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JOSEPH'S DISBARMENT.

By order of the supreme court of the state of Oregon George Joseph, republican nominee for governor of the state of Oregon, and Thomas Mannix, Portland attorney, are disbarred for life from the practice of law in the state of Oregon.

In expressions of opinion concerning the proceedings to disbar these two lawyers, an important fact has been overlooked. Although the proceedings against Joseph resulted from his malfeasance of two members of our supreme court, proceedings against him by Joseph, in other words the disbarment proceedings that resulted in the disbarment of both were started by the two involved in the proceedings.

The supreme court would have failed to perform its duty had it not arranged for trial of the charges which Joseph and Mannix had brought against each other. There was nothing else for it to do.

Inasmuch as two members of the supreme court were involved in the charges, the supreme court very properly selected three district judges, who were as nearly disinterested as anyone could be, to review the charges and make recommendations to the supreme court.

The findings of these three judges, made after careful consideration, were for disbarment of the two attorneys.

In consideration of the findings of the special committee of three district judges, the two members of the supreme court involved in the proceedings, did not sit. The findings of the supreme court were made by the remaining members of the court, and again the decision was unanimous for disbarment, with one judge dissenting merely as to length of time for which disbarment should be effective.

Either the charges brought against Joseph and Mannix by each other, were true or they were not true. If they were true, that is, in the case of Joseph, if he had maliciously attacked members of the supreme court and had made charges injurious to the character of two judges that had no basis on fact, any fair-minded person who has followed the case and is familiar with the charges which he made, will say that he should be disbarred.

Three impartial circuit judges, one of them our own Judge Skipworth of Lane county, say he is guilty of making defamatory statements having no basis on fact. Five members of the supreme court have upheld the findings of the three district judges.

Now, the supreme court, which was in no way responsible for the actions against Joseph and Mannix, did the only thing it could do under Oregon law. It arranged for a fair hearing of the charges. After what we believe to have been a fair hearing, the charges brought by Mannix and Joseph against each other are found to be such as to warrant disbarment.

If we are not to agree with his decision, we must say that the three district judges who heard the charges were grossly unfair to the defendants, we must say that the five supreme court judges who upheld the findings of the special committee were grossly unfair. If we say three district judges and five supreme court judges were unfair, we must also say that they are not fit to sit on the bench. What are those who say that Joseph only

exercised the right of free speech going to say about that?

Here's another angle. Justice Rand, one of those attacked by Joseph, running for reelection, was chosen by a large majority, despite the bitter opposition of Joseph, who employed every means within his power to spread poison against the justice. The people who voted Rand back onto the bench couldn't have believed the charges made against him. Yet the people have since nominated for governor the one who made the malicious charges which the people did not believe when Rand was a candidate.

To show a spirit of absolute fairness, the supreme court decision gives Joseph the opportunity to be reinstated upon retrial of the charges against the two judges, charges which three district court judges, including our own Judge Skipworth, have found to have no basis upon fact. In fact, Joseph made almost no effort before the special tribunal to prove his statements. He relied almost entirely upon the right of free speech to say anything he chose against members of the highest tribunal of the state.

If the charges were untrue, as we must believe if we believe three of our most highly respected district court judges and five of our most highly respected supreme court judges, the least that Joseph can do for his friends, the least he can do to right the wrong he has done, the least he can do for himself, the least he can do for the public that has been misled, is to publicly retract the charges which we must believe were honestly found to be false, defamatory and malicious.

SCRATCHING BACKS.

The western delegation, with Congressman Hawley as their leader, were not able to hold a lumber schedule in the new tariff bill. Even Congressman Hawley's proposal to take a 75-cent tariff was rejected. The tariff on lumber could not be won on its merits.

But it takes votes to pass a tariff bill, and eastern beneficiaries of high tariff rates on their products feared they would not have sufficient votes to put over the bill.

So a tariff on lumber, a higher one than Congressman Hawley offered to accept when he tried to save lumber from defeat, has been selected, not on its merits, but because western votes are needed.

This back scratching is not the best of outdoor sports, but if a lumber tariff is finally enacted through this method we shall have more respect for the method than we have heretofore had.

