SERVING ON THE JURY.

Frank Jenkins of the Eugene Register has been serving on the jury, and he used his entire first page column for two issues to tell about the experience. He doesn't say whether it is a justice court jury, a circuit court jury, a federal court jury, or what kind of a jury, but an editorial writer doesn't have to follow all the rules that are laid down for a reporter.

From Frank's comment we judge that this is his first experience on a jury, and heretofore he has believed all the things that have been said about juries and the actions of lawyers pleading before juries. But Frank is quick to learn, as is the way with editors. He finds that lawyers are a rather decent lot, that they make intelligent presentations of the facts. He finds that the poor man has a better chance before a jury than a rich man, if the evidence is doubtful, but that the rich man is not penalized because of being wealthy, if the facts are in his favor.

Contradicting a prevalent idea about the mental qualifications of jurymen, Frank says:

Here is a statement you have often heard: "Juries are below the average in intelligence, because those who are best qualified to serve display their native shrewdness by getting off, leaving only those who are not quite up to par." That isn't true—at least, it isn't true of this jury of court in Lane county. The present jury panel is made up of intelligent, thoughtful citizens, possessing good minds and being quite capable of reaching accurate conclusions from the evidence presented to them.

PROTECT THE LABORER.

Labor Commissioner Gram urges the enactment of a law that would enable him to compel employers to settle with employees.

Every time we find that something is not as we wish it to be we suggest that we ought to have a law, with the result that we have cluttered statute books, but if the result which Commissioner Gram seeks can be brought about by law, we certainly ought to have the law. The laborer certainly is worthy of his hire, and in these days the wages that the average laborer gets are barely sufficient to cover demands upon his purse. When he loses wages for a few weeks he is put in a position from which it takes him many months to recover. He can ill afford to sacrifice any portion of such wages to pay fees for their collection and is in a position where he can not employ a lawyer if an advance payment is required. Gram points to instances in which laborers thus unfairly dealt with have been compelled to seek charity.

Not only is loss of wages serious to the laborer, but it also works a severe hardship upon those who have extended credit. In the Cottage Grove country we have frequently felt the pinch when a large number of laborers lost the wages of several weeks with which they would have paid their store bills. The average laborer is a person who meets his bills promptly and who believes that he is entitled to some of the luxuries of life. Every laborer should have an ambition to pay bills promptly and should feel that he is entitled to luxuries, but he can not do one or have the others unless he receives that which he has honestly earned.

MARRYING AFTER DEATH.

In a recent issue of the Portland News appeared this one:

Q.—Are all widows of World War veterans entitled to compensation from the government?

A.—Only widows of men who served in the armed forces of the United States in the World War who have not married again and who died of injuries received or diseases contracted or accelerated in the service in the line of duty, are entitled to compensation.

This information is not definite enough. Eliminating several words in order to make the statement more clear we have: "Only widows of men . . . who have not married

again and who died of injuries . . . are entitled to compensation." Why should there be discrimination against a widow even if her husband has married again, whether before or after he died? Or is it the widows who shall not have married again but shall have died of injuries?

How the expense of a primary campaign keeps many able men from being candidates for high office is illustrated by the number of capable men ready to accept a nomination at the hands of the republican state central committee. The nominee is more than likely to be one who would get the nomination in no other way, not having an amount equal to or greater than a year's salary to expend on an uncertainty.

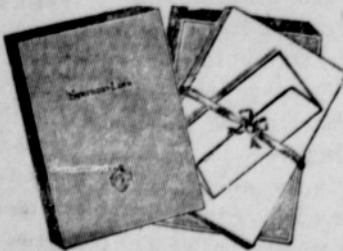

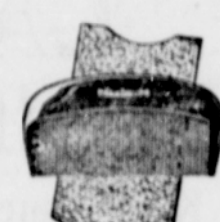
