## Age Necessary to Give Proverbs Full Flavor

Among the best known old sayings are those dealing with sour grapes, looking the gift horse in the mouth, the prophet honored elsewhere than at home, haste and waste, honesty and policy. One might say, indeed, that there are no such things as new proverbs since, like wine, they are in need of age to make them worth while. The very definition of a proverb: "A short, sententious phrase, long current in common speech," shows that age is necessary to produce the lasting flavor.

In Sterne's "Sentimental Journey" occurs one of the most beautiful phrases in the English language, "God tempers the wind to the shorn lamb." But it was not original with Sterne nor does the Bible have it. The phrase was picked up by a writer, George Herbert, about 1640 and was quoted by him from a sixteenth century proverb of the French, who, in turn got it still farther back from some Latin writer. The Latin, again, may have brought it down from Turkish or oriental sources as these are rich in ancient proverbs.

Every old nation has a wealth of proverbial sayings, one Spanish alone collecting 24,000. Spain, it is believed, possesses the largest store, though the Arabs, the Persians, the Indians, the Chinese and the Japanese also have unlimited quantities.—Cleveland Plain Dealer.

## Malay Quick to Resent Hurt to Personal Pride

Personal pride and the emotion of love are the most frequent causes of murder in the Philippines, leading strangers to conclude that life is lightly held and murder is committed over mere trifles. The current police calendar would confirm that opinion. Over love, an oriental schoolgirl stabbed her classmate, another girl, to death with 46 wounds—veritably cutting her body to pieces, and the juvenile murderers seemed scarcely perturbed when arrested, confessing all. Over personal pride a peasant slew a household, four persons, man, wife, and their two children, with his bolo. Given to drinking, he was making a drunkard's boastful headway past the house. The police, thinking to shame him, scolded him from the window overlooking the street, and called him "un borrachin," a common drunkard. Less than five minutes later he had wiped out the family. A Malay is never to be safely insulted in the presence or hearing of third parties.

## Magna Charta

King John affixed his seal to the document called the Magna Charta on June 15, 1215, having been compelled to do so by the barons and their followers. In June of that year both parties encamped on the plain called Runnymede, on the banks of the Thames, near Windsor, and conferences were opened between the king and the barons. The barons presented their grievances and the means of redress. In the nature of bills offered for the royal assent. The king directed that these articles should be reduced to the form of a charter, and in this form it was drawn up by the clerks, in Latin. Many of its provisions were based on a previous charter granted by King Henry I in the year 1100.

## Asbestos Peril

Although asbestos has been used in industry at least since 400 B. C., only within recent years has it been recognized that asbestos dust can produce disease in the lungs. Asbestos is a mineral of a curious fibrous structure. It is used in making gas mantles, furnace linings, heat resisting mats, and so on, and is largely handled by women. The inhalation of dust gives rise to symptoms in some of the workers after about five years. They begin to get short of breath on exertion, lose weight and develop a dry cough. If the cases are seen early and prevented from being irritated by dust, much relief can be obtained by treatment.

## Many Ex-Presidents

Between March 4, 1901, when Abraham Lincoln took oath as President, and January 13, 1902, when John Tyler died, there were five living ex-Presidents of the United States, a greater number than at any other period in American history. They were Martin Van Buren, John Tyler, Millard Fillmore, Franklin Pierce and James Buchanan. The great number of living ex-Presidents at that period was due largely to the fact that no President elected between the election of Van Buren in 1836 and the election of Lincoln in 1860 served for a longer period than four years.

## Transparent Gem

Hiddelite is a green, transparent variety of spodumene used as a gem stone. A well-marked prismatic cleavage renders the mineral rather difficult to cut. Its color passes from an emerald green to a greenish yellow and is often unevenly distributed through the stone, which shows much fire when properly cut. Hiddelite was originally found as loose crystals in the soil, but was afterward worked in a vein of stone where it occurred in association with quartz, garnet and other minerals.

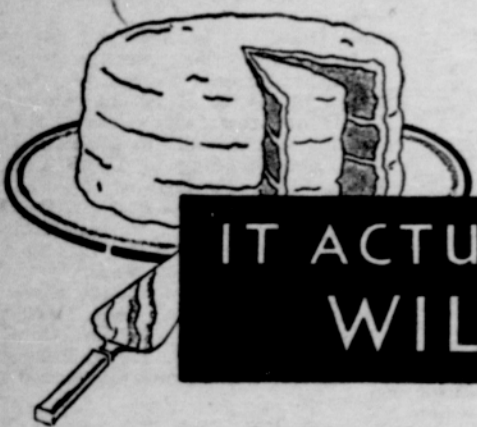
