Origin of Mayas Unknown

Where the Mayas came from is one of the world's ancient mysteries. Research is now going on in the Vatican library in the hope of tracing manuscripts of priests who visited America at the time of the Spanish conquest. It is hoped that these may prove a key to the Mayas. Hieroglyphics which have been found. At the time of the conquest the Mayas had a vast literature preserved on scrolls of papyrus. These were gathered and burned by the Spanish invaders. Despite the fact that the Mayas had evolved a complex civilization and had developed astronomy and mathematics to a stage not surpassed by the ancient Egyptians, the source of this civilization is unknown.

Figuring Warfare's Cost

In the Civil war the Union troops numbered 2,128,945; there are various estimates of the Confederate forces, ranging from 600,000 to 1,400,000. The total Union loss was 359,528, including killed, dead from wounds, disease, etc. The Confederate loss (partial statement) is given as 133,821 dead from wounds or disease. The cost of the Civil war has been estimated at \$5,000,000,000. The total number of soldiers mobilized in the World war has been estimated at 65,038,810; the total killed, 8,548,515; wounded, 21,219,452. Professor Bogart's estimate of the direct costs of the World war is \$186,335,887,000 and of the indirect costs, \$15,612,542,500.

Canal Would Be Costly

The cost of the proposed Nicaragua canal would be several times the cost of the Panama canal. The Nicaragua canal would be about 183 miles in length, 70 miles of which will be in Lake Nicaragua, 50 miles along the San Juan river, and the remainder through the mountains. The region of Lake Gatun in the Panama canal is 85 feet above mean sea level. The level of Lake Nicaragua is 105 feet. The great elevation of Lake Nicaragua has attracted attention to the added cost of the Nicaraguan canal.

Psychology in Matrimony

David Sanbury, famous consulting psychologist, says psychology can well be applied to the field of marriage. He names seven kinds of love: mate love, based on natural compatibility; romantic love, the kind that is in love with love; sex love; home love; intellectual love; propinquity love, in which two persons have the same background, and self-love. The first kind, says Sanbury, is the only kind to build marriage on.—Capper's Weekly.

Early Use of Shellac

Reference to lac are found in Sanskrit literature. In early times it was used as a dye. Pliny in 77 A. D. wrote of lac gum, known in India and other eastern countries. Shellac as a varnish has been known in the east from very early times.

Sphinx Badly Used

The mutilations of the Sphinx which now disfigures it date from the Arab domination. Baedeker says in his "Guide to Cairo and Environs" that in 1830 the Sphinx fell victim to the looting hands of a fanatical sheik, and it was afterwards used as a target by the barbarous Mamelukes.

Desire for Beauty Met in Decoration of Wood

From remotest ages man has expressed in wood carving his yearning for beauty, writes Tom Gill in American Forest.

Man numbers among his earliest instincts an impelling desire for beauty—a groping toward the creation and possession of beautiful things, Mr. Gill says. Two materials man found ready at his hand in which to fashion and perpetuate his instinct—clay and wood—the woods of the world with their varying textures and colors.

"But clay, even with its abundance and ease of molding, came to serve little more than utilitarian ends among the early peoples," Mr. Gill writes. "It did not lend itself to the creation of beauty. It was not durable. So it is in wood that we find here and there the first scattered remnants of man's artistic beginnings."

"From the remotest ages the decoration of wood has been a foremost art. For the tendency of the human race is to ornament every article of use, the American Indian his pipe, the Polynesian his paddle. A primitive art then thus became imposed upon a medium that lay abundantly at hand—a material that has always been a friendly and quite familiar thing."

"Jed" Smith Stands High
in Ranks of Pioneers

When the list is called up yesterday of the great pioneers of the Oregon country, will be on hand, writes Fred Lockley to the Portland (Ore.) Journal. With his inseparable companions—his rifle and his Bible—he traveled for years over the West.

With five companions he went in the fall of 1824 to Ross' headquarters on Salmon river in what is now Clatsop county, Idaho. As it was late in the season he decided to go with Ross to the Hudson Bay company's post in what is now Sanders county, Montana. They crossed the Bitter Root mountains on November 1, passing through Ross Hole and reached Flathead post toward the end of November.

Smith was the first American to cross the Continental divide north and west of the three forks of the Missouri since the days of Lewis and Clark. He was the first American to explore the Columbia river drainage in the Upper Salmon river district since Andrew Henry had been here in 1810.

Newspaper "Stock"

There are four commercial processes of making paper pulp from wood. They are known as the groundwood, the sulphite, the sulphate, and the soda processes. Each is especially adapted to the manufacture of certain grades of paper or to the pulping of certain woods. News, cheap magazine and cheap catalogue papers are made mostly of groundwood—that is, of uncooked wood mechanically ground into a pulp. The groundwood process is the cheapest of all the pulping processes, and the pulp yield is by far the greatest. The quality of the pulp, however, is low that even in cheap papers it is not strong enough to use alone, and considerable quantities of longer and stronger fibered pulp must be added.

