Ireland forever.

'Tis believed that the harp which is waked now for thee.

It seems most fitting that St. Patrick's day should come in March—for the happy and Irish who smile through their tears—it just fits.

Let's plan a party replete with good luck shamrocks to honor the plucky Irish and their patron saint.

So many enchanting favors, table decorations, bridge scores, and the like I've seen that all sorts of possibilities unfold for St. Patrick's partying. Perhaps you'll like this: Shamrock Luncheon.

This idea may be used for one's most intimate group of friends or for the club luncheon. With a few more "frens" it'll make a delightful St. Patrick's dinner. Naturally, the table, or tables, bedecked in the snowiest of linens or lacey luncheon sets, have as the main decoration, the shamrocks of Ireland. The centerpiece—ah, here's where your originality flaunts forth.

Perhaps you'd like to use a tiny pig attached to a green cart full of clovers, or a Killarney castle in miniature surrounded by a clover-leaf lawn. A big Irish potato, dressed up to represent a cottage and set in a bed of clover leaves and a small Irish doll with a bit of green hair, or a wee Irish cow, may stand at the entrance. Little flower pots with gumdrop clover leaves are attractive favors. Shamrock cutouts with a tiny candle make attractive favor place cards. Under the service plate may be a small envelope sealed with a clover leaf, containing a good luck verse for the guests.

For the menu, may we suggest?

Shamrock salad, tiny sandwiches, spinach and chicken casserole on toast, shamrocks, Irish baked potatoes, pickles, celery, cabbage relish, shamrock biscuits, Irish iceberg, little cakes.

Remove stems from large green peppers, cut in halves and remove seeds. Cream together soft cream cheese; season with a bit of mustard and salt. Add one-half tablespoon cream and one dozen stuffed olives chopped fine. Fill peppers with this mixture. Chill. With sharp knives cut across to make very thin slices. Arrange on bed of lettuce leaves, four to a portion. Serve with French dressing or a bit of mayonnaise which has been made with two tablespoons of condensed milk instead of the egg or egg yolks. This gives a white mayonnaise.

Tiny sandwiches of white spread with butter to which has been added chopped parsley or lobster and mayonnaise should be served with the salad. This being on the table when the guests are seated, adds to the appearance of the table, serving as part of the decoration.

Trappers Face Court Action.

About 40 per cent of the trappers of Lane county are facing arrest and possible fine or imprisonment for failure to make reports to the state game commissioner or for trapping without a license. Rodney Roach, deputy state game warden, said Monday.

Roach received a list Monday from Harold Clifford, state game warden, naming 209 trappers subject to arrest. All but 19 were charged with failure to make required reports of the amount of fur-bearing animals trapped. The 19 were charged with hunting without licenses.

Roach said he would start immediately arresting those named in the list. Both charges carry fines ranging from \$25 to \$500 or imprisonment from 30 days to six months.

C. of C. to Help Sell Timber.

Cooperation offered by the chamber of commerce in the sale of timber on the city's west side reservoir was accepted by the city Monday night. It is understood that several persons are prospective bidders and the city engineer was instructed to have the timber cruised at an early date. Any money received from such sale would be used to reduce the indebtedness of the water department.
