Voters Have Difficult Task Before Them If They Would Cast Ballots Wisely.
(Continued from first page.)
Provides that the legislature may apply a privilege tax to motor vehicles according to value and depreciation without specific assessment. There has been a great demand for reduction of license fees on motor vehicles according to their age and depreciation, and the proposed amendment would make it possible for the legislature to enact such legislation. This would be an enabling act only and should not be taken advantage of until it became certain that highway finances would not be endangered. Vote 349 Yes.
338-300—Motor Vehicle License Tax Constitutional Amendment. Same amendment as preceding one, but for another article of the constitution. It is necessary to pass both to bring about the result sought. Vote 338 Yes.
310-311—Constitutional Amendment for Filling Vacancies in the Legislature.—There have been several instances in recent years in which some county has been without representation because no method as provided for filling a vacancy that occurs following the November election. Lane county was without a senator in one session. The amendment would permit the legislature to provide a method for filling such vacancies. Vote 310 Yes.
312-313—Legislative Compensation Constitutional Amendment.—It is notorious that Oregon does not pay its legislators sufficient to cover their actual expenses while attending a session. This amendment would provide the most salary of \$500 for a term of two years, in addition to mileage as now provided. Presiding officers would receive \$750. This amendment, which has the endorsement of the state grange, is one that will be possible for farmers and others of moderate means to serve in the legislature without great financial sacrifice. It should have an overwhelming majority if we would make it possible for all classes to accept positions as legislators. Vote 312 Yes.
314-315—Two Additional Circuit Judges Bill.—This would provide two additional judges for Multnomah county. This bill was passed by the last legislature, but the referendum was invoked and it is now before the people. The Sentinel dislikes to recommend anything that means additional expenditure of state funds at this time, although the condition of circuit court business in Multnomah county is such that fairness to litigants seems to demand that the two additional judges be given, it probably is better to leave the proposition to the legislature for further consideration. A vote of the people is not required. Vote 315 No.
316-317—Income Tax.—Income tax has been discussed for so many years as various bills have appeared on the ballot, that further discussion of the merit or lack of merit of income tax is unnecessary. This bill was passed by the 1929 legislature and comes before the people by referendum. The Sentinel has always believed in the principle of income tax, but has always disagreed with some of the provisions of every income tax that has been proposed. It finds the present proposed income tax probably as satisfactory as any that is likely to be proposed. The Sentinel does not believe in exemptions. However, those in the proposed bill, \$1,500 for single persons, \$2,500 for married persons and \$400 for each dependent, are as low as authors of income taxes dare propose under income tax becomes general. Without these exemptions, income tax authors claim, no income tax bill could be passed. This bill was considered and adopted by the legislature, which the Sentinel believes is the place all legislation should start, and being the best that the legislature could produce The Sentinel is inclined to favor adoption.
318-319—Anti-Cigarette Constitutional Amendment.—Proposed by initiative petition. The Sentinel doesn't understand why any one wishes to smoke a cigarette, but this is altogether too much of an invasion of personal liberty. The next move would be to stop the sale of cigars and chewing tobacco, and that would hit some of us who may not care for cigarettes. Vote 319 No.
320-321—Rogue River Fishing Constitutional Amendment.—The fish business has produced more legislative fights than any other five subjects. This proposed amendment to do away with commercial fishing with nets in the Rogue river is being proposed as a constitutional amendment so that fishing in this river at least can no longer be a legislative football. Proponents of the measure present figures to show that the returns from commercial fishing on the stream are small compared to the amounts paid by tourists for out-of-state fishing licenses, for boatmen and for expenses incidental to their stay in the state. The fishermen, of course, claim the amendment would do away with a payroll and confiscate property. The amendment would not disturb commercial fishing done with hook and line held in the hand. A reading of both arguments leaves the voter in doubt as to what he should do.
322-323—Lieutenant Governor Amendment.—Oregon has never had a lieutenant governor, and the succession to the governorship has never been satisfactory. The amendment would provide for such an officer, who would receive a salary of \$500 the year and no other compensation except when serving as governor, and would serve as president of the senate without additional compensation. He would be elected by the people in the same manner as the governor. He would appoint the committees of the senate, although he would not be a member thereof. The Sentinel doubts the wisdom of this provision. The amendment was initiated by the Oregon state grange.
324-325—People's Water and Power Utility Districts Constitutional Amendment.—Proposed by initiative petition. The Sentinel has no doubt of the sincerity of purpose of the state grange in proposing this measure. Because of the dynamite in the proposed amendment The Sentinel doubts whether it is a grange idea, but if it is a grange idea, it undoubtedly goes to extremes that the authors did not realize, which is often the case with

People's Water and Power Utility Districts Constitutional
That Article XI of the Constitution of the State of Oregon be, and the same hereby is, amended by the addition of the following Section 12:
Section 12, People's utility districts may be created of territory, contiguous or otherwise, within one or more counties, and may consist of an incorporated municipality or municipalities, with or without unincorporated territory, for the purpose of supplying water for domestic and municipal purposes; for the development of water power and/or electric energy; and for the distribution, disposal and sale of water, water power and electric energy. Such districts shall be managed by boards of directors, consisting of five members, who shall be residents of such districts. Such districts shall have power:
(a) To call and hold elections within their respective districts.
(b) To levy taxes upon the taxable property of such districts.
(c) To issue, sell and assume evidences of indebtedness.
(d) To enter into contracts.
(e) To exercise the power of eminent domain.
(f) To acquire and hold real and other property necessary or incident to the business of such districts.
(g) To acquire, develop, and/or otherwise provide for a supply of water, water power and electric energy.
Such districts may sell, distribute and/or otherwise dispose of water, water power and electric energy within or without the territory of such districts.
The legislative assembly shall and the people may provide any legislation, that may be necessary, in addition to existing laws, to carry out the provisions of this section.
324. Yes. I vote for the amendment.
325. No. I vote against the amendment.
