Merchants and buyers who attend Portland's buyers' week this year will be afforded the rare treat of listening to and joining in the round table discussions on present-day merchandising led by Fred P. Mann, nationally celebrated merchandiser and a member of the committee of distribution of the United States chamber of commerce.

Under the auspices of the trade and commerce department of the Portland chamber of commerce, Portland's eighteenth annual buyers' week is scheduled for the week of August 4 to 8.

Merchants throughout the country, and particularly from the four western states considered as Portland's logical market area, are invited to attend with the inducement of railroad fares refunded on minimum purchases of \$500.

Historic Spots Marked On Territorial Highway

Plaques Are Placed at Homes That Played Large Parts in Pioneer History.

Markers at historical spots on the Oregon territorial road through Lane county were placed Saturday during a ceremony sponsored by the Oregon Lewis and Clark chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution.

Going first to the junction of the old road with the Pacific highway at Monroe, a caravan of about 60 placed a plaque bearing the words "West Side Old Territorial Road, 1848-1865, Eugene D. A. R., 1930."

From Monroe the group went to the home of Daniel Smith, which was built in 1853. Smithfield was named for Mr. Smith. This home also marks the territorial road, and a marker was erected there describing the spot.

A cherished landmark at Smithfield is the old oak tree where another marker was placed. Loved by all who lived there, the community has fought for its preservation and it stands today a monument to the early settlers.

In addition to the marker, F. M. Wilkins presented the community with a plaque which was placed on the tree, bearing the following words: "I am only one of God's seedlings, small and frail, growing along life's human trail. He only knows the date of my birth, or the rest and help given human kind. So let me stand on this highway of earth, a home for His creatures, a shade for man."

Postoffice, stage station, telegraph station, mountain house and hotel—these things were the D. B. Cartwright home, before which was placed the fourth marker of the D. A. R.

This interesting structure contains 12 bedrooms, some of which can hold four or five double beds; a bar room, family room, and many other rooms.

D. B. Cartwright died in Eugene in 1875. The property is owned by A. H. Addison, who has lived there for about 27 years.

The marking was conducted under the direction of the Preservation of Historic Spots and the Nation's Old Trail committee of the Eugene D. A. R.
