Children of Important Fathers Have Hard Lot

Children of particularly successful parents are discouraged. Their own conflict, mainly unconscious, devours them. All of them perhaps could be happy if they did not seek always to be like their father. Goethe, in his old age, has uttered some illuminating words on this problem: "There are people who are excellent in every way and besides so lovable that every one likes to be as they are. But this is impossible because the gifts of these people are so unusual, like a Mozart or a Raphael. One does not mention how many good boys ruined themselves because they could not equal their models." Because of modesty, or perhaps because of grief over his own son, Goethe did not comment upon the fact that he himself was one of those lovable and particularly gifted natures who burned up everything that came along their path.

Many Old-World Firms Centuries in Business

Although the United States may lay claim to having more modern industries than any other country, it certainly cannot compete in length of life of manufacturing companies with the Old World.

Any firm here which is thirty or forty years old is considered unusually long established, and examples of longer life are few, says the Wall Street Journal.

In Germany, however, there are two hardware firms which made horseshoes for George Washington's Continental army and have been in existence more than 200 years. There is a large chain manufacturing concern in Germany which has carried on under the same name for more than 400 years. But the granddaddy of them all is the copper producing business of Mansfeld Kupfer, A. G., which has borne that title for about 700 years.

Trout Egg Industry

The raising of goldfish is an important industry, and a goldfish farm exists in Mendocino, Calif. Trout farming is still another phase of aquaculture. The demand for the eggs for stock raising and private waters, says Nature Magazine, is sufficient to attract considerable investment in the venture, annual sales of trout eggs being estimated at about \$200,000. In addition, surplus fish are sold for food at fancy prices.

Emerson and Lombard Debate Wheeler Law

That there is merit to some features of the Wheeler law, under which Lane county operates, was admitted by Superintendent D. A. Emerson in a debate at the Lions club luncheon today in which he took a position in opposition to this law, and that the Wheeler law may have some defects was admitted by H. W. Lombard, who took the other side of the question and favored the Wheeler law.

Whether Lane county shall continue to operate under the Wheeler law or return to the high school tuition law has become an issue of importance throughout the county.

Superintendent Emerson pointed out that 24 high school districts of the county have 2,483 pupils; that 13 of these, with an enrollment of 1,908, are losing money under the law, while 11, with an enrollment of 425, are gaining; that various districts of the county have assessed valuations per census child ranging from \$1,356 to \$42,965; that school levies run from nothing in districts gaining under the Wheeler law, to 31.5 mills in one district that loses under the Wheeler law; that the median tax levy in districts that are losing is 16.5 mills and that in districts that are gaining it is 9.4 mills; that 13 districts lose \$25,246, while 11 districts gain \$6,579; that of 494 pupils of the county attending school outside districts, 469 attend in districts that are losing money and 25 attend in districts that are gaining; that of 295 high school pupils in the Cottage Grove district, which is an increase of 20 over last year; that if the increase continues in the same ratio a two-mill additional levy will be necessary; that a wealthy district near Cottage Grove has only 20 pupils of high school age, for which it could well afford to pay the entire cost of education, while seven of these attend in Cottage Grove, and the district receives much less than cost; that the tendency is more and more toward the larger high schools and changing conditions demand changes in the method of paying for education.

Mr. Lombard referred to varying costs in various districts and pointed out that under the tuition law the district taking outside pupils would be restricted in the amount it could make education would be to add to the cost; that no tax suits the person who has to pay it; that the Wheeler law is fundamentally more sound than the tuition law; that money should be tuition law; that money should be tuition law; that money should be tuition law.

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
