First Steam Carriage Met With Disapproval

The London Times reprints the following from its issue of August 5, 1829: A Gurney's steam carriage arrived on Monday, at the Cranford Bridge inn, from an experimental tour to and from Bath. The success of this trial exceeds the most sanguine friends of the invention.

Mr. Gurney, his brother, Colonel Viney, Captain Dobbin, and assistants started from Cranford bridge about 4 a. m. They proceeded at a most rapid rate to Bath, which they reached, notwithstanding two or three delays, in about an hour and five minutes—a distance of nearly fifteen miles. After this proof of their capability of speed, they traveled by the most direct route to return.

Practical considerations induced them not to light their fire until they had passed the place of their late annoyance. They then lighted, and amidst the most provoking delays in securing supplies of water, coke, and charcoal, came the last 84 miles in about 12 hours, thus giving the proof experimental of the capacity of using steam carriages on our ordinary roads.

No Positive Knowledge of Waterspout's Causes

Waterspouts are masses of vapor suspended in the lower layers of the atmosphere which they traverse, and endowed with a gyratory, or spinning motion, rapid enough to uproot trees, upset houses and break and destroy everything with which they come in contact. When they take place at sea they present a curious phenomenon. The water is disturbed and rises in the form of an inverted cone. Two cones unite and form a continuous column from the sea to the clouds. These are called waterspouts. The origin is not positively known. One assumption is that they are due principally to two opposing winds which pass by the side of each other, or to a very high wind which prevails in the higher regions of the atmosphere. Another theory ascribes waterspouts to an electric origin.

Evening Parade of Crawfish

Shellfish have their peculiarities. From the crawfish that hold a goosetep march at sundown to the crab that decorates himself with all sorts of undersea life. Looking down into clear depths at sunset, where the crawfish are abundant, one may be lucky enough to see the crawfish parade in their ridiculous, solemn fashion, their goggle eyes peering about and their long, stilted legs going up and down.

The procession is single file, the nose of one crawfish close to the tail of the one ahead. Whether it is a concerted walk for the evening meal, for exercise, or the sort of crawfish evening ritual, it is impossible to tell.

French Judicial System

The ordinary judicial system of France consists of two classes of courts—civil and criminal courts, similar to those in other countries, and special courts including those dealing only with purely commercial cases. In addition there are administrative courts, dealing with cases that come through acts of the administration; also the Tribunal des Conflits, whose function is to decide which is the proper tribunal when an administrative and a judicial court both claim or both refuse to deal with a given case. There is also the Juge de Paix, similar to the American justices of the peace and the Court of Assize; also the Cour de Cassation, which is the highest tribunal.

Original "Sweet Alice"?

Ghosts of a dead romance hover about the knoll near Tazewell, Va., where Olivia Wynne lies buried. For it is believed that she was the "Sweet Alice" of the immortal poem, "Ben Bolt," writes Joseph Leslie in a Norfolk (Va.) paper. There is no one living, of course, who remembers Olivia Wynne. She lived in the day of the pioneers, and her home was comparatively remote from the centers of population. There has been handed down a story which pictures her as tall and slender, brown-haired and dark eyed and beautiful. She lived her long life sheltered from the world.

Potter Becomes Aspirant For State Senatorship

E. O. Potter, three times representative from Lane county in the state legislature, will be a candidate for the senate in the republican primary May 19.

The decision of Judge Potter to enter the contest for a seat in the senate confirms the forecasts of party leaders that he would consent to run for this office if Senator Edward F. Bailey should not be a candidate for reelection.

The only other aspirant for the republican nomination for state senator is H. C. Wheeler of Pleasant Hill, who announced his intentions some time ago. Wheeler has served three terms in the house and was a senate candidate in the republican primary of 1926 but lost to J. S. Maglady, who later was defeated by Senator Bailey.

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COURT STOPS HEAVY USE OF SOFT COUNTY ROADS

Closing of all county roads to trucks and heavy hauling was ordered Tuesday by the county court. The order will hold during the thaw and until the roads settle.

The soft condition of roads permits heavily loaded trucks to rut them deeply, and to forestall a heavy maintenance bill from this source the order was made.

Boy Scouts Plan Demonstration.

As part of celebration of boy scout anniversary week, which will come in February, boy scouts of the city are making preparations to give demonstrations of scout work before service clubs of the city. It is probable that demonstrations will also be given before schools of the city. Knot tying, first aid and signaling will be included in the demonstrations.

Welfare Organization Has Balance.

A check of funds of the community welfare organization showed a cash balance on hand December 31, 1929, of \$146.65. Part of the cash was a balance from 1929 and part was from the 1930 community chest fund drive. The budget for 1930 welfare work is \$1300.

Groat Observes Anniversary.

Rev. E. G. Groat, pioneer pastor of several central states, as well as of Oregon, is observing his ninety-fourth birthday anniversary today. Mr. Groat has been able to leave his home but little in recent years and during inclement weather is not able to get out at all. He remains vigorous and alert of mind and greatly enjoys visits with friends.

Reduction of Hazards Urged.

George M. Eakin of the state industrial accident commission spoke briefly at the Tuesday noon luncheon of the chamber of commerce on the educational campaign being conducted by the commission having for its object lessening of hazards in the industries of the state. In this campaign both employers and employees are urged to reduce hazards.

Boys Working Fines Go on Strike

Four lads who were helping clean snow out of gutters Tuesday and Wednesday and were in this way paying fines which they owed the city, went on strike Wednesday forenoon, the reason given being that they didn't like the way they were being bossed. When the lads refused to work they were given berths in the city jail.

A session of the police committee was held last night, at which time it was learned that two of the lads were minors. They were to have been turned over to the county juvenile officer today, but their fines were paid and they were released.

The two who are over age decided to resume work on the streets.

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Toxin-Anti-Toxin Treatment Given.

About 400 children of the Cottage Grove schools were given the third and final "shot" of toxin-anti-toxin, diphtheria immunizing serum, at a health clinic held last Thursday. Dr. S. M. Kerron of Eugene, county health officer, assisted by Dr. Harold Axley and Dr. C. E. Frost, local physicians, administered the serum. Miss Bessie Williams, county health nurse, and members of the Cottage Grove health group assisted the physicians. Dr. Kerron also vaccinated 100 pupils for smallpox.

Mrs. Wilbur Owned House.

In a news item last week it was stated that a home on south river road, destroyed by fire, was owned by Mrs. Boggis. The owner of the home was Mrs. Wilbur, and it was rented to H. N. Allen. There was no insurance, and as the rent was Mrs. Wilbur's principal source of income she feels the loss severely. Cause of the fire remains unknown.

Uncle Sam's Islands

The Philippine Islands were ceded to the United States by the treaty of Paris, December 10, 1898, following the Spanish-American war. By the terms of this treaty the United States paid to Spain \$20,000,000 in connection with the relinquishment of all claims to the Philippines, Porto Rico and Guam, and under a later treaty of November 7, 1900, a further payment of \$100,000 was made to Spain for the cession to the United States of further islands of the Philippine archipelago.
