

CITY SCHOOLS TO OPEN MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 8

Many Minor Improvements Have Been Made to Buildings During Summer.

Only One Vacancy on Teaching Staff; Student Body Dues Reduced.

Arrangements are being completed for opening the Cottage Grove schools a week from Monday, which will be September 8. In any pupils not able to attend during the first few days of school Superintendent Emerson says it will be to their advantage if they will report for registration and secure room and class assignments.

During the coming week high school students are to complete their registration for the first semester's work. For the convenience of those who will conduct registration, students have been asked to report in the following order: Freshmen on Tuesday, sophomores on Wednesday, juniors on Thursday and seniors and post graduates on Friday. Students will be registered on other days if they are not able to report in the order given.

Numerous minor improvements to buildings have been made during the summer. Hot water and a telephone have been installed in the central building. The high school commerce room has been enlarged and several typewriters have been added. At the gymnasium the boys' shower bath and locker room have been moved. At the west side school built-in cupboards have been provided for teachers of primary classes, a reading table has been provided and an electric bell system installed.

Acting under the new student body constitution which was adopted at the close of school last year, student body officers will be on hand to collect student body dues at the time students register. Student body dues have been reduced from \$2.50 to \$1.50, which includes a season ticket to all games and contests held during the school year. The price of the student body dues and season ticket was reduced with the expectation that 100 per cent membership would be maintained. With less than that it will not be possible to finance student body activities on the reduced cost of membership.

Children who will be 6 years old by the first of December will be eligible to enter the first grade this fall. No beginners will be admitted at the beginning of the second semester. Midyear classes in all grades will be discontinued as soon as pupils who are now in these classes can be adjusted to the regular classes. In the upper grades it may be necessary to continue the midyear classes until these pupils have completed work in the eight grades.

A special effort is being made to determine the physical fitness of every pupil in all the grades. Miss Beatrice Tuttle, an experienced school nurse, has been employed to act as city school nurse for a few weeks at the beginning of the school year. New pupils are being examined in the homes before school opens. Thorough physical examinations will be given during the first week of school. A special effort is being made to avoid introduction of any contagious or infectious diseases. On Wednesday, September 10, a clinic will be held in the high school building, at which time the Schick test will be given pupils who were given toxoid last year. Pupils who have not been vaccinated will be vaccinated at the same time.

With the exception of a music supervisor, the teaching staff is complete. Miss Virginia Hunt recently resigned her place has not been filled. It is expected that this position will be filled before school opens.

O. M. Bagley of Corvallis has been elected physical education director and athletic coach for boys in the high school. Mr. Bagley is a graduate of Oregon State college and has had two years' experience as a science teacher and athletic coach. While in college he specialized in physical education and all coaching and participated in all major sports. His two years' experience as a coach in one of the smaller schools of the state was successful.

Edward Dove of Rainier will have charge of physical education and athletics in the junior high school. Mr. Dove is a graduate of Oregon normal at Monmouth, where he participated in all major athletics.

Lea, biology, physics, commercial arithmetic, algebra; Eariel Lee Gilbert, English, dramatics; Florence Jenks, typing, bookkeeping, algebra.

Twenty-Two Professional Riders Are Coming for Calapooza Entertainment.

Those who attend the rodeo at Calapooza springs Sunday and Monday will have the opportunity to see Cotton Belly, a shaggy old bay with pin ears and a big Roman nose, who never has been ridden and came into prominence last year by throwing every rider at Cheyenne and at Madison Square Garden, New York. He is only one of a number of the best of outlaw bucking horses that have arrived from Molalla, where they participated in a Fourth of July rodeo.

Chub Morgan, famous bulldogger, who is in charge of the show, will be seen in action. He is putting on this show to put his men and stock in trim for a series of rodeos to be given in California. Paris Williams, one of the most sensational western riders in America, who in 1928 won the world's championship in trick riding and roping, is among 22 professional riders who will participate. There will also be prize contests for local riders. Morgan will bulldog a steer from an automobile.

