SOME ENCOURAGEMENT FOR MILLMEN IS SEEN

Strengthening of Market Continues to Depend Upon Holding Down Production.

(Crew's Lumber Digest.)

The general outlook is the brightest that it has been at any time during the past 12 months. The last two weeks have seen many of the trends noted in November taking shape and being given a material expression in prices. One of the most gratifying features of the turn has been the discovery that supply and demand have been very delicately balanced, as is proved by the short length of time it has taken the market to gain strength. To be truthful it has to be admitted that there has so far been no appreciable increase in the demand, the improvement having been brought about by a very small speeding up in buying and a slight further reduction in output. No one can say when the trade is being influenced by prospects of the longest shutdowns and smallest production through the winter months that has been seen in the northwest in many years. However, wise buyers who have been making a study of mill stocks have known for some time that many items most called for by retail dealers have during the past 60 days been cut down to where there is already a shortage, that being particularly true of No. 1 common dimension. Some buyers have not taken into consideration that production on the Pacific coast has been below half of normal the larger part of this year, nor have they studied the supply and demand close enough to realize that for many weeks during the fall and late summer demand, as small as it was, was greater than the output. With prospects of the output between now and the end of February being close to a billion feet below the normal full-time capacity of the mills, there is plenty of reason to believe that the market is due for a strong upturn. A survey made by this publication shows that 163 mills, with a combined daily capacity of over six million feet, are either already down or will close before Christmas with no definite plans as to when they will resume operations. That it will be extremely hard, if not almost impossible, before the end of this month, to buy mixed grades calling for hard assortments is a foregone conclusion and that prices will be elevated accordingly is a natural consequence. A study of the six major markets for northwest woods shows that the only one which has not had some improvement since the first of this month is export. The Atlantic coast cargo business has picked up enough to permit of substantial price advances and California cargo purchases calling for mill shipment have brought more money. Rail business, which was the first to show signs of life, is still very much on the up with prospects for an increasing demand for car material early in 1931 growing better every day.

The brighter outlook which the lumber industry is enjoying is quite general in all lines of business. This was a feature and a wide perspective are predicting a gradual revival from now on. The need for lumber is just as constant as that of any other commodity. The demand which has accumulated this year will be released slowly as business gets back on its feet, payrolls are brought back to normal and hoarded money comes up for air.

There is nothing to justify speeding up the output, in fact to retain their present enviable position and fortify it further the mills should make little or no lumber between now and March and by that time the demand will be so far ahead of the supply that 1931 will be given a start which should carry it through 12 months of prosperity.
