The story of St. Mark, her patron saint, is a daring and exciting one. In the year 827 A. D. a Venetian ship lying in the harbor of Alexandria was commanded by three men: Rustico of Torcello, Buono of Malamocco and one Stauracia, who were animated by the felonious but pious purpose of depriving the city of its most valuable possession—the body of St. Mark.

After much argument and bribery they induced the guardian of the tomb to become a party to their design. Thus St. Mark was brought with great ceremony to Venice, there to be given a magnificent reception and to become her patron saint.

According to various authorities quoted in Hall's "Adolescence," the size of the brain increases but little after eight years. There is in existence an illustration bearing the date of 1614 which proves to us that even so long ago there was an interest in diet. At that time one Sanctus built himself a weighing chair so that he could see just how much food he ate daily. This chair was an ingenious device connected with a high steel rod on which there was a movable weight. The weight was suspended over the food he was about to eat. Then sitting in this chair he would eat until the chair dipped, when he would end his repast.

Tarpela, by the glitter of the bracelets which the Sabines wore on their left arms, she offered to betray the citadel if they would make her gifts of these. Willing to profit by her ploy, but hating her because of her treachery, the Sabines kept literally to their promise to give her what they wore on their left arms as she opened the gates. They threw their heavy shields upon her and crushed her to death.

Controversy Ended by

"Mason and Dixon" Line

As a boundary division the "Mason and Dixon" line got its name from the two men who surveyed and established it. Charles Mason and John Dixon. It was run by agreement between the Calverys, Maryland, and William Penn to settle a controversy regarding the boundary line between Pennsylvania and Maryland. Mason and Dixon came from England in 1764 for that express purpose. They were both men of scientific attainments, Mason at one time being assistant at the royal observatory at Greenwich. They ran the line with great care, cutting a space eight feet wide through the forest and setting up a stone at the end of each mile. Every fifth stone was larger than the others and had on the north side the arms of William Penn and on the south those of Lord Baltimore. The smaller, intermediate stones had the letter "P" on the north surface and "M" on the south, for Pennsylvania and Maryland. The line has nothing to do with slavery, except it did. It was not abolished in Pennsylvania until 1780 and then only by a law providing that all colored persons thereafter born within the state should be set free at the age of twenty-eight years.

Forced Out Huguenots