History Parent-Teacher Association Is Given

LATHAM, May 27.—(Special).—At a recent meeting of the parent-teacher association a history of the organization, showing its accomplishments, was given by Miss Elizabeth Heacock. The report follows: The Latham parent-teacher association was organized November 2, 1928, with the following officers: Mrs. John McCall, president; Mrs. Alice Mercer, vice president; Melville Hanna, secretary; Mrs. William Sorenson, treasurer; Elizabeth Heacock, historian. The membership for the first year was 26. The charter was received and presented at the December meeting. Among the accomplishments for the first year were the installation of a sanitary drinking fountain, placing of suitable magazines in the school, sponsoring of 4-H club projects, purchase of community song books and sponsoring of blue ribbon health work.

Officers remained unchanged for the second year, with the exception of treasurer, Roy Fry taking the place of Mrs. Sorenson. The membership for this year was 27.

Among additional accomplishments for the second year were sponsoring a children's garden club and exhibit and placing "stop" signs to insure safety for school children.

On March 28 of this year the following officers for the third year were elected: Mrs. Alice Mercer, president; Mrs. Ruth McCall, vice president; Hugh Trunnell, secretary; Roy Fry, treasurer; Archie Walker, historian.

WHAT BOOZE DOES.

COTTAGE GROVE, Ore., May 26.—(To the Editor.)—May I, in vindication of my stand, relate, through your most excellent paper, part of the story of my young life touching the rum question and show my reason for hating the liquor traffic? I write this because of what I recently said to the W. C. T. U.

While practicing medicine in the swamps of Mississippi and White River regions in the 40's, my father lost his health and moved to Texas but never regained his vigor. Seven years or more before I was born he began using a "toddy" before breakfast and before bedtime and said that it helped his cough and made expectorating easier. Mother said, "If that helps your bronchial troubles, it will or may prevent my catching it from you, so I will take a toddy with you." Father died when I was past three and mother kept up the toddy until I was 15. So I was conceived and born in toddy.

There is now nothing I like the taste of better than something that has alcohol in it. A fight to let it alone has been with me all my life. Mother's brother, Uncle Tom, had ten boys and two girls. As close neighbors I was there much of my time till I was past 17.

He kept a barrel of whisky at the sawmill commissary and found it was too inconvenient to go back to the mill two miles to get a bottle of whisky for a negro who happened to be absent Saturday at noon when the mill shut down till Monday morning. Hence one was put in one corner of the smokehouse. Then "we boys," four of us near the same size, had access to it, by stealth, and used that opportunity daily. I could drink any of them to "stagger" and walk erect with no seeming bad effect.

Our mothers saw it, we didn't know they did then. But Uncle's word was the law and mothers had no recourse.

Boys, mother knows more of your secret evil ways than you think. Their hearts bleed for you to come to yourself and be clothed in your right mind. You may fool yourself but you can't fool God and mother.

My white mother, her error, quit it herself and obtained a pledge from me never to touch it again. Before I was 18 I violated that pledge twice. I wish I had space and time to tell you of God's love and providence in separating me from the evil environments and putting my feet upon a rock—which is Christ Jesus.

But I do want to tell you just a little about the other ten.

The oldest boy became attorney general of Texas. Was never drunk but drank daily. Pneumonia overtook him and his life went out in less than a week.

The second became the first sheriff of our new county. He fell to the same evil as pneumonia took him while on a business trip to the capital.

Jim, the third, was a periodical drunkard, would drink for two weeks, then get up and talk and vote against liquor, warn "we kids" and in four to six months the craving would seize him and on another "high-lonesome" he would go. He is living now at 82. When about 50 he yielded to the holy spirit and old things passed away and all things became new. Saved by the blood of Jesus Christ.

The fourth one, who was clerk at the commissary store, drank daily—went to high school 16 miles away, took pneumonia and died before his mother could get there.

There was Dave; became an M.

His daily habit was to drink. In about a year pneumonia swept the poor soul into eternity.

The scientific reason is plain. A little daily the system accumulates it and it is projected into the next generation.

When the system is so full of poison, and pneumonia attacks the body, doctors are helpless. Excessive drinking, the system revolts, refuses to take it into the blood. Surgeons dread to, and many refuse to, stick a knife into a man who drinks.