A new grandstand has been erected at the springs and arrangements are being made for carnival attractions.

15-Year Old Driver Is at Wheel in Crash

The Langsdon car carried no insurance and Langsdon said he was without funds to pay fine or damages. All three cars in the crash were badly damaged, but injuries to the occupants were slight.

Delay of Year Seen On Siuslaw Highway

A delay of a year in the completion of the Mapleton-Cushman section of the Siuslaw highway and an expenditure of an additional \$100,000 is made necessary because of slides along the right of way.

H. D. Farmer, district engineer of the bureau of public roads, told Judge C. P. Barnard of the Lane county court Tuesday. The original estimate for the work was about \$60,000.

Work on the railway embankment cannot be completed until the danger of further slides has been done away with. Mr. Farmer stated. Masses of rock sliding down the hillside have damaged the new embankment, which will probably not be completed and ready to turn over to the Southern Pacific until in 1932 instead of in 1931 as originally planned.

The slide extends over a front of from 400 to 500 feet and runs up the mountainside for perhaps half a mile, according to O. E. Crowe, county commissioner, who has visited the site. The mountain is composed of a mass of conglomerate rock which is susceptible to the influence of the weather and the slope is of a pitch which greatly increases the danger of slides. The entire hillside will have to be cut back until bedrock is struck.

Senator McNary Talks Canalization of River

Senator McNary is returning to Central Washington, where he has been instrumental in getting the national government to make a survey of the cost of canalizing the river to Eugene.

Hardwood From Corn Stalks.

Dr. O. R. The process promises valuable possibilities, particularly in the utilization of the corn stalks, which for the most part form a waste product.

Eugene Schools Boost Tuition Outside Pupils

Action is to Offset Refusal of Boundary Board to Change Laws.

Higher tuition rates in Eugene senior and junior high schools for the coming year for students who come from districts provided with the Eugene school board.

The Eugene school district and others petitioned the county boundary board to abandon the Wheeler law of high school financing and take up one which would pay the districts better. Figures presented by the district showed that the district was not being adequately reimbursed for instruction to out-of-district students.

The boundary board kept the Wheeler law in order to equalize the cost of instructing out-of-district students with the actual per capita cost as shown by the records. It costs more to educate pupils in Eugene high schools than in other districts, it was pointed out.

The high school tuition rates were raised from \$10 a month to \$12 a month. The tuition in junior high schools, for seventh and eighth grades as well as the ninth, or first year of high school, was raised from \$7.50 to \$10 a month.

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Nelson Electric Has Novel Display

A novel method for display has been arranged by the Nelson Electric shop. It is in the form of a Spanish type bungalow, with two windows and an alcove. The windows are used for displays and the alcove contains a radio tube testing machine.

To Control Stable Flies.

An exchange has the following on handling straw piles: Disposal or proper stacking of straw is important in controlling the stable fly, one of the worst pests of livestock throughout the country. Straw stacks are the principal breeding places of this pest, especially in the grain belt. Straw to be kept for bedding or food should be carefully stacked. Make the sides of the stack nearly vertical and round the top well to shed rain. After the straw is stacked, clean up loose straw or chaff and burn it. Keep the straw in the stacks and should be disposed of immediately after threshing. Plow it under or burn it. Surplus straw should be disposed of in early spring or it will furnish flies continually in spring and summer.

WORK ON ARMORY IS TO START AT ONCE

Major General White Pleaded With Way Battery Does Its Stuff.

Bids for the construction of the Cottage Grove armory will be opened here Tuesday, September 8. The First National bank has been set as the place for receipt of bids, and they will also be opened there. Conditions are such that some good bids are expected.

Major General Geo. A. White, adjutant general for the state, met here with the local army committee Saturday and said that the recent delay has been because it was deemed best to give the reorganized military unit a chance to demonstrate what may be expected of it. He reported that he was entirely satisfied and that construction of the armory would get under way at once. He did not believe the approach of winter would interfere with construction to any great extent.
