Spring Tonics.

How do you take your spring tonic? We know you need it—do you combat it with a wry face, a hasty swallow, and a dark brown taste in your mouth? Or—do you greet it joyously by delving into a golden crusted rhubarb cobbler or taking another helping of that fluffy baked spinach soufflé?

Far be it from us to knock the drug store trade but there is more pep-up energy in a bottle of milk than in those pink pellets from the druggists' shelf—more red corpuscles from that casserole of gaily tinted carrots than in that iron concoction you swallow after every meal! And spinach—poor abused spinach—can put more glorious color in midday's face than those diminutive boxes of color dabbed on with a puff. You know—"The contents of a cooking pot can make complexion beautiful—or not."

Have you noticed those long red stalks of rhubarb in the store windows? I know—"the family simply won't eat rhubarb." Don't tell them it's rhubarb—rich in a vitamin but a better teeth and mineral that makes red blood? You can lead a horse to water, but you cannot make him drink—unless of course, you put salt in his oats!

There's a method to your madness when you serve

Surprise Rhubarb Pie.
1½ cups fresh rhubarb, cut in very small pieces, 1 cup sugar, scant, 2 tablespoons cream or milk, 2 egg yolks (white for meringue), 2 tablespoons flour.

Mix all together, cook in double boiler until fairly thick. Fill baked pastry shell. Cover with meringue made by whipping the two egg whites, add 2 tablespoons sugar. Brown in slow oven 300 degrees for about 15 minutes.

To coax the jaded appetite try

Glorified Spinach En Casserole.
Thoroughly wash 2 pounds spinach and in the water that clings to the leaves cook until tender. Chop fine or grind. Have ready—cooked ½ pound of macaroni and 2 cups grated or finely sliced cheese. Arrange these in layers in the order given, using one half of each ingredient in each layer, then repeat. Cover the top with buttered crumbs and bake 40 minutes at 350 degrees (a moderate oven). Garnish with slices of hard cooked egg and sliced tomatoes.

Because the sire is mated to a large number of females, the selection of the sire is of great importance.

to a marked degree the type we want in the offspring and the propensity to fix that type.

The sire of greatest value is not the one that sires a few exceptional animals. It is the one whose offspring are all above the average.

The sire should be pure bred but not a pure bred with a yellow streak. A sire may have a fancy pedigree, yet be a scrub individual, a poorly shaped and partially, or wholly, impotent.

A "pedigree" and a certificate of registration are valuable only when they come with a useful sire, only when they show that he had useful ancestors, bred by honest men.

A pure-bred sire may be of good type, may have good ancestors; may be prepotent, but he can not improve out stock unless his offspring have good feed and good care.

Don't brand yourself as a scrub man by refusing to improve your livestock, or by failure to improve it when you try.

The scrub must go.

Butcher the scrub sire, whether he is a scrub individual or is of scrub breeding.

Keep only the best females. Cut out scrub feeding.

Let's begin now to swim upstream.
