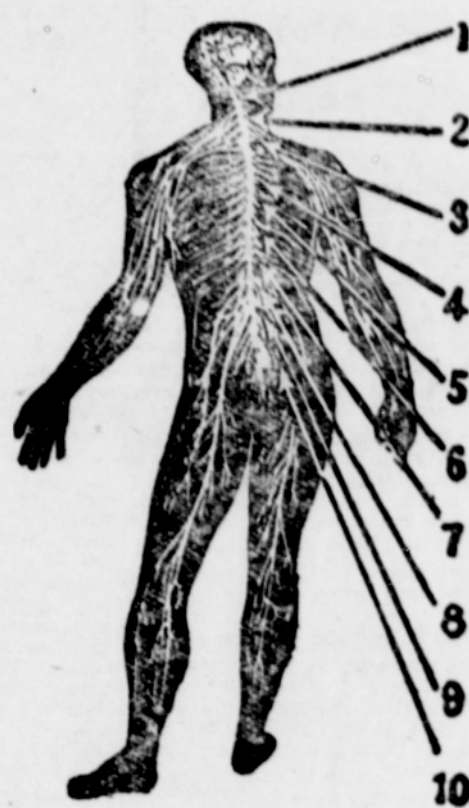
Steps Train for Eight Cents

Turkey Hen Hatches Brood in Snow

A turkey hen whose mother instincts caused her to brave snowdrifts to hatch out her offspring in the State of Washington, was setting time in April or May, was successful in hatching out four downy turkeys during the week-end at the farm of Allen Richmond, Blanton heights, five miles southwest of Eugene.
The turkey hen, which had hidden away her nest on the ground in a pasture, in a protected spot near two small bushes, was discovered two days before the hatchling time by Mr. Richmond, who had seen her feeding by herself near the fence. Several miles of some scrub oaks in the pasture, and in that way found the nest with nine eggs in it.
Despite the fact that the weather was down to zero at times, the turkey hen sat on her eggs, with snow banked around her. Mr. Richmond, who made periodical trips to the pasture, reached the nest in time to rescue the brood of four infant turkeys from the cold and drifts.

Tieup Lumber Industry May Prove Blessing

While the tieup of lumber production in Lane county, which has 45 to 50 per cent of the production of the Willamette valley, has caused considerable inconvenience to employees, yet it is said there is a silver lining in the cloud for the reason that curtailment of production has been forced and this is likely to result in better prices and greater activity in the industry later. The tieup has come at a time when demand is the lowest, and the tieup eliminates danger of overproduction during that period.

Oiling Lane Roads Described.

Lane county is in the forefront among Oregon counties in road oiling and a detailed report on what has been accomplished here and what success has been attained was made by Clinton Hurd, county commissioner, at a meeting in Portland last week of county judges and commissioners of Oregon. Commissioner Hurd explained the methods followed in oiling 50 miles of road last year at a cost of \$30,049.85, including purchase of equipment at nearly \$7000.