Weather Forecasts

The weather bureau says that within two hours after the morning observations have been taken, forecasts are telegraphed from the bureau to about 1,600 distributing towns, whence they are further disseminated by telegraph, telephone, radiophone, radio and mail. The forecasts are delivered early in the day, generally none later than 6 p. m. on the day of issue, and are available to more than 5,500,000 telephone subscribers within an hour of issue. This system of forecast distribution is wholly under the supervision and mainly at the expense of the government. The weather map is mailed immediately after the morning forecast is telegraphed.

Not So Modern

Youth sometimes finds it isn't so strictly modern in its ways after all. A high school lad was making some mysterious telephone calls at home. He talked in a strange, old-fashioned language known as "pig latin," so that his mother wouldn't understand his conversation. For a week the strange words echoed over the family telephone. Then she, the telephone conversation went back to straight English. The boy's mother knew the "lingo" well. "Why, we used to talk it when I went to school," she told her son.—Detroit News.

Tyler's Old Well Sweep

An old well sweep which once belonged to the family of President Tyler of Virginia is now in the possession of the National Women's Country club.

The sweep is in perfect running order, though it has seen about two hundred years of service. Its donor is anonymous. The club also possesses a clock of unusual type which stood in the living room of the White House during the Tyler regime.

Original "Pancakes"

Historians tell us that the first "baked bread" was made when some mush, probably consisting of ground wild barley and water, was accidentally spilled on a hot stone, which was protecting a fire in front of a cave. When the food was scraped from the stone it consisted of a pancake with a brown crust. Its improved taste and health-giving qualities over raw food undoubtedly led to experimentation with fire.

Hot Dog Stand Moved.

A hot dog stand, sold by the Hot Dog Vending Booth company of this city, was moved to Eugene Saturday and set up on Eleventh avenue. The big dog attracted considerable attention on its journey. It was found necessary to detour around the railroad overheads at Goshen and Springfield, the dog standing too high to pass beneath the structures.

Marched With Sherman And Knows What War Really Is

Serving with the western army through the battles of Stone River, Pittsburgh, and Chickamauga, and later marching with Sherman through Tennessee and Kentucky, H. R. Godard of Cottage Grove saw a great deal of service during the Civil war.

"It seemed we were fighting every day," he said. He enlisted at Fort Wayne, Indiana, August 18, 1861, with the thirtieth Indiana infantry, company D. When the war was out he was serving as second duty sergeant in command of his company.

"I have never chewed, smoked or drank. I remember they used to come along the lines passing out the liquor, but I never took it. Later you could see many of those who drank so much behind the lines when the fighting time came," Mr. Godard said.

Mr. Godard was born on what is now Armistice day, November 11, 1840, in Indiana. He is one of the oldest veterans in the county. Twenty years ago he came to Cottage Grove.

Mr. and Mrs. Godard celebrated their sixty-fourth wedding anniversary this past year. She is also a native of Indiana. Their children are: Mrs. E. R. Spencer of Eugene; Herschel Godard of Brush, Colo.; Mrs. Grace Van Boskirk, of Eugene; Mrs. Mabel Atkinson of Pawnee, City, Neb.; Sherman L. Godard of Cottage Grove; Jack Godard of Tillamook. Three daughters have died. Mrs. Ruth Agnew, Gertrude Godard, and Edith Godard. They have 24 grandchildren and 18 great grandchildren.

Shorthand has always been a hobby with Mr. Godard. "I practiced it a great deal during the war," he said as he showed the Lord's prayer in shorthand. He has given several of the prayers to friends.

Mr. Godard joined the Grand Army of the Republic while in Alliance, Neb., where he and Mrs. Godard pioneered.

He says he will be greatly interested in reading about the G. A. R. encampment in Eugene this week but is unable to attend because he must always use crutches and finds it difficult to get around.

Beach Mining Starts
At Florence

FLORENCE, Ore., June 28.—Gold mining is the latest industry for Florence. It is being conducted in the sands on Heceta beach by H. P. Gjellstad and Bert McMillan, Myrtle Point men. Gold was taken from the sands of Lane county's beach a number of years ago.

The product at that time was of good quality. Equipment for the undertaking and lumber have already been placed on the beach, and mining was started this week.

Historic Cane Is Received.

A cane made from a stick cut three years ago on the old Gettysburg battlefield by William Cain of Orchard, Wash., a former Cottage Grove G. A. R. member, was presented to the women's relief corps at its meeting Saturday. Mr. Cain gave the cane to Mrs. Minnie Sweet, president of the W. F. C. laid up in Eugene during the G. A. R. convention.
