Baccalaureate Address

"Degrees mean nothing unless in attaining them the pupil so masters the subjects leading to such degrees that he can put them to use," Rev. L. G. Shaw said in his masterful sermon, "Education and Its Aim," delivered Sunday night to the graduating class of 40. "Mastery of a subject is not sufficient to warrant the cost and effort of education. The knowledge becomes useful only through experience in which that which has been learned is used. The aim of education is to give pupils that which they can use. If the students do not make use of that which has been given them, their degrees will count for naught.

"The pupil grows to the stature of his teachers. By the pupils we may judge the stature of teachers," said the speaker. He congratulated upon having teachers who have been able to give us such a graduating class as we have this year.

The processional, "O, Come All Ye Faithful," was played by Miss Virginia Hunt, music teacher of the high school, who also directed the boys' and girls' glee clubs, who gave two numbers. Scripture reading and the benediction were given by Rev. L. H. Randle of the Baptist church, Rev. D. P. Cameron of the Presbyterian church and Rev. C. P. Johnson of the Methodist church, both of whom were on the program, were out of the city.

The church was crowded to overflowing and 100 or more were turned away.

Eighth Street Picked For Army Location

Committee Is Embarrassed by Objections to Location of State Building.

A location for the army, so far as the local committee is concerned, was settled Monday night when the so-called Lockwood property, the half block on Eighth street between Whiteaker and Gibbs avenues, was selected.

The choice was between three properties, the Cruson property, the Seventh Street-Washington avenue property and the Lockwood property. The first ballot stood three for the Cruson property, two for the Seventh Street-Washington avenue property and three for the Lockwood property. On the second ballot, with the Seventh Street-Washington avenue property eliminated, the vote was three for the Cruson property and five for the Lockwood property.

S. S. George Tells Aims Of American Legion

Glowing Tribute to Mothers of Men Is Paid by Commander of American Legion.

The aims and purposes of the American Legion were graphically described before the community men's class at the Arcade theater Sunday forenoon by S. S. George, state head of the organization. He said that members of the American Legion, which includes veterans of all nations that participated with the allies in the World war, have played a great part in the world's work since the Legion came into existence following the close of the great conflict. He spoke of members of the organization that are playing big parts in the rehabilitation of war-torn countries of Europe, where things happened that members of the Legion would rather forget than keep alive through their continual recounting. "But," he said, "those who are now paying physically the price of the war, comradeship which binds the organization together as no other organization is bound, and he paid a glowing tribute to the mothers of men who, in many ways, suffer more than those who face shot and shell.

Following his address Mr. George was a guest of honor at a dinner at which a dozen members of the Legion were present.

Nine Car Dairy Special To Visit Eugene June 3

Farmers of County Are to Be Guests at Free Lunch Served at Noon.

An all Lane county free dairy lunch, a special dairy meeting and inspection of the nine-car dairy demonstration train which is touring western Oregon are the three main features of the big dairy day at Eugene Tuesday, June 3. Farmers of the entire county are invited. Serving of the free lunch will start at 12:30 at the armory. A program will start at the armory at 1:30. Winners of the dairy poster and essay contest sponsored by the Lane County Dairyman's association and the chamber of commerce will be awarded. There will also be an address on dairying by an Oregon State agricultural college specialist.

The nine-car dairy demonstration train is scheduled to arrive at 2:30. Eugene will be the first of 15 stops and a special dedication program has been arranged. Governor A. W. Norblad, Marshall Dana, associate editor of the Oregon Journal, and Paul V. Marie, director of extension service at Oregon State college, will take part in the dedication program.

This will be followed by platform demonstration from the special free car stage in which P. M. Brandt, head of dairy department at state college, will show by means of cattle carried on the train the results to be obtained through the use of good sires in herd improvement. Following this demonstration the visitors will inspect the train. The first of the four cars will show crops and methods of getting economical feeds. Pastures, legumes and succulents will be emphasized. Better management is the theme of the second car, which will show the value of economical seed herds, better breeding and disease control. The third car deals with sanitation methods in marketing and increased consumption.

Alfalfa Acreage Is Increasing.

Alfalfa acreage in Lane county is increasing gradually. O. S. Fletcher, Lane county agent, reports. It is expected that 1500 acres will be planted this year, as compared with 1000 last year. The crop is successful on bottom and second bottom land and good results have been obtained by farmers in this vicinity.

A Large number of farmers are planting alfalfa seed culture through the county agent's office.

It is necessary to inoculate the seed before the crop can be grown successfully. Mr. Fletcher says.

Gertrude Skow Is Injured.

Miss Gertrude Skow, county home demonstration agent, was injured when her car ran into a telephone pole on Pacific highway at West Springfield Friday morning.

Miss Skow was driving south on her way to a point near Loran, where she was to give a demonstration. In avoiding striking another car she ran hers into the pole.

