Census Enumerators Are on the Job Here

Work of taking the fifteenth decennial census of the United States in Cottage Grove was started Wednesday by Mrs. A. L. Wynne and Mrs. Florence Mayes, enumerators for this city. It started at the same time throughout the entire United States.

Census taking today is vastly different from census taking in 1790, the year the first census was taken, and includes much more than ascertaining the population of the

several states. The present day census includes unemployment, agriculture, irrigation, drainage, manufactures, mining and distribution. Statistics of agriculture, manufactures and mining have been collected in every decennial census since and including that of 1840. A census of manufactures is now taken every two years and a census of agriculture every five years. The subject of irrigation, which is a branch of agriculture, was added to the list of census inquiries in 1880, while drainage was first covered in the census of 1920.

Distribution is a new subject included for the first time in the present census and may be described briefly as a census of trade, undertaken to obtain statistics of goods sold by merchants and dealers, wholesale and retail, and of the number of persons employed in trade.

The local census takers have asked the cooperation of residents of the city. A long list of questions has been prepared for each person to answer and familiarity with these questions will help speed up the census work.
