HOW TO GROW ALFALFA By P. G. Holden Field Director, Agricultural Extension Department, International Harvester Company.

Alfalfa, when small, grows slowly, and is not a good fighter, that is, cannot compete with weeds, and especially with crab grass, foxtail, and other weeds during the dry weather of July and August.

Probably no method will more certainly assure a good stand than to manure a piece of stubble ground and fall-plow it, or manure the ground in the spring, or disk it thoroughly as soon as possible in the spring (first part of April), plow the latter part of April and again disk the ground. It should be summer fallowed, that is, disked or harrowed often enough during May, June and the first part of July to kill the weeds and prevent the ground from becoming hard.

Oat or wheat stubble ground manured and fall plowed is especially good for alfalfa. Disk the ground the following spring as soon as dry enough to work, summer fallow, and seed as described above.

This method will almost certainly secure a stand, provided the work is well done. It has the advantage of: 1. Clearing the ground of weeds, the greatest enemy of alfalfa.

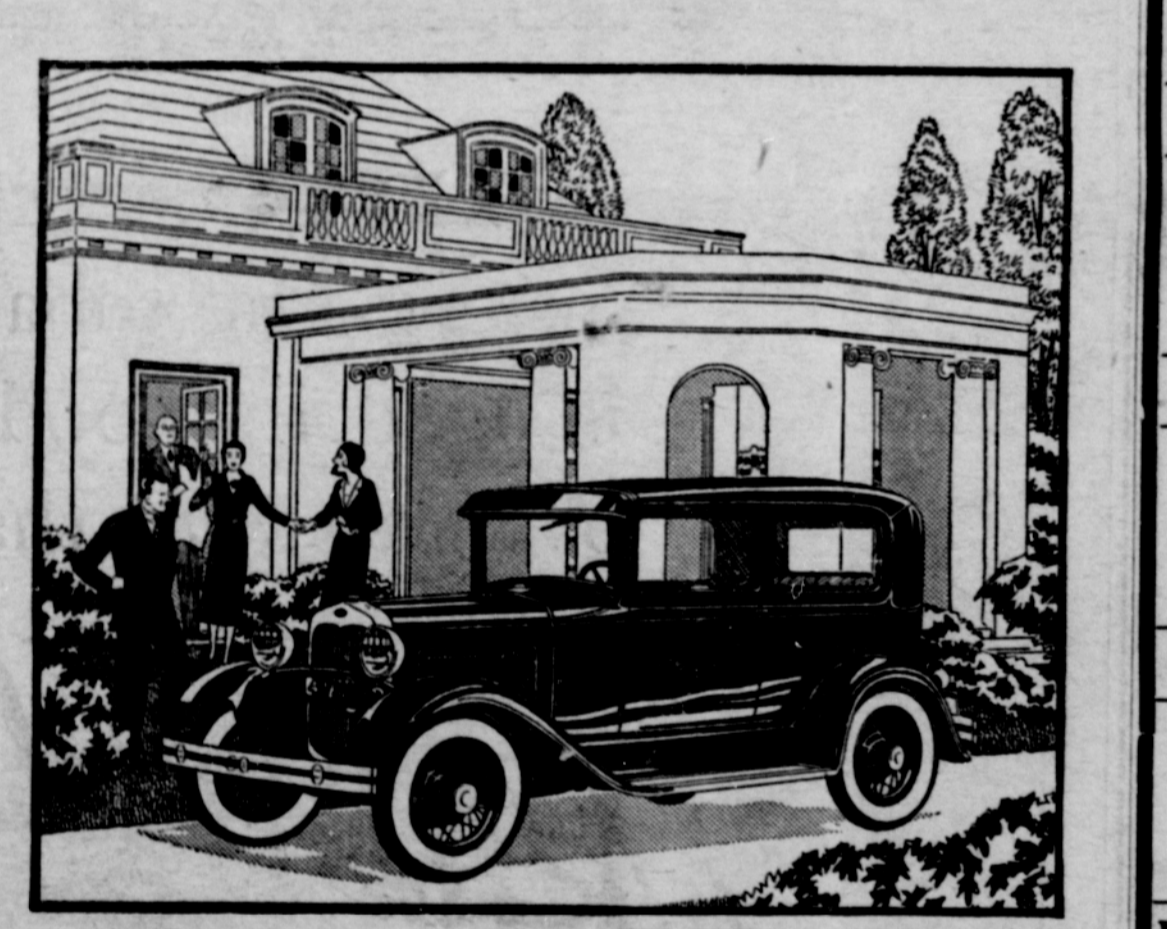