She sustained a cut on her chin and was somewhat injured on her limbs and body. The car was badly damaged.

Statue of Paul Bunyan May Advertise Lumber

Junction of Pacific and McKenzie Highways Is Site Proposed for Exhibit.

Keen interest in the proposal to some day erect the statue designed by Oliver Laurence Barrett of "Paul Bunyan and His Blue Ox," in the triangular section of land near the new Springfield bridge was shown Friday night by the Willamette Valley Lumbermen's association, at their meeting in Eugene. Mr. Barrett, who was present and briefly described the project, is a sculptor of the university art school staff. In his youth he worked around sawmills and logging camps and heard the Paul Bunyan tales. His model, which has won high praise from art critics in the east as well as in this part of the country, was recently completed and was shown in Eugene for the first time.

The statue depicts the famous Paul standing by the side of "Babe" his blue ox. Both are massive figures, expressing the great strength of the legendary duo. The work has the true spirit of the logger and lumberman, while maintaining its artistry in every way, critics say.

The site considered, which is at the junction of the McKenzie and Pacific highways, is held to be ideal for such a monument. All travelers going north or south over either highway would be sure to see and remember it, and in a short time it is believed it would come to symbolize the lumber industry, so important to the state.

A committee at Springfield is already working on the project.

Local Students Winners Dairy Products Contest

Russell Jones of Saginaw, student in Cottage Grove high school, won first prize in division 1 (Cottage Grove and Eugene) for senior high schools in the dairy products essay contest. It was announced last week by Miss Gertrude Skow, county home demonstration agent. The contest was sponsored by the Lane county dairyman's association and was part of a county-wide campaign to increase the use of dairy products through school education.

Local winners in division 1 (Cottage Grove and Eugene) for junior high schools follow: Gail Lindstrom, second; Beulah F. Chapman, fourth; Margaret Wilson, fifth. Prizes in the senior high school section ranged from \$10 down to \$1; in the junior high section from \$5 down to \$1; in the poster contest from \$5 down to \$1. Nine prize winners were named in each section. No posters were entered from Cottage Grove.

In the poster and essay contest for division 2 (schools outside of Cottage Grove and Eugene), Vernon England of Walker won first prize in the poster contest for students in first to sixth grades. Other local prize winners were: Winnie Earl, Walker, second; Gladys Walker, Walker, third; Robert Sears, Walker, seventh; Grace Hohman, district 19, ninth.

The general adult county-wide essay contest deadline has been extended from May 24 to May 31. Miss Skow announced, in order that the contests shall terminate with Lane County Dairy day. Adult essays are to interpret the values of dairy products to the community and to the subject from an economic or health standpoint or from both. Three prizes, \$15, \$10 and \$5, have been offered.

Population of County Reaches Total 54,464

Lane county's population is 54,464, showing an increase of 56.6 per cent in the past decade. The Lane population in 1920 was 26,166. The county has 4088 farms.

These reports were announced Friday at district federal census headquarters, Eugene. The increase of 56.6 per cent is considered to be a gratifying gain and practically all communities of the county benefit, as the increase is distributed widely in all of the 120 election precincts which are the units for the census taking.

Linn county's population increased from 24,500 to 24,681. There are 3090 farms in that county.

Stream Pollution Is Discussed.

Pollution of the Willamette river was discussed by the Professional Engineers of Oregon at their annual meeting at Oregon State college, Corvallis, Friday.

Willamette pollution was not found so bad as sometimes painted, it was indicated by Prof. Mockmore, who gave the results of a survey on the subject. A real problem exists, however, the report said, and the situation must be further studied.

Silk Creek Work to Start.

Harmon & Little, who have the contract for constructing a new channel for Silk creek as a part of the work of changing the location of the north Loran road, expect to start work at once. The new channel, to take several bends out of the creek, will be 2000 feet in length and dirt from the excavation will be used in the road work.

Mills of Vicinity Join In Production Regulation

Woodard Mill Down Until July; Bohemia Down Saturday; Chambers Still Goes.

Mills of this section are joining in the movement in which 90 per cent of the fir mills of Oregon and Washington have agreed to a radical production regulation program. The program calls for mills operating two shifts to cut to one shift, and mills operating six days to cut to five days. W. A. Woodard of the W. A. Woodard Lumber company, was a member of the committee which met at Seattle last week and decided upon this program.

The W. A. Woodard Lumber company's plants shut down at once and will be shut completely until the Fourth of July, when their quota of reduction will have been completed and they will resume on a six-day schedule.

The J. H. Chambers & Son mill will close down entirely for an indefinite period as soon as orders on hand are cleaned up, but Mr. Chambers did not know definitely yesterday what date that would be.

