California Leads in Families Sent. California continues to furnish by far the largest number of families coming to Oregon, according to the monthly report of W. G. Ide, state chamber of commerce. Five California families were reported as having arrived and bought farms the last week in June. The report shows that 297 families arrived during the first six months of this year and that they have purchased over 50,000 acres of land and invested in lands, household goods, machinery and equipment of all kinds approximately \$1,282,884. Over 1000 families have also written of their intentions to locate in Oregon later in the year and the prospective residents indicate they will have \$3,265,470 for investment.

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Good Manners in Forests.

The U. S. forest service says: "You may be reasonably 'wild and woolly' when you go camping in the national forests of Oregon and Washington, but don't leave your good manners at home. Take them with you. You need them more on your vacation than when you are at home. The rules for good manners as given by the U. S. forest service are easy to learn and are followed by all good sportsmen, good campers and good tourists. They are:

First obtain a camp fire permit. Carry a shovel and ax. Smoke only in camp. Drown your fire dead out with water.

Leave a clean and sanitary camp. Observe the state fish and game laws.

Cooperate with the forest rangers and state fire wardens in reporting and suppressing forest fires.

Practice these rules and preach them, too.

Fur-Bearers Wiped Out by Forest Destruction

Fur-bearing animals are naturally creatures of forest and stream, and it is interesting to note the effect forest destruction, either by fire or lumbering, has on the fur-bearing.

Animals, like the valuable pine marten and fisher, are simply lost without green timber, and you will rarely see tracks of either of these animals in burnt-over lands or slash.

Foxes and coyotes as a rule quickly return to burnt-over areas, for the simple reason that forest destruction generally results in a new growth of light brush and grass, which affords a great breeding ground for mice and other rodents. The same can be said of moose and deer, as the new growth of tender shoots from alder, birch, cottonwood, etc., makes good feeding ground for these animals.

But, on the whole, forest destruction makes a wide devastation of the fur-bearing species. It is known of several instances in the northwest where trappers, in order to drive their enemies out of certain sections, have stooped to the nefarious practice of firing large timbered areas.

Wide Belief in Virtues of Peony as Medicine

The peony is credited with medicinal power by peoples as far apart as the Japanese and the inhabitants of western Europe. According to ancient herbalists it was an herb of the sun, and consequently prescribed for maladies caused by the moon. It was good for nightmares and melancholy and a preventive of insanity and convulsions. The flower probably came from Japan and traveled in ancient times by way of Persia to Greece, where it gave the land of Paeonia its name, and was the origin of the word "peony," which originally meant a chant of delivery from illness or wound—another indication of the belief that the flower had rare healing properties. The peony appears to have found its way to England by about 1600. It has frequently been made the subject for a poem, of which one by Bliss Carman is probably the best known.

Early Endeavors Of Rev. C. A. Wooley Recounted

The following interesting data concerning Rev. C. A. Wooley, well known in this city in the early days, appeared in a recent issue of the Eugene Register under "Early Eugene Church Spies":

For ten years after the building of their Eugene church the Cumberlands got along without a pastor, Gillespie and other elders taking turns at conducting the Sunday services. In 1863 Carey Allen Wooley was engaged as the first pastor, a position which he held off and on for more than 40 years.

Wooley had been a Cumberland pastor in Missouri. He arrived in Eugene in 1865, and within a few years had organized Cumberland churches at Mary's River, Luckiamute, Junction City, Dillard, Creswell, Scio, Albany and Dorena.

His son, Leland Wooley, of 1885, Franklin Blvd., is a good source of information regarding the ministerial career of his father. According to him, Rev. Mr. Wooley was an active and ardent exponent of the union of the Cumberland Presbyterian and Presbyterian U. S. A. churches in the Willamette valley, and fought for it in Eugene and in other towns where he had helped to organize Cumberland churches.

In 1869, the union was finally effected, while Wooley was still serving as pastor of the Eugene Cumberland church. Two years later the united Presbyterian congregation moved into their new building at the corner of Tenth and Pearl streets, and Mr. Wooley retired from active service. He continued to serve as a guest preacher in many churches up to the time of his death, which occurred in Eugene on October 25, 1915.

Some old residents may recall the history of the Cumberland Presbyterian college which Wooley founded in the little town of Soda-ville in Linn county about 1900. Money was pledged and a building was erected. Classes were held for four or five years, but after the general Presbyterian unification it was decided to abandon the Soda-ville school and throw united support behind the new Albany Presbyterian college.

In 1890 Wooley had organized the Fairmount Presbyterian church. The first meeting was held in an old hall on Franklin boulevard. George Melvin Miller and Dean John Strain gave the new congregation ground for a building at the corner of 15th and Villard streets.

Creswell Bridge Progresses.

Practically all the false work for the new county bridge east of Creswell has been completed and raising the steel will start at once, says P. M. Morse, county engineer.

All the steel from the old Springfield bridge needed for the new span has been transported to the new job and the old steel not needed has been piled on the bank at the west end of the old bridge.

Most of this unused steel will probably be junked, the engineer said.

The Booth-Kelly sawmill at Springfield resumed operations Monday. A short crew is employed and the mill is operating on a 4½-day basis.

The Wendling mill may open July 14, it was said, but definite announcement will not be made before next week.
