Frank Geer Bruises Leg.

Frank Geer, employed in hauling logs from the old Rouse mill above London, suffered a severely sprained and bruised left leg Friday evening when a log rolled over him. He was using horses and skid rolls in moving the logs and due to rain the road was slippery, causing the logs to gain too much speed. In endeavoring to keep out of the way Mr. Geer slipped and fell, the log passing over his leg. He was treated by a local physician and is recovering satisfactorily.

Grecian Influence on**Culture of Old Rome**

Almost as far back as the history of Rome extends Greek influences are to be traced in the development of Roman culture. The Romans, people of conservative and slow to cultivate the artistic sense, Rome had little creative genius. In her whole history she did not produce an artist such as Phidias and Praxiteles. The nature of the Roman was unusually practical and idealized power, law and profit. The Romans never created a distinctive style of architecture such as the Greeks. They borrowed their architecture from the Etruscans and the Greeks. The literary life of Rome has a profound effect upon mankind—Cicero with his orations, political and educational treatises; Caesar with his commentaries on the Gallic war; Sallust with his history of Rome; the poets Lucretius and Catullus. These poets, however, do not compare with the Iliad and Odyssey of Homer, the Greek philosophers Plato and Aristotle, Socrates, Xenophon and the orators Lylys and Isocrates.

American Ice Sheets

In North America three ice sheets have been identified. The Labradorian in the northeast had its center in northern Quebec, whence it spread in every direction to the south. Its flow covered most of eastern Canada and reached as far as New York and Cincinnati. The Keewatin sheet, radiating from an area of low ground to the west of the Hudson bay, on the one hand came into confuence with the Labradorian sheet, and on the other hand met the third sheet. The Cordilleran diverges from an axis southwest of the Rocky mountains and in its full development may have come in contact with the Keewatin. In the southwest it reached Vancouver and the Pacific ocean. The driftless area of Wisconsin, 300 miles within the lobate front of the Keewatin and the Labradorian sheets, was left untouched. Just why this area escaped is by no means clear.

Sound Was the Same

"Scandinavian" Peoples

The Swedish elements in Finland are also generally included.

Lumber Orders Reported**Slightly Over Production**

PORTLAND, April 8.—A favorable lessening in the margin between supply and demand is shown in the weekly survey of the West Coast Lumbermen's association made public today.

A slight decrease in production and an increase in new business was shown by reports from 213 mills in the Douglas fir region of Oregon, Washington and British Columbia for the week ending March 29, the association said.

Operating at about 40 per cent capacity, 302 mills reporting to the association produced 9 per cent

more lumber during the first 13 weeks of 1930 than during the comparable period of last year.

Orders reported by the 213 mills for the week ending March 29 increased approximately 3,000,000 feet over new business in the week ending March 22.

Domestic cargo orders fluctuated and were about 11,000,000 feet more during the week ending March 29 than the preceding week.

Export orders also showed an increase of approximately 4,000,000 feet.

Round-the-World Cyclist Visits. Harold W. Salsberry of East Liverpool, O., 25, a round-the-world cyclist, visited here briefly Friday while on his way to California. He has traveled approximately 19,500 miles by bicycle, including a trip around the world and three trips

across the United States. He uses a specially constructed bicycle, capable of carrying a load of more than 400 pounds. He is a photographer by trade and took up cycling for his health.