The Bohemia Lumber company, which always closes for a period during the summer months, will close Saturday night to remain down probably until fall.

It is believed the general production regulation will quickly affect prices and that by the end of the year the industry will be better off than if full operations had continued.

SURVEY OF WILLAMETTE RIVER BELIEVED PROBABLE

A survey of the Willamette river with a view to providing a navigable channel to Eugene seems assured by adoption of Senator Charles L. McNary's amendment to the rivers and harbors bill.

The amendment calls for an appropriation of \$50,000 for the survey, which would be made by federal engineers. Deepening the channel would make possible barge transportation between Eugene and Portland.

Leave of Absence Asked.

Rev. Charles P. Johnson, pastor of the Methodist church here, has requested a year's leave of absence. He has been pastor here for a year and has been in the service of the church for 28 years. The church allows a year's leave of absence when a minister has been in the work ten years. This is Rev. Johnson's first request. Rev. and Mrs. Johnson will spend the year in rest and travel, preparatory to accepting another pastorate.

Evangelistic Meeting to Start.

Evangelistic services will be conducted in the Presbyterian church from June 8 to June 15 by E. J. Bulgin, Ph.D., of Portland. He will be assisted by Professor F. Carlton Booth, tenor soloist. There will also be musical numbers by the church choir, by members of the choir. Dr. Bulgin is a noted agnostic lawyer who took up evangelism several years ago. Professor Booth has been a vocal teacher in Seattle for several years.

Lead Crystal to Resume.

Operations on the Lead Crystal mining claims in the Bohemia district will resume about June 1, according to word received from P. J. Jennings and son, George Jennings, who write that they will return to Cottage Grove June 1. The Jennings have been in Portland, Washington and Baker recently in the interests of the Lead Crystal Mining company, on whose property a rich strike was recently made.

Lane County Fills Prison.

Figures given out at the state penitentiary last week show that Lane county stood second highest in the list of counties sending prisoners to the penal institution. This county has 78 prisoners, while Multnomah with 235 heads the list. Umatilla is third with 68.

Leona Mill Completely Destroyed by Flames

Volunteer Firemen Are Successful In Saving Residence Section of Community.

LEONA, Or., May 26.—(Special.)—A fire of unknown origin completely destroyed the Beebe mill early Sunday morning. There was a wind from the north which held the flames away from other buildings which volunteer firemen were able to save despite the fact that the mill structure burned fiercely. The entire residence district was saved, as well as lumber piled on a portion of the docks, the cook house, and the residence of Roy Beebe, operator of the mill. A car of ties and a car of lumber, loaded for shipment, were destroyed, also an unestimated amount of lumber on the portion of the docks that were destroyed. The docks were dynamited to stop the advancing flames.

The flames were discovered shortly after midnight Saturday. Calls were sent to nearby communities for fire equipment, but none was available that could have arrived in time to be of assistance. The flames lighting the skies attracted curious ones from as far away as Eugene. Many of those arriving from outside communities assisted in fighting the blaze. The flames were under control by daybreak, although it was necessary to patrol the smoldering ruins Sunday and keep a smoldering fire in the conveyor under control to prevent a spark from carrying sparks to the residence district. It was considered remarkable that a bucket brigade could save as much property as remained.

The community was largely supported by the sawmilling enterprise and there is a belief that a modern mill will replace the destroyed one. While the mill was operated by Roy Beebe, the plant and timber with which it was operated were owned in large part by outside persons.

Cars Reduced to Junk; Five Escape Injuries

Five persons miraculously escaped injury at 9:30 last night in an auto crash in which five cars were reduced to junk. A car driven by W. C. Findlay, advertising manager for the Oregon State Motor association, traveling north, had just passed the steel bridge north of the city when a coupe driven by Charles Hatfield of this city, who had another boy and two girls as passengers, approached. Findlay, who assumed blame for the accident, applied his brakes as the other car approached and his car swerved directly in front of the Hatfield car. The five persons crawled from the wreck without a scratch, although the cars were hardly worth hauling off the highway. When asked about carrying four passengers in a coupe, Hatfield said that one of the passengers was standing on the running board despite a heavy downpour of rain.

Three School Directors To Be Named by Voters

Although three directors to serve three years are to be elected at the annual school election to be held June 16, there are as yet no candidates for the positions. The law requires that nominating petitions be filed seven days before the date for election. The law requires that petitions be signed by 3 per cent of the number voting at the last school election. Ten names on a petition will secure the election of the directors whose terms expire are Clem Sarff, H. B. Griggs and C. A. Beidler. It is generally understood that, while none of these is a seeker for reelection, each would accept the steel bridge. No other candidates have yet been mentioned.

The fact that they had to travel 20 miles every day to take these lessons and that they had to complete a very rigid course and take an examination before certified examiners is a credit tribute to the type of young folk you have in your city.
