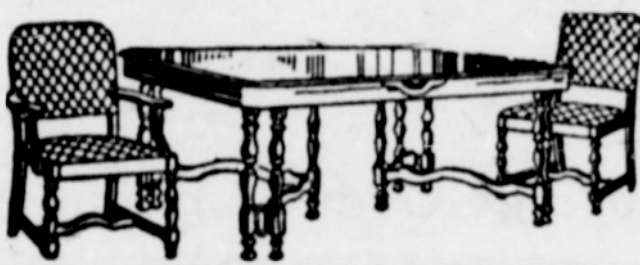

Come Into the Kitchen

Love a 'la Kitchenette.
(Dedicated to the Pooh Wolklin Gal.)
Home—with a sink full of dishes—home—and an empty cupboard—home—revolving around a can opener and delicatessen cartons! How—I ask you—can love and romance do aught but fly out the window?

After a day of pounding out monotonous typewriter songs or taking reams of hectic dictation in unintelligible hieroglyphics with your head wreathed in halos of tobacco smoke—to come home to that!

If we'd only put the same sort of efficiency into our kitchens that we have in our offices! Yes—and Romance! "Ye Sign of the Grinning Goddess" tearful would go broke and funeral faced dyspeptics would be as rare as the dodo bird.

Cooking by absent treatment—made possible by time and temperature controlled ranges—allows us to come home to a complete meal—oven cooked—besides adding variety to the daily massacre of the menu.

Sparing for doughnuts in this vale of tears should teach us the value of a schedule—and planning ahead. A half hour and a cook book will bring about the evolution of such meals that friend hubby (if such you possess) actually forgets all thoughts of home and mother while your own palate fairly wages its tail in anticipation of such gustatory joy!

A Sunday roast provides a background for half a week's dinner. If plans are laid for stuffed peppers, meat pies and the backbone of our race—good old American hash.

Vegetables may be cooked ahead and find their last resting place in salads. A hearty salad, incidentally—flanked by toasted sandwiches of cheese, egg or what-have-you, and fruit or a huge wedge of gingerbread topped with a fluffy cloud of whipped cream (amount depending upon the degree of insulation of one's framework), is like a splash of stars on the lake or the sound of a flute on a still moonlight night in comparison with the meals of usual hash-house origin—assuming of course that your champagne taste carries only a soda pop income!

Gelatin desserts or salads for the next night may be made while the coffee perks—and serve as a most accommodating extension for the left overs fearfully housed in the cupboard.

An emergency shelf is a downright good idea—social scallions break the straight edge of life you know and after all, the unexpected guest is usually the most welcome—if there's a can o' crab in the cupboard.

There is no need, however, to resort to cans of vegetables, when you see the beauty of the vegetable stands these days. They fairly talk up at you.

Tired feet, tired hands, and tired brains are not conducive to a cheerful dinner—yet, since this is usually the hearty meal of a business woman's day, it can, without planning ahead, be the bugbear of her existence. Hence the dinner should be free from attempts at elaboration—with simple menus, quickly and easily prepared.

May we offer some dinner menus which show how with a bit of planning—there's a bit of time for rest, a bit for recreation and a bit more for needed sleep.

Sunday—Fruit cup, slice of ham baked in milk, string beans, stuffed baked potatoes, pickled pears, cherry pie, coffee. (All in the oven meal.)

Monday—Ham omelet (leftover ham), combination salad (using tomatoes, cucumbers, left over string beans and lettuce), butter scotch pie (shell baked day before).

Tuesday—Broiled hamburger steak with spanish sauce, brussels sprouts, boiled potatoes, lettuce salad, caramel nut tapoca pudding.

Wednesday—Meat loaf, creamed potatoes (leftover while cooking Tuesday dinner), sliced tomato salad, canned peaches, lightning cake.

Thursday—Broiled pork chops and apple rings, creamed cauliflower, lettuce salad with russian dressing, leftover lightning cake with hot lemon sauce.

Friday—Shrimp salad (with cold boiled potatoes and cauliflower, celery, pimiento—everything but the kitchen sink), toasted cheese sandwiches, lemon jello with whipped cream.

Saturday—Breaded veal chops, mashed potatoes, gravy, stuffed tomato salad with cucumbers, hot gingerbread—waffled.

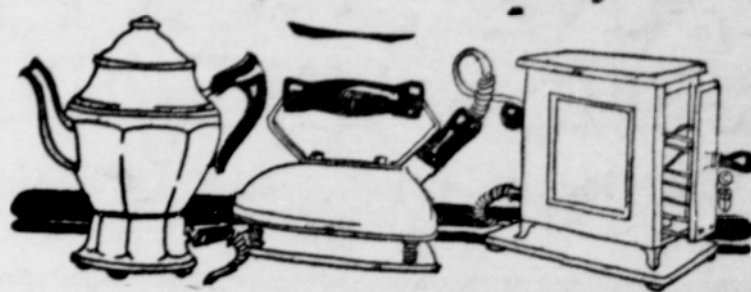
