Highway Snails Declared To Be Highway Menace

Secretary of State Hal Hoss Will Ask for Complete Lifting of Speed Limit.

SALEM, Ore., June 14. — "Keep moving! Say, where do you think you're going—to a funeral?"

Reversing the old query about "going to a funeral," state traffic officers will soon be taking the slow motorists over to one side of the road and asking them that question, although perhaps in a more polite manner.

The motorist who pokes along Oregon's highways at a snail's pace drawing exasperated groans from a long "parade" of other motorists whom he is retarding is just as much a menace to life and property as the speed demon who steps on the gas on a crowded highway.

Accordingly, all state highway patrol officers in Oregon have been instructed to keep traffic moving at a reasonably fast rate of speed.

The motorist who goes so slow as to hold up a long train of other cars will be pulled off to the side of the road and given a lecture while the parade is allowed to pass and break up, Hoss said.

"The traveling motorist who is held up on the highway by a car going a slow speed is likely to become so aggravated and exasperated that he will take a chance of passing on a crowded highway or around a dangerous curve," Hoss said. "All of our traffic officers have been instructed to break up every 'big parade' by taking the slow first car off the highway and keeping traffic moving at a reasonably fast speed."

Hoss said he contemplated no difficulty in securing passage of a bill abolishing the speed limit on highways. He will ask the introduction by such a measure in the 1931 legislature, he has announced.

The basic principle of the proposed law would be to restrict drivers to a "reasonable and prudent speed consistent with public safety."

A speed of 55 or 60 miles an hour on a clear straight highway is a "reasonable and prudent" speed, Hoss said, taking into consideration the improved highways of the state, the modern type of automobile, the excellent system of danger and curve markers and other factors.

You May Go Into This City Is Used In County Bridges Finance Study

Yew for county bridge piling may be used if a sufficient quantity can be secured, according to O. E. Crowe, county commissioner. This wood is said to be of remarkable durability. A small amount of yew is found in the vicinity of Culp Creek.

One timber dealer told the commissioner that he has supplied in fair sized quantities yew piling measuring 24 feet with a 9-inch diameter at the top.

Cottage Grove is one of 98 cities of the state used by Dean J. H. Gilbert of the University of Oregon for a survey of municipal finance in the state.
