SPRAY DATA FOR SCAB ARE GIVEN BY INSPECTOR

County Fruit Inspector C. E. Stewart on Monday announced a spray program for apple and pear scab. It follows:

No. 1. Lime-sulphur solution, 2% to 3 gallons to 100 gallons of water. Apply when leaves are 1/4 to 1/2 inch long around the blossom clusters.

No. 2. Lime-sulphur solution, 2 gallons to 100 gallons of water. Apply just before blossoms open.

No. 3. Lime-sulphur solution, 2 gallons plus 2 pounds of lead arsenate to 100 gallons of water. Apply when three-fourths of petals have fallen.

No. 4. Lime-sulphur solution, 2 gallons to 100 gallons of water. Apply 15 days after No. 3.

For aphids on apples add nicotine sulphate 1/4 pounds to 100 gallons of water before putting in the lime-sulphur in No. 2.

To prevent foliage injury when using lime-sulphur solution add one pound iron sulphate (copperas) to each 100 gallons of water.

To prevent russeting of the fruit of pears such as D'Anjou, Comice, etc., use calcium monosulphide at rate of 10 to 12 pounds to 100 gallons of water instead of lime-sulphur solution after spray No. 1.

Local Papers Great Help to County Agents

The county agent can secure no greater assistance than that which will be cheerfully and gladly rendered by the editors of his local papers.

In these days when we are called upon to solve many serious problems of reconstruction, the duty and responsibility which rest upon the county agent are much greater than in normal times. More than ever before he should try to render every service possible to the people of his community. More than any other agricultural worker, the county agent is familiar with the needs and the possibilities of his community. He knows the climatic conditions, the soil conditions, the market conditions. He knows the various problems that confront the farmers of his county.

He is in a position to know how each of these problems has been successfully solved by one or another of the farmers in his locality, and he can render no greater service than to see that every other farmer profits by the experience.

In short, he should secure as

much practical information as possible and he should make every effort to place this information in every farm home. This can be most quickly and most thoroughly accomplished by making use of the columns of his local papers. It would take him several months to visit every farm in the average county; it would take several days to even telephone to every farmer, but the local papers reach every farmer in a few hours.

When hog cholera or some other animal disease breaks out in the community, the local press offers an immediate means of sounding a note of warning to farmers and for furnishing such advice and counsel as may be necessary.

The need of harvesting seed corn before it freezes; of properly storing it and testing it; the wisdom of treating oats for smut; the best way of combating insect pests; the care of farm machinery—these, and scores of other matters, can be presented through the local papers in a manner that will make the articles of great importance both to the readers and to the papers.

NOTICE.

Whereas in chapter 137, general laws of Oregon, enacted 1919, it is declared to be the duty of every person, firm, partnership, company and corporation, owning, leasing, possessing or having charge of or dominion over any land, place, building, structure, wharf, pier or dock which is infested with ground squirrels and other noxious rodents or predatory animals, or as soon as the presence of the same shall come to his, their or its knowledge, at once to proceed and to continue in good faith to exterminate and destroy such rodents by poisoning, trapping or other appropriate and effective means;

WHEREAS gray digger ground squirrels (Citellus douglasii) are noxious rodents to Lane county, Oregon;

And whereas, all of such persons, firms, partnerships, companies and corporations owning or having dominion over land in said Lane county, Oregon, are hereby required to take steps to exterminate said gray digger ground squirrels (Citellus douglasii) and the cost of said extermination will be levied against said lands;

THE county agricultural agent hereby designates Monday, March 31, as a day to be known as "quilled poisoning day";

and it is hereby recommended that poisoned baits be prepared by the undersigned and representatives of the Bureau of Biological Survey of the United States Department of Agriculture, be used for the purpose of such extermination. Such poisoned baits may be secured from the undersigned at his office in Eugene, Lane county, Oregon, at approximately the cost of preparation.
