Community Chest Drive Is to Start Next Week

The annual community chest drive, to raise a budget of \$1,400 or \$1,500, will start Monday of next week. It is hoped to complete the work in two days.

Despite the fact that need of help from the chest is likely to be greater during the coming winter than it was last winter, the sum to be raised has been set at the same figure as a year ago. The amount to be given from the chest to the county boy scout organization is to be cut and the contribution to the county Red Cross is to be taken from funds of the local chapter. It is believed these cuts will take care of additional expenses.

During the past year several hundred families have been given assistance from community chest funds.

GRADES TO GIVE PROGRAM TO GET PIANO MONEY

In order to raise \$50 to make a payment on a piano purchased last summer for the central grade building, pupils of the school will present an entertainment Friday night, December 5, in the high school gymnasium. The entertainment will show the results of the children's study of life and customs of the American Indian and also will include recitations, songs and dances connected with this subject.

Part I will show an evening scene with Indian women awaiting the coming of the braves. Presumably the warriors arrive. They are interrupted by a messenger telling of the approach of a warlike tribe.

Part II depicts morning in the camp, showing the women, starting of fire by the medicine man and the like. The other tribe arrives and the peace pipe is smoked around a council fire.

Lions Outline Projects.
At an executive meeting of the Lions club Tuesday evening, plans were outlined for major projects to be undertaken this year. Dr. H. A. Hagen outlined the safety first program as laid out by the Lions International. This will consist of educational work in the grade schools, placing of signs, and safety first pictures in school rooms and providing safety first covers for children's school books. The junior class of the high school has volunteered to take over this work if the Lions club will provide the material, the class to handle program as a project in the high school citizenship contest.

The community chest program was outlined, the executive committee endorsing the work and discussing means of giving it support.

Plans for a buyers' week, or spend your money week, to be held the first week in December, were discussed. The Lions club will foster the program of having persons able to spend money on house repairs, odd jobs and the like do so during this week. It is hoped that such a program will help to relieve unemployment.

The executive committee also discussed the unemployment problem and favored the idea of organizing a central committee, composed of representative men of various civic organizations.
