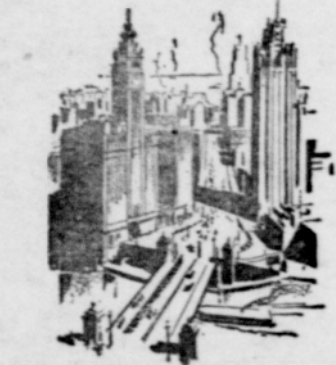

The Thanksgiving Feast

Had we not been digging our toes in the snows of Mount Lassen—perhaps we'd not have been quite so attune to the joyous message of Thanksgiving so gaily whispered out at one with the gentle murmur of scarlet and golden clad leaves as they alternately avalanche or solo their flight through the crisp tangy air of autumn. Why—it's just around the corner.

Thanksgiving—and our hearts go home! The warmth of the great cedar log aglow in the fireplace, grizzled grandfathers—remembering stalwart uncles with ruddy cheeks lined from the continuous battle for the food over which we're about to bow thankfully—in the spring, potato bugs in the summer, early snows and sugar beets frozen in ground; buxom, red-cheeked aunts busily wiping young noses of restless, hungry offspring, or hearing great tureens from the kitchen;—and grandmother, silver-haired from the snows of many winters and many more hardships—never too busy to stop for the kiss of the tiniest, toddling grandchild, remembering to make the little pies for the older ones. By the way, what has become of grandmothers? Surely not gone the way of all flesh! Has our modern skin lifting and face exchanging robbed us of the world's greatest of treasures—grandmothers?

And then the dinner—can any menu of unintelligible Frenchness hold a candle to that table beaming Thanksgiving? We pause for grandmother's blessing while wee Marys glance furtively upward and young Tommies squirm restlessly in defiance of the ax—need no coaxing with goose-liver pastries and French soups. Give us, instead, the steaming bowl of creamy lusciousness with scalloped—edged oysters jostling each other about in a sauce of the ax—need no start, swallowed hastily to make way for the king!

Here he comes—once king of the barnyard only lately strutting gay plumes in defiance of the ax—king of the feast in his crisp-coated brownness with a string of gay cranberries around his stub of a neck, his fat sides fairly bursting with stuffing! And what stuffing! Of savory steam—the pungent, tantalizing whiff of well-seasoned dressing—the thing small boys grown tall remember! Yesterday's stale bread—cornbread—baked in a warm oven, the water dry like wax, many silk stockings, then an egg and chopped onions cooked until tender in the drippings from homemade sausage, a bit of that too, seasonings galore—made a shake each of marjoram, thyme, savory, celery chopped fine, the whole blended and tasted, to be browned slowly in the huge iron skillet, the browning turned in to remove the excess moisture and give it flavor. Then into the cavity of the noble bird—lightly and loosely less as it puffed up in cooking it would become soggy for want of room to expand.

Rich, brown gravy—not the anemic variety of restaurant acquaintance—with giblets jouncing around in its satiny depths. And mashed potatoes enriched by honest-to-goodness cow's cream—a pool of butter overflowing the snowy crater. And—shades of all well-meaning dietitians—sweet potatoes—baked in a cinnamon sugar syrup with butter and much basting. Then there were string beans, home canned if you please, and silver skinned onions stuffed with sausage; and rolls, home-made to be sure, "cracklin' cornbread" and apple butter, cranberry sauce—but who had time for those with that drumstick staring one out of politeness! Nothing fancy, just food! But what food—and what history!

As we leave room for the pudding? Or is it pie? Oh yes, pie—the pudding was saved for the night time when the fire crackled lustily, urging the cornpoper and scarlet cheeked apples to join the party for the flame and cheer of yester year!

But to the pie! Mince, pumpkin or cranberry—no amount of "eenie-meenie-minnie-mo's" could ever quite make up juvenile minds. So the grandmother settled it. On each Haviland pie plate—her best, of course—went a tiny silver each of mince pie—with its rich counterpane of crusty crunchiness savory apple butter uniqueness and beyond price—that of home; cranberry pie with its crisscross of crisp sugary slats, and "pumpkin pie" the likes of which would make French pancakes, peach melba and such look silly—silly—the three!—And all self-imposed arguments settled joyously!

As if that were not enough—great pots of coffee—with cream so thick a knife scarcely lifted it, spiced cider in huge pitchers—milk and hot chocolate with a sprinkle of cinnamon. Walnuts, apples, hickory nuts, honey taffy to clear the bit of a cough—strange how many oughts would suddenly reveal it.

And then that last moment of hushed hush when, satisfied beyond measure, that time when folk are more likely to give thanks than when the wish is able to be gratified, we bow our heads to the Maker—the Giver of Gifts—Thanksgiving!