Alcohol is so subtle and seductive. When I see what has done for this family, and many others, why not hate it with a deadly hatred. Five cousins in this family, never drunk the people say, yet filled drunkards' graves. Yet I have told you only a small part of the story. Brothers, hate it like you would a rattlesnake. Hit it whenever and wherever you see it. Its friends never obeyed any law. They can't. They are deceived and can't see the truth. They are to be pitied. Think of it. Not one reason can they give for its life, yet they are printing enough newspaper columns monthly to belt the earth one and a half times. Appalling!

We are just beginning to reap what our ancestors sowed. What a terrible harvest the future generations must reap because of our sowing.

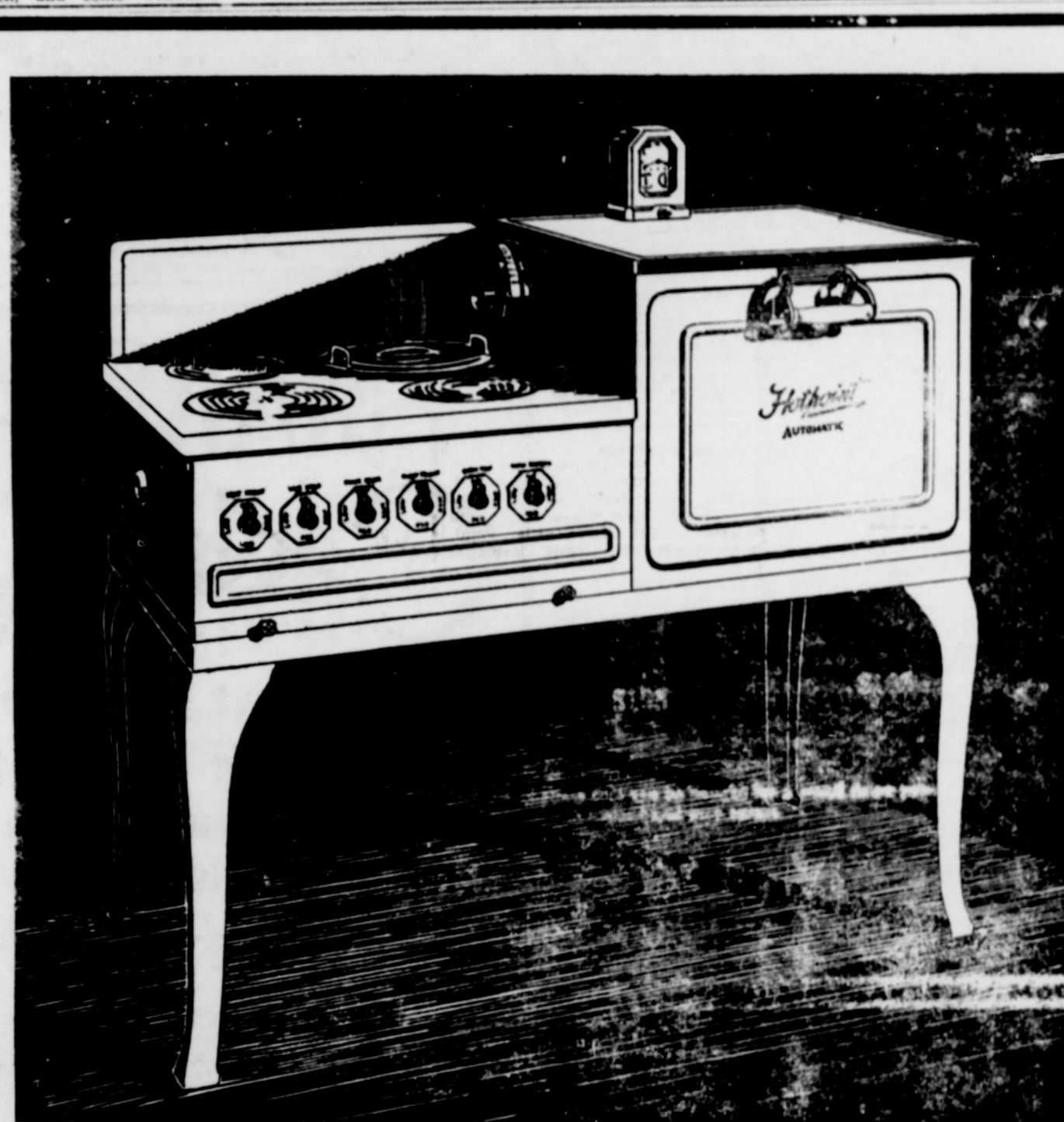
